Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

April 18, 2010 Third Sunday of Easter Acts 5:27-32, 40b-41 Psalm 30 Revelation 5:11-14 John 21:1-19

From the Gospel of **John**:

At that time, Jesus revealed himself to his disciples at the Sea of Tiberias. He revealed himself in this way. Together were Simon Peter, Thomas called Didymus, Nathanael from Cana in Galilee, Zebedee's sons, and two others of his disciples. Simon Peter said to them, "am going fishing." They said to him, "e also will come with you." So they went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing. When it was already dawn, Jesus was standing on the shore; but the disciples did not realize that it was Jesus. Jesus said to them, "Children, have you caught anything to eat?"

They answered him, "No." So he said to them, "Cast the net over the right side of the boat and you will find something." So they cast it, and were not able to pull it in because of the number of fish. So the disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "Alt is the Lord." When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he tucked in his garment, for he was lightly clad, and jumped into the sea. The other disciples came in the boat, for they were not far from shore, only about a hundred yards, dragging the net with the fish. When they climbed out on shore, they saw a charcoal fire with fish on it and bread. Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish you just caught." So Simon Peter went over and dragged the net ashore full of one hundred fifty-three large fish. Even though there were so many, the net was not torn. Jesus said to them, "Come, have breakfast." And none of the disciples dared to ask him, "Who are you?" because they realized it was the Lord. Jesus came over and took the bread and gave it to them, and in like manner the fish.

This was now the third time Jesus was revealed to his disciples after being raised from the dead.

Focus questions:

- 1. Relate a time when someone did not give up on you in spite of your past failures.
- 2. What is God asking of you at this point in your life?
- 3. Describe a time in your life when you had a hard time recognizing Jesus.

Family and children's question:

Easter, springtime and the Risen Lord are all about new life. What are the signs of new life that you see around you?

JUSTICE & PEACE

Today we start a new series. Most times in this column I rarely talk in the first person but I want to relay a story of why I am in the work of justice and peace. After completing two years of study in the Pastoral Institute of the Diocese, I chose to do a third year ministry track in Parish Social Ministry. This was in the early 90's and many advised me that it was a very difficult ministry and that people were generally not interested in knowing. I have found this not to be true over the years. One priest described it like being on the end of a limb on a tree with someone sawing the limb. My response was if I can change one attitude I will have been successful because that one person might be able to change someone else. Justice and peace issues are often not popular. They require action. Sometimes they require a metanoia, a complete turnaround. Many of us are more comfortable being rather passive. We pray and donate money rather than taking a stand and action on an issue is quite different. Over the next several weeks we will talk about our responsibility as Catholic Christians to justice and peace. We will talk about the Ten Commandments which are a guideline for our lives and the Beatitudes which call us to a deeper challenge.

What does this all mean in terms of justice and peace? The Ten Commandments mostly tell us what not to do. That is relatively easy. The Beatitudes tell us what we should do. That is much harder and requires action.

Justice a parish affair.
Together we can make a difference.
April 13th is Pope St. Martin I.
April 14th is New Year's in Sri Lanka.
Today is Devine Mercy Sunday.
