September 26, 2010 Twenty-sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time Amos 6:1a, 4-7 Psalm 146 1 Timothy 6:11-16 Luke 16:19-31

The holy Gospel according to Luke:

Jesus said to the Pharisees:

"There was a rich man who dressed in purple garments and fine linen and dined sumptuously each day. And lying at his door was a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores, who would gladly have eaten his fill of the scraps that fell from the rich man's table. Dogs even used to come and lick his sores. When the poor man died, he was carried away by angels to the bosom of Abraham. The rich man also died and was buried, and from the netherworld, where he was in torment, he raised his eyes and saw Abraham far off and Lazarus at his side. And he cried out, 'Father Abraham, have pity on me. Send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue, for I am suffering torment in these flames.' Abraham replied, 'My child, remember that you received what was good during your lifetime while Lazarus likewise received what was bad; but now he is comforted here, whereas you are tormented. FROM FR. MIDURA

OUR LITURGY TODAY —Today is Catechetical Sunday. We pray for all whose work it is to form others in the Faith. Today's Gospel is for every person who expects forgiveness from God, but fails to forgive others. That is, today's Gospel is for almost everyone. Let us pray to be forgiving people, not only in our hearts, but by our words and our actions as well.

PILGRIMAGE TO LOURDES—The only way to begin to describe Lourdes is that you have to be there to experience it. I had the opportunity to celebrate Mass at the Grotto where the Blessed Mother appeared 18 times to St. Bernadette. Also, we celebrated Mass in the Crypt Church above the Grotto and also in the Basilica above the Grotto and the Crypt Church. We also celebrated Mass in the chapel of St. John Vianney, the Cure of Ars. During a side trip to the Atlantic coast of Spain, we visited

the town of Loyola and toured the museum that pertained to St. Ignatius of Loyola, founder of the Jesuits. In the room where Ignatius converted to Catholicism, we were given the opportunity to offer Mass. These were special moments to pray and reflect on their importance as they pertain to our Faith. Those who visit Lourdes also have the opportunity to take part in the immersion in the spring waters that flow from the Grotto. As each one enters the pool of water, volunteers pray together with the pilgrim and then the volunteers assist in the immersion of the participant.

Outside of the immersion pools there are taps from which one can obtain water from the spring to take home or to drink from the tap that flows continuously from the spring generated during one of the apparitions to St. Bernadette.

The flight to and from Paris, France was aboard the new Airbus 380 which has two levels of passengers. The two full flights accommodated around 570 passengers each. Each passenger has the ability to use the three cameras on the plane's nose, tail or belly showing take off and landing and flight progress. You begin to see the curvature of the earth at 41,000 feet. Technology has come a long way! Space ships are next.

WELCOME TO FATHER PETER O'ROURKE—Fr. Peter is a member of the Passionists and currently serves as Catholic Chaplain to the Veteran's Home in Stony Brook. He will reside at St. Thomas and will be available for parish Masses as his schedule allows.

THURSDAY MORNING MASS—Fr. Peter will make himself available for some weekday Masses. Henceforth, there will be Mass on Thursday mornings at 9am in place of Morning Prayer.

WHAT'S HAPPENING AROUND OUR FACILITY—Work has begun in the dismantling and removal of the old HVAC systems in the Red and White Rooms. As of this writing, the units for the Red Room and South White Room were all removed. If all is on schedule, the new AC units should be here by mid October. In the meantime, retrofitting the ducts and adding the other components will take place while we await the arrival of the HVAC units. I thought that one of the old units would remain on line for heating or cooling, but cost factors militated against that option and the direction taken was to remove everything to facilitate installation of what was necessary to await the new units. Hopefully, everyone will be patient and understanding during this temporary inconvenience. *Progress!*

BLOOD DRIVE—We thank everyone who came down last Thursday to be a blood donor. Some were deferred, but we thank those folks for their good intentions. We thank those who volunteered to help that day, especially the members of the Knights of Columbus who have always been there to assist. NEW ALTAR SERVERS—As the Summer winds down, we invite men and women of the parish to become Altar Servers. There is no age requirement. You need to have received your First Holy Communion; are willing to serve whenever assigned; and enjoy coming to Mass. We see that we are fragmented, divisive, dominating and oppressive. And so we travel the path through the burning love of the crucified Christ. One who descends into the depth of the Christ mystery ascends to the height of transcendent love, a love which is not self -centered but that goes out of itself for the sake of the other. We are called to be that eucharist embrace of forgiveness and reconciliation in a broken world. This is the path of prayer that leads to peace. It is the path of Christian life. If we hope for peace, it is ours to do. Take some time to reflect on peace in your life. Consider whether or not peace is at the center of your life or what prevents you from enjoying peace. Reflect on the Christian vocation of peacemaking and try to see the connection between peace in your heart and peace in the world. The above is a Franciscan prayer. What does all this mean in terms of justice and peace. Francis traveled the path of peace through the cross of Jesus. Are you willing to travel the same path. What is your understanding of peace?
