Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

November 7, 2010 Thirty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time 2 Maccabees 7:1-2, 9-14 Psalm 17 2 Thessalonians 2:16-3:5 Luke 20:27-38

The holy Gospel according to Luke:

Some Sadducees, those who deny that there is a resurrection, came forward and put this question to Jesus, saying,

"Teacher, Moses wrote for us,

If someone's brother dies leaving a wife but no child, his brother must take the wife

and raise up descendants for his brother.

Now there were seven brothers; the first married a woman but died childless. Then the second and the third married her, and likewise all the seven died childless. Finally the woman also died. Now at the resurrection whose wife will that woman be? For all seven had been married to her."

Jesus said to them,

"The children of this age marry and remarry; but those who are deemed worthy to attain to the coming age and to the resurrection of the dead neither marry nor are given in marriage. They can no longer die, for they are like angels; and they are the children of God because they are the ones who will rise. That the dead will rise even Moses made known in the passage about the bush, when he called out 'Lord, 'the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob; and he is not God of the dead, but of the living, for to him all are alive."

- 1. All the New Testament writers struggled to find the words to describe resurrected life. How do you envision it?
- 2. Describe a time when you doubted that there was a life after death or know someone who struggled with it. What prompted the doubt? How did you deal with it?
- 3. How does your belief in the resurrection influence the way you live day to day?

FROM FR. MIDURA

OUR LITURGY TODAY —Today is Halloween—also called All Hallows Eve or the day before All Saints Day. It is a day when children face the monsters, real and imagined, and enjoy being just a little bit frightened. Today we will hear about the small man, Zacchaeus, who was so childlike in his eagerness to see Jesus that he climbed a tree. We ask today for that same childlike eagerness.

ALL SAINTS DAY—November 1 is the Feast of All Saints. It was instituted to honor all the saints, known and unknown, and, according to Urban IV, to supply any deficiencies in the faithfuls' celebration of saints' feasts during the year. In the early days the Christians were accustomed to solemnize the anniversary of a martyr's death for Christ at the place of martyrdom. In the fourth century, dioceses began to interchange feasts, to transfer relics, to divide them, and to join in a common feast; as is shown by the invitation of St. Basil of Caesarea (397) to the bishops of the province of Pontus. Frequently groups of martyrs suffered on the same day, which naturally led to a joint commemoration. In the persecution of Diocletian the number of martyrs became so great that a separate day could not be assigned to each. But the Church, feeling that every martyr should be venerated, appointed a common day for all. The first trace of this we find in Antioch on the Sunday after Pentecost.

We also find mention of a common day in a sermon of St. Ephrem the Syrian (373), and in the 74th homily of St. John Chrysostom (407). At first only martyrs and St. John the Baptist were honored by a special day. Other saints were added gradually, and increased in number when a regular process of canonization was established; still, as early as 411 there is in the Chaldean Calendar a "Commemoratio Confessorum" for the Friday after Easter. In the West Boniface IV consecrated the Pantheon in Rome to the Blessed Virgin and all the martyrs, ordering an anniversary. Gregory III(731-741) consecrated a chapel in the Basilica of St. Peter to all the saints and fixed the anniversary for 1 November. A basilica of the Apostles already existed in Rome, and its dedication was annually remembered on 1 May. Gregory IV (827-844) extended the celebration on 1 November to the entire Church. The vigil seems to have been held as early as the feast itself. The octave was added by Sixtus IV (1471-84).

Because November 1 falls on a Monday this year, the Feast of All Saints is not a Holy Day of Obligation but a day when we are strongly encouraged to celebrate Mass together in honor of all of our Saints, like our loved ones who died in the Lord. **ALL SOULS DAY**—Tuesday, November 2, is All Souls Day. The Church offers all Masses on All Souls Day for the faithful departed. We will have Mass at 9am and 7pm to commemorate the Faithful Departed. At the 7pm Mass we will also include in a special way our prayers for all those departed whose funerals were held at St. Thomas More since last All Souls Day in 2009. The day begins a Nine Day Novena of Masses in our parish remembering all those whose names will have been presented through the All Souls Remembrance Envelope. Please return the All Souls Remembrance envelope you received in the mail through the collection or place it in the drop off box in the Church Lobby. If you need an All Souls envelope, these are available where you obtain the bulletin. **PARISH RETREAT**—On the weekend of November 6-7, Al Barbarino will be a guest singer and speaker at St. Thomas More. He will sing at each of the Masses and offer a Parish

Some times the choices are not much and we have to make alternate choices when we vote. Know the basic platform of the person

for whom you are voting. Sometimes the only thing we have learned from some of the candidates is that there in nothing but hot air coming out of their mouth or they only know how to bash rather than argue about what is for the good of the people and how they plan to do it.

In any case, get out in vote, despite the feeling that you might have that it won't make a difference.

WHAT'S HAPPENING AROUND OUR FACILITY—The integration of the HVAC units with the energy management system is in the works. One of the units was operating during the recent chilly weather and it kept Walden Hall comfortable while awaiting the computer control system. Further tweaking of the system will take place before there is a final testing of the system with us, the contractor, the engineering firm and the diocesan building office representative. The roofing contractor will then complete the two roof areas to make all things water tight. Then it will be a few more checks to pay for everything. Progress!

Priests are being trained to speak on social issues. The question is, "Are we ready to hear sermons on social justice especially today with so many people out of work?" Many would probably say "No." Then what was Jesus talking about? The Gospels are full of social justice. Many people have an understanding that the social teaching of the Church is about works of charity. It is also about the social structures of society that may be contributing to the plight of the poor. The Church has been teaching that its concern for the poor is that we must work to relieve the symptoms of poverty but also the causes of poverty.

What does this all mean in terms of justice and peace? Yes, food and clothing is important. We have to go a step forward

and remember the demands of justice. Are we part of the problem? Do we feel that if we give to the poor it is over? Do we believe that our social structures are working to solve the injustice against the poor? The recent storms and the oil spill were a wake up call and eye opener to the level of poverty in this country. The government is saying it is over. Those still out of work do not see it over. Are we social sinners? A good question to ponder. These are not easy questions to answer. Some are doing a lot to help the poor, but the poor also have to correct things like seeing that their children finish school.
