BAPTISM—As soon as your child is born, please call the Church Office to make Baptism arrangements. Preparation session and welcoming Mass attendance are required.



The holy Gospel according to Luke:

FROM FR. MIDURA

OUR LITURGY TODAY — Recall the words of Jesus on the cross to his mother and St. John: "Woman, behold your son. Behold your mother." These words forever identify Mary as one with Christ's body, the Church—with us here and now. Today we celebrate not only what happened to Mary, but what will happen to us. Let us all pray with Faith in Mary and in her Son, Jesus the Lord.

ASSUMPTION OF MARY—According to the belief of Christians of the Catholic Church, the Eastern Orthodox Churches, the Oriental Orthodox Churches, and the Anglican Communion, the Assumption of Mary was the bodily taking up of the Virgin Mary into Heaven at the end of her life. The Catholic Church teaches as <u>dogma</u> that Mary, "having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory." This doctrine was dogmatically and infallibly defined by Pope Pius XII on November 1, 1950. This belief is known as the <u>Dormition</u> by the Orthodox. In the churches which observe it, the Assumption is a major festival, commonly celebrated on August 15. In many countries it is a Catholic Holy Day of Obligation.

In his August 15, 2004, homily given at Lourdes, Pope John Paul II quoted John 14:3 as one of the scriptural bases for understanding the dogma of the Assumption of Mary. In this verse, Jesus tells his disciples at the Last Supper, "If I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and will receive you to myself; that where I am, you may be there also." According to Catholic theology, Mary is the pledge of the fulfillment of Christ's promise. The feast day of the Assumption on August 15 is a public holiday in many countries, including Lebanon, Italy, Malta, Belgium, Portugal, France, Spain, Greece and Chile. In East Orthodox churches following the Julian Calendar, the feast day of Assumption of Mary falls on August 28, and is also a public holiday in the Republic of Macedonia. (from the Wikipedia Encyclopedia).

HELPING OUR FOOD PANTRY—Whenever we go shopping to supplement our Outreach Food Pantry shelves, we spend around \$500 to \$600 each time on as many sale items as possible. We thank those who support us each week and we encourage everyone to consider bringing one item to give to our food bin that is in the Church foyer. Many more items enable us to help many more folks. We thank everyone for their help. Last week, we spent about \$650 to supplement our Food Pantry shelves, all because of your help!

WHAT'S HAPPENING AROUND OUR FACILITY—We have been pulling up the plastic liner that is imbedded in the dirt in the mall. As the weather becomes more tolerable, we will level and grade the area so that it can be seeded. We have to tend to the altar lights again as some of them have burned out. The HVAC system replacement work is going according to schedule. Water check valves will receive their annual test and certification this coming week. All the extinguishers have been checked and certified as functional. *Progress!*

BEACH MASS—We have Sunday, September 12, as the date set aside for our annual Beach Mass. To make it happen, we need people to also volunteer to help in various ways for the Beach Mass to be successful and enjoyable. We know that "many hands make for less work for everyone." Please sign up at the "sign up" board in the Church lobby as soon as you can. Everyone who attends the Beach Mass is asked to return a reservation form along with a check for \$5 per person. This amount will be returned to you when you sign in on the day of the Beach Mass. The deadline for signing up is September 5 so that we can prepare for the day. We will invite those attending to bring items for consumption, based on the first letter of their last name. This is indicated on the reservation form. And as always, the intent is that everyone have a great time!

MISSION COOPERATIVE APPEAL—Each year in every parish there is an appeal on behalf of the Propagation of the Faith Missions in various parts of the world. This year the appeal will take place next weekend at all the Masses. The appeal will support the Missions in the Dominican Republic. There will be a 2nd collection devoted totally to that collection. We invite everyone's generosity to this collection. Speaker will be: Deacon Robert Kruse.

BAPTISM SUNDAYS EXPANDED —Beginning in September, we will offer the Sacrament of Baptism on the first four Sundays of the month. The requirements for attendance at Baptism prep the Thursday before the third Sunday of the month and attendance at the 9:15am Welcoming Mass on the second Sunday of the month will remain the same. **CATHOLIC GODPARENTS**—Just a reminder that for a person to be a godparent for a Catholic, he or she must be a practicing Catholic and themselves should have received the Sacraments of Initiation, namely Baptism, Eucharist and Confirmation. As part of the preparation, Catholic godparents are asked to present a record of their reception of Confirmation.

CONTINUING MINISTRY—There is an ongoing need to augment, supplement, replace (or whatever description you want to make) in the parish ministries. Eucharistic ministers, ushers, lectors, greeters, hospitality, consolation, (to mention only a few) are parish ministries that require people at all times. If you are willing and able to participate in some ministry in the parish, we would be glad to have you. Look at the bulletin cut out with the listed ministries and, if you can, sign up and return the form and we will take it from there.

REMEMBERING SEPTEMBER 11—We will have the 9am Mass on Saturday, September 11, in memory of all those who died that tragic day. While we will remember everyone, if you wish to have a particular person's name mentioned, please write their name(s) on the cut out in the bulletin and return it to the Church office by the previous weekend.

MUMS FOR THE FALL—We will offer mums for purchase on the weekend of September 11-12. We expect delivery on Friday, September 10 and we will process them for pick up, beginning on Saturday, September 11. The mums will come in 9" pots and will be offered in red, white, bronze, yellow and purple. Cost will be \$5 each, the same cost as in the past. If you want to place your order in the meantime, please use the order form in the bulletin or use the form that will come in the mail to you.

CATHOLIC MINISTRIES APPEAL 2010— Our parish's assessment this year is the same as last year's. It is \$59,020. I ask you to help the parish meet its goal so that we can all help our brothers and sisters as well as benefit from the rebate that the parish will receive once the goal is attained. JUSTICE & PEACE

Continuing from last week on finding hope in a world of darkness. We left off by saying aren't we tired of all the wars and killing? There has to be a better way. There is a better way and Jesus taught us that over 2000 years ago. Somehow we missed it. Jesus asked us to be light, to be yeast, to be salt, and to be a mustard seed. See (Matt.5:13-16) and (Luke 13:18-21) for a better understanding. Jesus had a lot of hope in sinners and that is good news for us. Jesus, however, had problems with those who didn't think they were sinners. Jesus, as we have said many times in this column, was interested in repentance. He was inclusive of people and not exclusive. The teachings of Jesus creates an ability for humanity to "pull down the mighty from their thrones and lift up the lowly" (Luke 1: 52). What does this all mean in terms of justice and peace? All this can be done by ordinary people. If we trust the teachings of Jesus then we must trust where it will lead us. This is exactly what St. Francis of Assisi did. He went out to the edge of society and did it better. The problem today is that we attack things directly and by doing that we let it determine the energy, the style and the opposition. We then become the very thing we are attacking but in a different form. The wars we are in today are excellent examples. Francis did it better. He loved his opponents and followed the non-violent style of Jesus. He did not tell others they were wrong. He just did it better. For Francis the best criticism of the bad was the practice of the better. This is the better way of solving problems. True transformation can make it possible. Then justice and peace will be possible. To be continued.

A WEB SITE THAT PAYS ST. THOMAS FOR USING IT — Want to know how you can support St. Thomas More? By entering the search engine known as *Goodsearch.com* and doing any shopping on the various web sites listed, a certain portion of the sale will be credited to St. Thomas More. It does not involve any additional cost to the purchaser nor is there any attached surcharge to the sale order involved. I did not compare the same web sites listed alone with the one listed with GoodSearch yet. Here is how it works:
