BAPTISM—As soon as your child is born, please call the Church Office to make Baptism arrangements. Preparation session and welcoming Mass attendance are required.



Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

October 2, 2011 Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time Isaiah 5:1-7 Psalm 80-9, 12, 13-14, 15-16, 19-20 Philippians 4: 6-9 Matthew 21:33-43

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Matthew:

Jesus said to the chief priests and the elders of the people: "Hear another parable. There was a landowner who planted a vineyard, put a hedge around it, dug a wine press in it, and built a tower. Then he leased it to tenants and went on a journey. When vintage time drew near, he sent his servants to the tenants to obtain his produce. But the tenants seized the servants and one they beat, another they killed, and a third they stoned. Again he sent other servants, more numerous than the first ones, but they treated them in the same way. Finally, he sent his son to them, thinking, 'They will respect my son.' But when the tenants saw the son, they said to one another, 'This is the heir. Come, let us kill him and acquire his inheritance.' They seized him, threw him out of the vinevard, and killed him. What will the owner of the vineyard do to those tenants when he comes?" They answered him, "He will put those wretched men to a wretched death and lease his vineyard to other tenants who will give him the produce at the proper times." Jesus said to them, "Did you never read in the Scriptures: The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; by the Lord has this been done, and it is wonderful in our eyes? Therefore, I say to you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that will produce its fruit."

Focus Questions:

1) Jesus continued to try to reach those who rejected his message. Describe a time when you did not give up trying to convince someone that God loved them.

2) Relate an experience when you refused an invitation that you know you should have accepted.

3) Describe a time when felt an invitation from God. What did you feel called to do?

Family and children's question:

What do your parents do for you that shows you how much they love you? What does God do that shows you he loves you?

However, when the delivery came, it looked like the shipment had been on the "Mythbusters" show and had been dropped from a six story skyscraper or was shot through the air with a catapult. It had to go back and another is being shipped. We will have tulips and daffodils arriving next month that will be planted around the property so that we can enjoy them in the Spring. One of our parishioners will donate 300 of them! Plans are in place to remove the shingles from the rectory roof this week and replace them with new ones. We had the damage from the hurricane and it is best to secure everything with a new roof in anticipation for the Winter. Also, the geese do not like the color blue! *Progress*!

PRIESTS' RETIREMENT COLLECTION—The annual Priests' Retirement Collection will take place in all parishes in the Diocese of Rockville Centre this weekend. Our continued goal is to close the gap between the operating expenses at St. Pius X Retirement Residence at Dominican Village and the current funding (provided by the Diocese and resident priests). Any monies received through this collection above and beyond the need for St. Pius X will be applied to the Priests' Sickness, Disability and Retirement Fund, with the aim of controlling the premium on priests' pension plans.

LEVEL ONE CHILDREN—The children who participate in the Level One program in our Religious Ed program are required to fulfill saying their prayers (Our Father, Hail Mary, Glory Be and the Sign of the Cross) from memory before Father Midura or one of the deacons before they enter the Second Level which is the prep level for First Holy Communion.
