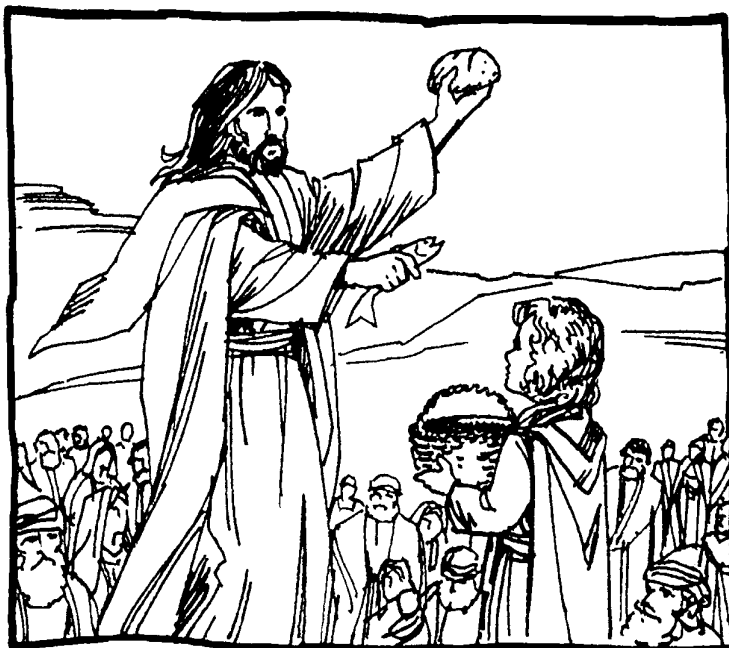
MARRIAGE—As soon as a couple decides to

Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

June 13, 2010
Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time
2 Samuel 12:7-10, 13
Psalm 32
Galatians 2:16, 19-21
Luke 7:36-8:3

The holy Gospel according to Luke:

A Pharisee invited Jesus to dine with him, and he entered the Pharisee's house and reclined at table. Now there was a sinful woman in the city who learned that he was at table in the house of the Pharisee. Bringing an alabaster flask of ointment, she stood behind him at his feet weeping and began to bathe his feet with her tears. Then she wiped them with her hair, kissed them, and anointed them with the ointment. When the Pharisee who had invited him saw this he said to himself, "If this man were a prophet he would know who and what sort of woman this is who is touching him, that she is a sinner." Jesus said to him in reply, "Simon, I have something to say to you." "Tell me, teacher," he said.

"Two people were in debt to a certain creditor; one owed five hundred day's wages and the other owed fifty. Since they were unable to repay the debt, he forgave it for both. Which of them will love him more?"

Simon said in reply, "The one, I suppose, whose larger debt was forgiven." He said to him, "You have judged rightly."

Then he turned to the woman and said to Simon, "Do you see this woman? When I entered your house, you did not give me water for my feet, but she has bathed them with her tears and wiped them with her hair. You did not give me a kiss, but she has not ceased kissing my feet since the time I entered. You did not anoint my head with oil, but she anointed my feet with ointment. So I tell you, her many sins have been forgiven because she has shown great love. But the one to whom little is forgiven, loves little." He said to her, "Your sins are forgiven." The others at table said to themselves, "Who is this who even forgives sins?" But he said to the woman, "Your faith has saved you; go in peace."

Focus questions:

1. Relate an experience when you found it difficult to forgive.
2. Who has taught you about forgiveness?
3. Who in your life has accepted you for who you are, not holding past mistakes against you?

Family and children's question:

The woman in the Gospel showed great love to Jesus. Talk about how you can show love for your Dad and the other fathers in your life.

FROM FR. MIDURA

OUR LITURGY TODAY—Today we remember that our God made himself food for us so that we may come together in this holy meal as the body of Christ. Today we rejoice in the lavish abundance of our God, who feeds 5,000 people with only five loaves and a couple of fish. There are those who would have us believe that there is never enough. Let us believe in God's abundance.

CORPUS CHRISTI—The feast we celebrate today, also known as the Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ, is a good time to remind ourselves of the focal point of our Catholic Faith, the Eucharist. Jesus chose to share himself through his Body and Blood under the appearance of bread and wine. How awesome is this gift. As we approach to receive the Eucharist, may the reverence of our bow and our affirmation of faith through our "Amen" indicate our praise of the Lord who nourishes and strengthens us.

FEAST WEEKEND—Our Parish Feast Weekend will consist of the Lobster Bash on next Friday, June 11, and the Pancake Breakfast on next Sunday, June 13, after all the Masses. This year the two events will be held in Walden Hall with all the cooking taking place outdoors as in the past. For the Lobster Bash, we will have the same vendor as in the past and we will also feature Chicken and Ribs for those who prefer that to Lobster. Cost will be the same as last year: \$50, even though

costs for the event have been raised by the vendor. For the Pancake Breakfast on Sunday, there will be a nominal charge of \$2 per person.

For reservations to the Lobster Bash, make your reservation after Mass in the Church lobby or let us know by noon this Monday so that we can prepare. You can also arrange seating for yourself and friends.

LUCKY 400 RAFFLE—Only 400 tickets will be sold. Tickets are \$100. First prize is: \$10,000; Second Prize is: \$2,000; Third Prize is: \$1,000. They will be offered for purchase after Masses on weekends. You can pick your favorite number, if it is available. You can be partners with others, even with the pastor. You can also reserve your ticket by dropping the reservation form in the collection or by mailing it to the Church Office. Drawing will be Sunday, June 27, at 2pm.

This Raffle will take the place of the car raffle that was held over the last several years.

PARISH GOLF OUTING—Our Golf Outing this year will be on Monday, July 26, at the Smithtown Landing Golf Club. Save the date! FATHER'S DAY NOVENA—Father's Day is Sunday, June 20. As we had a Nine Day Novena of Masses for our moms, we will have the same for our fathers. Please return the information envelope you received in the contribution packet or use an envelope that is available in the Church Lobby and place it in the drop off box there.

CATHOLIC MINISTRIES APPEAL 2010—Our parish's assessment this year is the same as last year's. It is \$59,020. I ask you to help the parish meet its goal so that we can all help our brothers and sisters as well as benefit from the sharing that the parish will receive once the goal is attained.

WHAT'S HAPPENING AROUND OUR FACILITY—Potential contractors were invited to bid on the HVAC replacements for our parish facility. They are due by June 29 and we will select the successful contractor by the end of the month. We will then begin necessary demolition and re-tooling in preparation for the three HVAC supply units.

LITURGICAL BITS & BYTES

Corpus Christi

This feast, now called the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body & Blood of Christ, developed during the Middle Ages (in the year 1264) at the request of St. Thomas Aquinas who wrote the hymns and prayers for the feast. Its purpose was to emphasize the presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. A procession with the Blessed Sacrament in a monstrance was a public display of faith. Processions, incense, flowers, canopy, monstrance! For 800 years people looked at and adored our Lord in the Eucharist, singing about the awesome presence of Christ among us, remembering Holy Thursday, spiritually communing but rarely daring to receive the Body and Blood of the Lord in Holy Communion. Today, we understand once more that the Eucharist is for eating and drinking. The feast of the Body and Blood of Christ calls us to ponder the love of our savior who came to be with us and to serve us in a most ordinary way, and to ask how we might follow more closely in his footsteps.

JUSTICE & PEACE

Continuing from last week on finding hope in a world of darkness. We left off by saying we are all wounded but what is important is what we do with the wound. After a wound and the long dark night of the journey, there is something we now know after having passed through. The suffering and the wound has taught us something and now we are different. We have said that a *metanoia* (change) occurs after a suffering and leads to that turnaround to a new direction. We all get a turn at the wheel of life. Sometimes we are on the upside and other times on the downside. What is important is what we are learning in each cycle. When Jesus was talking to the rich young man (Mark 10:20), the problem with the rich young man was that he never wanted his turn at the bottom of the wheel. He was never transformed and remained small in many ways. He could not empathize with the poor and suffering. What does this all mean in terms of justice and peace? Can we empathize with the poor? For example look, at our record as a Church towards slavery, sexuality, sexism, racism, etc. Today the Church has had a *metanoia* on many of these issues and they have become part of Catholic teaching. Can we as individuals do this? Can we learn from our wounds? Can we transform and be transformed. *To be continued.*
