Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

March 27, 2011 Third Sunday of Lent Exodus 17:3-7 Psalm 95 Romans 5:1-2, 5-8 John 4:5-42

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John:

Jesus came to a town of Samaria called Sychar, near the plot of land that Jacob had given to his son Joseph. Jacob's well was there. Jesus, tired from his journey, sat down there at the well. It was about noon. A woman of Samaria came to draw water. Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink." His disciples had gone into the town to buy food. The Samaritan woman said to him, "How can you, a Jew, ask me, a Samaritan woman, for a drink?" —For Jews use nothing in common with Samaritans.—Jesus answered and said to her, "If you knew the gift of God and who is saying to you, 'Give me a drink, 'you would have asked him and he would have given you living water." The woman said to him, "Sir, you do not even have a bucket and the cistern is deep; where then can you get this living water? Are you greater than our father Jacob, who gave us this cistern and drank from it himself with his children and his flocks?" Jesus answered and said to her, "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again; but whoever drinks the water I shall give will never thirst; the water I shall give will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life."

The woman said to him, "Sir, give me this water, so that I may not be thirsty or have to keep coming here to draw water. "I can see that you are a prophet. Our ancestors worshiped on this mountain; but you people say that the place to worship is in Jerusalem." Jesus said to her, "Believe me, woman, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem. You people worship what you do not understand; we worship what we understand, because salvation is from the Jews. But the hour is coming, and is now here, when true worshipers will worship the Father in Spirit and truth; and indeed the Father seeks such people to worship him. God is Spirit, and those who worship him must worship in Spirit and truth."

The woman said to him, "I know that the Messiah is coming, the one called the Christ; when he comes, he will tell us everything." Jesus said to her, "I am he, the one who is speaking with you." Many of the Samaritans of that town began to believe in him. When the Samaritans came to him, they invited him to stay with them; and he stayed there two days. Many more began to believe in him because of his word, and they said to the woman, "We no longer believe because of your word; for we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this is truly the savior of the world."

FROM FR. MIDURA

OUR LITURGY FOR SUNDAY—All three of today's readings include a call from God—the call to Abraham to leave his homeland; in Paul's letter to Timothy, the call to live a holy life; and, in the Gospel, the call to listen to the voice of Jesus. Let us pray for open, listening hearts and minds.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS—This devotion takes place on all Fridays of Lent at 7pm in the Church. All are invited to participate.

OUR LENTEN PROJECT—We thank Sister Faustina and Sister Monica of the Franciscan Sisters of the Renewal for visiting our parish last weekend to talk about the work they do in feeding the needy in the Bronx. As a Lenten project, we will ask everyone's support by donating to the "little house" at the display in the Church Lobby. All monies will go to the Sisters to help their community continue their work. Checks can be made out to St. Thomas More or to the Franciscan Sisters of the Renewal. Cash is always accepted too! Last weekend, our generous parishioners donated \$1.900 to the Sisters for their mission.

LENTEN NOTES—

1. LENT

Lent runs until the Mass of the Lord's Supper exclusive, the beginning of the Sacred Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday).

2. FAST AND ABSTINENCE

All Catholics who have reached their 14th year are bound to abstain entirely from meat on all the Fridays of Lent. All Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59 inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on Good Friday. This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day.

3. OPERATION RICE BOWL—One of the ways we can think about our brothers and sisters in need is through Operation Rice Bowl. Under the auspices of Catholic Relief Services, all monies received from our Lenten Rice Bowls go towards meeting the needs of the poor and the hungry in our world, here and abroad. You can obtain your "Rice Bowl" where you get the bulletin and you can return it at the end of Lent or any time. Simply give it to one of the ushers.

4. SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION—The Sacrament of Reconciliation is available on Saturdays from 4pm to 4:45pm. There will be a Reconciliation Day on Monday of Holy Week throughout the Dioceses of Rockville Centre, Brooklyn and New York. That means all parishes in these three dioceses will be asked to provide opportunities for the Sacrament from 3pm to 9pm.

LENTEN RETREAT—We are having our parish Lenten Retreat on the Wednesday nights of Lent. They are March 23, 30 and April 6, 13 & 20. Time will be 7:30pm in the Church. Presenters are: Patricia Leonard and James Phillips. The topics are:

March 23—The Journey of Reconciliation;
March 30—Partners Along the Journey—Family & Friends;
April 6—The Journey of Discipleship;
April 13—The Journey of the People of God; and
April 20—The Journey Home.

WHAT'S HAPPENING AROUND OUR FACILITY—The mall in front of the Church was graded and four large truckloads of soil were added to prepare it for eventual seeding. The walkway will be installed shortly and pavers will be put down for a hard walking surface. The Stations of the Cross will then be put back where they were.

One of our young parishioners will be doing his Eagle Scout project which will involve installing a walkway from the front apron of the Church to Mary's shrine behind the lobby of the Church. The walkway will consist of paver bricks which will be offered for sale as memorials and can be inscribed according to the wishes of the donor. There is an information flyer in the bulletin.

There was a general cleanup of the grounds as well this past week. Some of the tree shoots along the perimeter of the property were cut down to allow the established trees to have better growing conditions. The two trees in the island by the Church entrance were topped so as not to impede the light that is on the pole.

And the tulip and daffodil bulbs are beginning to pop through the earth. *Progress!*

JUSTICE & PEACE

We are now in the second week of Lent. Today we will talk about Paul and his conversion. While on the road to Damascus Paul met the Risen Lord himself. Jesus spoke to him as a brother using his Jewish name Saul, rather than Paul. Jesus asked him "Why do you persecute me?" Jesus revealed to Paul that the violence he was committing was against Jesus himself. Paul never got over the implications of these words: "I am Jesus whom you are persecuting." Paul never tried to cover up his former life. He incorporated the truth about himself into his message. He talked about his former life and how he persecuted the church of God beyond measure and tried to destroy it. Seized by truth and forced to change, he did not allow guilt and remorse to paralyze him. Rather he permitted the forgiveness of Christ to make a new man out of him.

What does all mean in terms of justice and peace? What would it take for you and me to become a Christian like Paul, so aligned with Christ's life the resemblance is unmistakable. Lent is an excellent time to think about our life. What are we headed for? Can we say at the end of our life as Paul said "The time of my departure is at hand. I have competed well, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith." (2 Timothy 4;6-7). Lent is the time to look at our life and change what has to be changed. When it is our time to go, God will say welcome home. *To be continued*.


