WHAT'S HAPPENING AROUND OUR FACILITY—We are having an engineering study pertaining to the eventual replacement of the HVAC units that power the meeting room and area by the kitchen in Walden Hall. These two units are most likely original equipment and have served St. Thomas More well. However, parts are becoming hard to find. Last Fall one of the units needed a new control switch. Try finding something to fit an Edsel today. I am sure that the part originally retailed for about \$100. We paid \$1,200. Once the engineering study is complete, we will decide on a replacement schedule, probably sometime late next Spring.

We also received preliminary ideas in regards to re-doing the kitchen in Walden Hall. The existing stove is inadequate and needs to be replaced. The cabinets are in poor shape. Rather than deal with the existing small space, we are looking to expand the kitchen and make it more functional. Gutters for the Religious Ed building will be installed in the very near future which will pretty much complete the repairs of the damage caused by Hurricane Irene. The snow blowers will go out for refurbishing in time for the first snow storm. After all, we have only two months until we see snow! In case you did not read it last week, we ask everyone to exercise vigilance around the Church. There are some who are

exercise vigilance around the Church. There are some who are preying on vehicles that are left unlocked. There are some who go "shopping" in the Church and Parish Center. Whatever is not nailed down is presumed to be one's property for the taking! So please protect your property and do not provide a temptation to those whose value system needs and adjustment. *Progress!*

JUSTICE & PEACE

Continuing from last week. We left off by saying that the Gospel has to be read through the eyes of the poor. We are a product of Western civilization. Their focus was on power, the complete opposite of what Jesus proclaimed. Their faith came from the head whereas the poor developed a faith from the heart. Good theology is important but spirituality is above everything else. It was the priests and theologians of his time who killed Jesus. The ones who accepted Him were the lepers, the poor, the prostitutes, the powerless, and the disenfranchised. Truth isn't where we suppose. In Matt. 19:30 Jesus says, be prepared for the surprise "that the first shall be last, and the last shall be first."

What does this all mean in terms of justice and peace? Spirituality goes hand in hand with social justice. It is not easy to integrate spirituality and commitment to social justice issues. We have to learn to let go of some preconceived notions. A good example is the base communities of South America. They are having an effect on their governments. When people are on a serious inner journey to their own powerlessness and are in contact with the powerless men and women of the world, then community will result and great things will be accomplished in terms of justice and peace. *To be continued*.
