
RECONCILIATION—Celebrated in Church every Saturday from 4pm to 4:45pm, or by previous appointment with Fr. Midura.

OUR NEW DEACONS—The parish welcomes Ed Vigneaux and John Rapacki to the service of the Church as Permanent Deacons.

After graduating from SUNY Stony Brook, Ed began a 34 year teaching career in the Half Hollow Hills School District. He received two Masters degrees from Hofstra and Adelphi in Elementary and Special Education. From 2004 to 2006, he attended the Pastoral

Formation Institute, during which time he pursued his calling to the Diaconate. For the next four years he undertook theological studies for the ministry. He has received a Masters degree in Pastoral Studies from Immaculate Conception Seminary. Ed is married to Laura and they are parents and grandparents. In our parish, they have served as Lectors, Eucharistic Ministers, Marriage Preparation, Bereavement and Consolation Ministry. Ed has been assisting Deacon Bob at Wake Services.

DID YOU KNOW?

- 70% of the food pantries and 59% of soup kitchens are operated by faith-based agencies and houses of worship.
- According to the US Dept. of Agriculture's recent annual study, the number of Americans who are "food Insecure" (not sure that where their next meal is coming from or not certain to get enough to eat) rose 36% last year.

According to the newly released study "hunger in America 2010: The Local Report for Long Island," 283,700 people a year turn to emergency food pantries and soup kitchens affiliated with Long Island Cares and Island Harvest. In other words, one in ten of our neighbors needs help in order to have enough to eat. 110,000 of these neighbors are children.

JUSTICE & PEACE

Continuing from last week on the Ten Commandments vs the Beatitudes. In Matt. 25 vs. 31-46 in the judgment of the nations, Matthew gives the criterion of judgment that will be on the deeds of mercy that have been done for the least of Jesus' brothers and sisters. They are all the people who have suffered hunger, thirst, etc. The son of man, Jesus, will repay everyone according to his conduct. The righteous will be rewarded for caring for the needs of the sufferers. All this fits into how we respond to the Beatitudes which is the heart of Christ's teaching. For far too long now we have not emphasized enough this teaching of the Beatitudes. Most of the Commandments, as we have said, are basically easy to follow because they tell us what not to do. The Beatitudes, on the other hand, tell us what we should do.

What does this all mean in terms of justice and peace? When we stand before God at our judgment will we be in the group that saw the face of Jesus in the hungry, the thirsty, a stranger, the naked, the ill, those imprisoned and ministered to them? If yes then we have lived the Beatitudes.

We hope you have enjoyed this series. As always your comments are greatly appreciated. We leave you with this prayer.

We are God's coworkers. I am only one but still I am one. I cannot do everything but still I can do something. I will not refuse to do something I can do. Dear Lord help me to believe in myself. With you living in me, I can make a difference. *To be continued.*

A WEB SITE THAT PAYS ST. THOMAS FOR USING IT —

Want to know how you can support St. Thomas More? By entering the search engine known as Goodsearch.com and doing any shopping on the various web sites listed, a certain portion of the sale will be credited to St. Thomas More. It does not involve any additional cost to the purchaser nor is there any attached surcharge to the sale order involved. I did not compare the same web sites listed alone with the one listed with GoodSearch yet. Here is how it works:
