BAPTISM—As soon as your child is born, please call the Church Office to make Baptism arrangements. Preparation session and welcoming Mass attendance are required.



Just a precautionary note to say that if you have a cold and someone extends their hands for a handshake or they wish to give you a kiss, be thoughtful enough to tell them you have a cold that you wish to keep to yourself. Also, if you use a Kleenex, take it home with you rather then place it in the hymn book rack or on the floor! Receiving the Eucharist through the cup necessitates an awareness of not transmitting your cold by refraining from the cup until you are over your cold.

There is a great difference between successfulness and fruitfulness. Success comes from strength, control and respectability. A successful person has the energy to create something, to keep control over its development, and to make it available in large quantities. Success brings many rewards and often fame. Fruits, however, come from weakness and vulnerability. And fruits are unique. A child is the fruit conceived in vulnerability, community is the fruit born through shared brokenness, and intimacy is the fruit that grows through touching one another's wounds. Let's remind one another that what brings us true joy is not successfulness but fruitfulness.

Continuing from last week. Our faith tells us God created us because He loved us not because He needed us. We are the result of the overflowing of His love. He did not come in blinding glory. He came as a baby in a manger. He chose as parents the village carpenter and a young girl. Not the high and mighty.
