A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Matthew:

Peter approached Jesus and asked him, "Lord, if my brother sins against me, how often must I forgive? As many as seven times?" Jesus answered, "I say to you, not seven times but seventy-seven times. That is why the kingdom of heaven may be likened to a king who decided to settle accounts with his servants. When he began the accounting, a debtor was brought before him who owed him a huge amount. Since he had no way of paying it back, his master ordered him to be sold, along with his wife, his children, and all his property, in payment of the debt. At that, the servant fell down, did him homage, and said, 'Be patient with me, and I will pay you back in full.' Moved with compassion the master of that servant let him go and forgave him the loan. When that servant had left, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him a much smaller amount. He seized him and started to choke him, demanding, 'Pay back what you owe.' Falling to his knees, his fellow servant begged him, 'Be patient with me, and I will pay you back.' But he refused. Instead, he had the fellow servant put in prison until he paid back the debt. Now when his fellow servants saw what had happened, they were deeply disturbed, and went to their master and reported the whole affair. His master summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked servant! I forgave you your entire debt because you begged me to. Should you not have had pity on your fellow servant, as I had pity on you?' Then in anger his master handed him over to the torturers until he should pay back the whole debt. So will my heavenly Father do to you, unless each of you forgives your brother from your heart."

Focus Questions:

- 1) Describe a time when you were forgiven. What was your reaction?
- 2) What do you find difficult to forgive?
- 3) How does the notion of a merciful God conflict with your notion of justice at times?

Family and children's question:

Talk about the ways you can practice the virtue of mercy by forgiving others' faults, looking at another point of view, trying to find the good in others, especially those you do not like.

FROM FR. MIDURA

OUR LITURGY FOR SUNDAY—In our second reading today, St. Paul tells us that loving each other will help us keep all the other commandments, because then we will not steal or covet or cheat or lie or do anything else contrary to God's will. In the first reading we hear that sometimes loving means we must confront someone. And in the Gospel, Jesus teaches us the rules for confrontation. Let us ready ourselves to listen to God's word to us and apply it to our lives.

REMEMBERING SEPTEMBER 11—As we remember the 10th Anniversary of that tragic day next weekend we will include all those who lost their lives and those who lost loved ones in the general intentions. At the 9:15am Mass we will include specific names of people if you wish to provide them

Last year many more came forth to help make it happen and we can do the same thing this year. Mark the date on your calendars! We need to know who is coming. deposit for each person attending. When you arrive at the park,

you will get your entire deposit back.

WHAT'S HAPPENING AROUND OUR FACILITY—The Bad News! Hurricane Irene left its mark at St. Thomas More last weekend. Like most others we lost our power. Because of the power loss, we had to discard the freezer and refrigerator contents of Outreach. (There wasn't much because our supplies are low anyway). We had no phone service since the control system operates on electricity. The large locust tree next to the garage at Outreach/Religious Ed toppled on to the roof of the garage and collapsed part of the roof. (We had the new roof installed the previous Tuesday). The large locust tree next to the rectory did not want to be outdone by the locust next to Outreach and decided to topple onto the rectory roof. There were about five resulting punctures to the rectory roof. The mall by the parking lot lost about 12 trees and did minor damage to the Stations of the Cross. Apparently there was a "twister" type of wind burst that occurred around 10am on Sunday because three houses on Kings Highway and the corner of Simeon Woods Road had tall and large trees come down at the same time.

The Better News! - We were able to secure and tree service immediately to remove the fallen trees and to cut away the trees that fell onto the rectory and the Religious Ed building. A carpenter from the parish repaired the damaged portion of the garage roof and the roofer repaired the shingles and also secured the puncture holes on the rectory roof. A parishioner got us a dumpster when we needed it. A parishioner who is a landscaper spent two days cutting up the fallen trees and cleaning up the mall area of other debris. A stump grinder tended to the stumps from the fallen trees. Thanks to the young people of our parish, they spent almost two full days helping move the wood and fill in the stump holes with soil. Without all of these people we would not have accomplished what was accomplished.

Now we have to repair and install the Stations of the Cross. We will figure out what to do to enhance the mall area. We thank those who came by to lend help or to give moral support to everyone who was working hard at the damage sites. The parking lot drains seemed to absorb the storm water more quickly then before they were serviced. Even though there was

a pond, it did not last as long as in the past.

Fortunately, there were no noticeable leaks in the Church or the rest of the parish center. The geese stayed away so they would not get their feet wet. *Progress!*

GETTING READY FOR THE NEW ROMAN MISSAL

The Eucharistic Prayer or Canon of the Mass is the central prayer of the entire celebration. Most Catholics have been made aware from their earliest days that during the Eucharistic Prayer the bread and wine are transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ. What many Catholics are not aware of, however, is that the Eucharistic Prayer is about more than adoring Christ who becomes present in our midst.

The Church tells us that liturgy (and the Mass is the highpoint and heart of liturgy) is the action of Christ the priest and His Body, the Church. In the celebration of Mass, during the Eucharistic Prayer, not only does Christ become present, body and blood, soul and divinity, under the forms of bread and wine, but Christ's saving action, His passion, death and resurrection are once again enacted and offered to the Father by Christ Himself in the person of the priest, and by all present.

This is a truth of enormous significance!. This action of Christ which brought about our redemption from sin and eternal death, offered once for all on Calvary, becomes present again for us, here and now, in this time and place, so that we can join in Christ's perfect offering and can ourselves participate in His perfect worship.

Read carefully any of the Eucharistic Prayers. You will see that that prayer is offered, not to Christ, but to the Father: Father, you are holy indeed ...; Father, we bring you these gifts ...; Father, we ask you It is worship offered to the Father by Christ as it was at the moment of His passion, death and resurrection, but now it is offered through the priest acting in the person of Christ, and it is offered as well by all of us who are part of Christ's Body, the Church. This is the action of Christ's Body, the Church at Mass.

When the priest prays this prayer he prays we bring you these gifts; we ask you ...; we offer. That we signifies that all the baptized present at this Eucharistic celebration make this offering in union with Christ, pray this prayer in union with Him. And what is most important, we do not offer Christ alone; we are called to offer ourselves, our lives, our individual efforts to grow more like Christ and our efforts as a community of believers to spread God's Word and to serve God's people, to the Father in union with Christ through the hands of the priest. Most wonderful of all, although our offering is in itself imperfect, joined with the offering of

Christ it becomes perfect praise and thanks giving to the Father.

And so, during the Eucharistic Prayer at Mass, we have more to do than to look forward to the moment of consecration and remain there while the prayer of the priest continues. Before the consecration we join in the prayer of praise and thanksgiving to the Father known as the Preface and affirm that praise and thanks giving in our singing of the Holy, Holy, Holy. Following the Consecration we join together in the Memorial Acclamation which proclaims our common faith in Christ's real presence and is an acclamation expressing our gratitude to Christ for His wonderful gift of salvation. But then our prayer moves on and we are called to offer Christ, and ourselves with Christ to the Father: 'We offer to you, Father, this holy and living sacrifice...' and to pray with the priest that 'we who are nourished by His Body and Blood may be filled with the Holy Spirit and become one body, one spirit in Christ...'; we then join our prayers with the prayers of the Blessed Virgin Mary and all the saints for our Holy Father the Pope, our bishops and clergy and all God's people, living and dead. At the conclusion of the Eucharistic Prayer the priest sums up all that has gone before: 'Through Him (Christ), with Him (Christ), in Him 'Christ) in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honor is yours, almighty Father, forever and ever.' And we who are privileged to make our own offering through, with and in Christ, respond with the most important acclamation of the Mass, the great AMEN by which we profess the action of Christ to be our action as well.
