BAPTISM—As soon as your child is born, please call the Church Office to make Baptism arrangements. Preparation session and welcoming Mass attendance are required.



A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Matthew:

When Jesus heard of the death of John the Baptist, he withdrew in a boat to a deserted place by himself. The crowds heard of this and followed him on foot from their towns. When he disembarked and saw the vast crowd. his heart was moved with pity for them, and he cured their sick. When it was evening, the disciples approached him and said, "This is a deserted place and it is already late; dismiss the crowds so that they can go to the villages and buy food for themselves." Jesus said to them, "There is no need for them to go away; give them some food yourselves." But they said to him, "Five loaves and two fish are all we have here." Then he said, "Bring them here to me," and he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, and looking up to heaven, he said the blessing, broke the loaves, and gave them to the disciples, who in turn gave them to the crowds. They all ate and were satisfied, and they picked up the fragments left over-twelve wicker baskets full. Those who ate were about five thousand men, not counting women and children.

Focus Questions:

- 1. Describe a time when, like Jesus, despite being saddened by a loss you still had people who depended on you. How did you respond?
- 2. Relate an experience when you were overwhelmed by the generosity of others.
- 3. How do you continue the mission of Jesus to feed the poor and hungry?

Family and children's question:

Many times the food pantry of our parish outreach is low this time of year. Talk about how as family you can help the poor and hungry by donating food, perhaps even from your own garden!

OUR LITURGY FOR SUNDAY—Today we hear the last of the parables of the Kingdom. With each parable Jesus reveals a little more of what God is like, how God sees, what God values. Or like a net cast into the sea whose catch must then be sorted to find what is of value. Each image is an invitation to us to enter more deeply into the mystery of God's love.

JUSTICE & PEACE

Continuing from last week on faithful citizenship. As Catholic Christians we should be aware of certain moral priorities for public life. Human life is sacred and an inviolable gift from God. It is our duty to protect life from the moment of concep-

tion to the conclusion of life by natural death. Today we are faced with abortion and euthanasia. These, along with assisted suicide, are assaults on human life that are never justified. Terrorist attacks are also always wrong. Catholic teaching also calls us to work to avoid war. Military force should always be the last resort and should only be used for the common good of all. The Church has concerns about the sale of arms. The death penalty is another moral issue we face. Society has the right and duty to protect its citizens against violent crimes and to reach out to the victims. Pope John Paul II said that the death penalty is "both cruel and unnecessary". The answer to violence is not more violence. The Church has concerns over the judicial system. There is a disproportionate number of Blacks and Hispanics in our prison system. The issue of social justice has to be addressed.

What does this all mean in terms of justice and peace? These are issues that have to be looked at and corrected in our society. It is up to us to see that our legislators take action. *To be continued*.

GETTING READY FOR THE NEW ROMAN MISSAL

(Over the coming month's we will publish information pertaining to the Roman Missal that will become effective with the First Sunday of Advent).

THE SUNDAY EUCHARIST

The primary way in which we celebrate the Lord's Day is with our participation in the Sunday Eucharist. What better way to celebrate the Resurrection of the Lord than by celebration of the memorial of his Passion, death, and Resurrection?

This celebration is not a solitary, private event. Instead, we come together as the People of God, the Church, to worship with one heart and one voice. The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) teaches that "participation in the communal celebration of the Sunday Eucharist is a testimony of belonging and of being faithful to Christ and to his Church" (CCC, no. 2182).

When members of our church community are absent from this gathering, they are missed. No member of the faithful should be absent from the Sunday Eucharist without a serious reason.

The Liturgy should be the first thing on Sunday's schedule, not the last. We should arrive on time, prepared in mind and heart to fully participate in the Mass. Those who cannot attend because of illness or the need to care for infants or the sick deserve our prayers and special attention.

Often, people will suggest that going to Sunday Mass is not necessary. After all, they can pray at home just as well. This has clearly been an issue in the Church for more than a millennium. In the fourth century, St. John Chrysostom addressed this problem directly:

You cannot pray at home as at church, where there is a great

multitude, where exclamations are cried out to God as from one great heart, and where there is something more: the union of minds, the accord of souls, the bond of charity, the prayers of the priests.

Private prayer, though essential to the spiritual life, can never replace the celebration of the eucharistic Liturgy and the reception of Holy Communion. In some communities, the lack of priests makes it impossible to celebrate the Eucharist each Sunday. In such instances, the bishop may make provision for these parish communities to gather and celebrate the Liturgy of the Word or the Liturgy of the Hours. These Sunday celebrations in the absence of a priest may or may not include the reception of Holy Communion. Still, these celebrations allow the People of God to gather and keep holy the Lord's Day.
