welcoming Mass attendance are required.

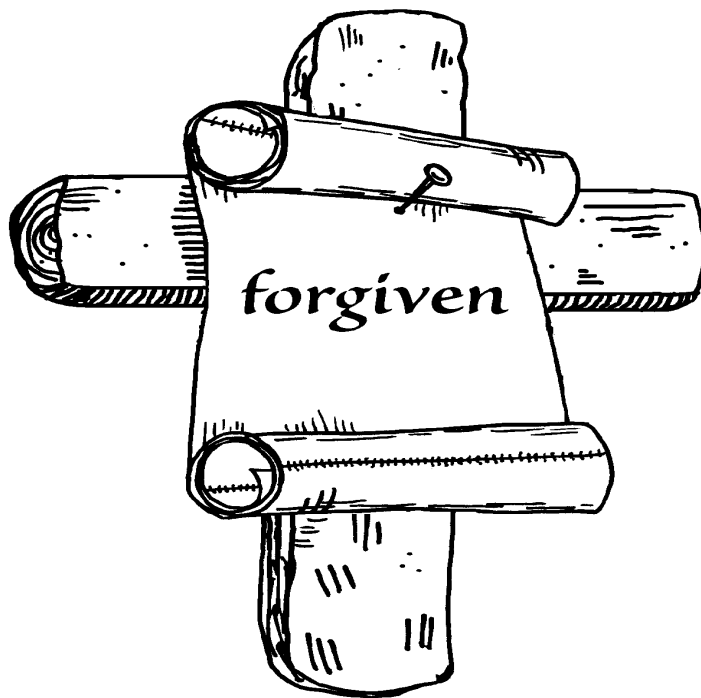
MARRIAGE—As soon as a couple decides to

Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time
Ecclesiastes 1:2, 2:21-23

The holy Gospel according to Luke:

Someone in the crowd said to Jesus,
 “Teacher, tell my brother to share the inheritance with me.”
 He replied to him,
 “Friend, who appointed me as your judge and arbitrator?”
 Then he said to the crowd, “Take care to guard against all greed, for though one may be rich,
 one’s life does not consist of possessions.”
 Then he told them a parable.
 “There was a rich man whose land produced a bountiful harvest. He asked himself, ‘What shall I do, for I do not have space to store my harvest?’
 And he said, ‘This is what I shall do:
 I shall tear down my barns and build larger ones.
 There I shall store all my grain and other goods
 and I shall say to myself, ‘Now as for you,
 you have so many good things stored up for many years,
 rest, eat, drink, be merry!’”
 But God said to him, ‘You fool, this night your life will be demanded of you; and the things you have prepared, to whom will they belong?’

OUR LITURGY TODAY — Today's readings are about prayer. In the first reading Abraham negotiates with God, and in the Gospel the disciples ask Jesus to teach them to pray. He responds by teaching them the Lord's Prayer; or the Our Father. We are encouraged to be confident about approaching our God in prayer.

ST. VINCENT de PAUL INFORMATION WEEK—At all the Masses this weekend, members of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul will be sharing information about the society to the parish. Anyone wanting to learn more about how St. Vincent de Paul works is invited to a meeting here at the Church on Wednesday, July 28, at 7:30pm.

PRIEST RESIDENT AT ST. THOMAS —Around the middle of September, Fr. Peter O'Rourke will become a resident priest at St. Thomas More. At the present time, Fr. O'Rourke, a Passionist priest, is the chaplain to the Veterans Home at Stony Brook and will continue in that role when he takes up residence at St. Thomas. He will change his residence from Assumption Parish in Centereach.

BAPTISM SUNDAYS EXPANDED —Because we are blessed with three deacons at St. Thomas More, we will offer the Sacrament of Baptism on the first four Sundays of the month. This will begin in September. The requirements for attendance at Baptism prep the Thursday before the third Sunday of the month and attendance at the 9:15am Welcoming Mass on the second Sunday of the month will remain the same.

CATHOLIC MINISTRIES APPEAL 2010— Our parish's assessment this year is the same as last year's. It is \$59,020. I ask you to help the parish meet its goal so that we can all help our brothers and sisters as well as benefit from the rebate that the parish will receive once the goal is attained. We are about \$2,800 short of reaching our assessment. No pledge is too small! Whatever you can give will help us fulfill our obligation to the CMA.

If you did not receive a letter from the CMA Office, please use the cut-out in the bulletin to make a pledge. You can drop it in the collection plate in an envelope marked "CMA" and we will process it for you. We thank you for your generous support.

WHAT'S HAPPENING AROUND OUR FACILITY—Now that a contract is in place for replacement of the HVAC units, we will refine the work schedule regarding the demolition and retrofitting needed to welcome the new units. We will keep you informed. We got back our parish snow blowers from repairs and maintenance. We are good to go when the snows arrive!

EVENT CHANGES DURING CONSTRUCTION—During the time of demolition and retrofitting that will take place in the HVAC replacement work, we will have to schedule any funeral or other Church events during the lunch breaks of the construction workers. This will make sure that the time lines in place for the project are maintained as closely as possible to remain cost effective for us and for the contractor. We hope that anyone affected by the work will be most understanding.

The hope is that we will know well in advance that we have the necessary people-power to make the day happen.

CONTINUING MINISTRY—There is an ongoing need to augment, supplement, replace (or whatever description you want to make) in the parish ministries. Eucharistic ministers, ushers, lectors, greeters, hospitality, consolation, (to mention only a few) are parish ministries that require people at all times. The Wounded Healer

Nobody escapes being wounded. We are all wounded people, whether physically, emotionally, mentally or spiritually. The main question is not “How can we hide our wounds?” so we don’t have to be embarrassed, but “How can we put our woundedness in the service of others?” When our wounds cease to be a source of shame, and become a source of healing, we have become wounded healers. Jesus is God’s wounded healer: through his wounds we are healed. Jesus’ suffering and death brought joy and life. His humiliation brought glory; his rejection brought a community

of love. As followers of Jesus we can also allow our wounds to bring healing to others. *Henry Nouwen*

JUSTICE & PEACE

Continuing from last week on finding hope in a world of darkness. We left off by saying, as a society, we have to think about including more people in the vision rather than excluding them. Today we want to focus again on something we spoke about before in this column, that is the sacred wound. One of the ways God pushes us to action is by upsetting us with our present mode. Until our world falls apart, we will not look for something more. The experience involves suffering in some form. We do not like suffering. When the small self dies the true self emerges. But most of us would do anything to avoid that death. The ego must die. By avoiding this we continue with the pain instead of letting go and letting God. The Gospels constantly talk about being wounded. They are saying there is no other way to know something essential. When we allow our unjust wounds to become sacred wounds they become salvific. What does this all mean in terms of justice and peace? Today as a people and a nation, we are in great pain especially since 9/11, the storm damage to the South of the USA, and now the oil spill, the number of people out of work and those who have lost everything. These are hard times for a lot of people. If we can trust the pain, if we can learn from the pain, if we can trust God and see that God is transforming all things, then justice and peace is possible. Can we see God in the pain and suffering? *To be continued.*

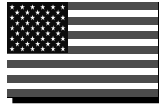

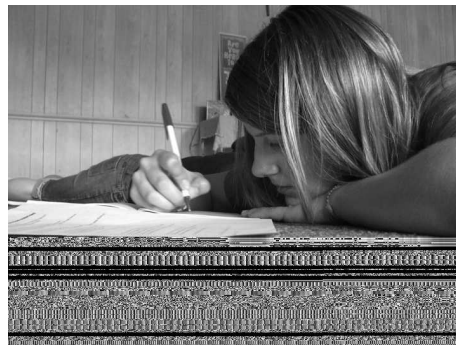
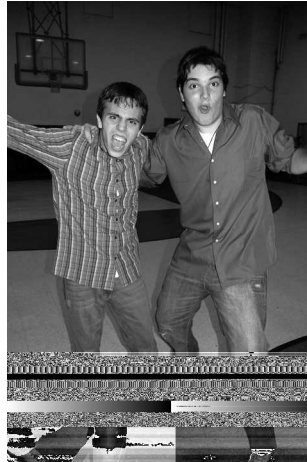
