BAPTISM—As soon as your child is born, please call the Church Office to make Baptism arrangements. Preparation session and welcoming Mass attendance are required.



Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

March 18, 2012 Fourth Sunday of Lent 2 Corinthians 36:14-16, 19-23 Psalm 137: 1-2, 3, 4-5, 6 Ephesians 2:4-10 John 3:14-21

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to John:

Jesus said to Nicodemus: "Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, so that everyone who believes in him may have eternal life." For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life.

For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him. Whoever believes in him will not be condemned, but whoever does not believe has already been condemned, because he has not believed in the name of the only Son of God. And this is the verdict, that the light came into the world, but people preferred darkness to light, because their works were evil. For everyone who does wicked things hates the light and does not come toward the light, so that his works might not be exposed. But whoever lives the truth comes to the light, so that his works may be clearly seen as done in God.

Focus Questions:

1) How do you respond when you hear the words: "for God so loved the world that he his only Son that whoever believes in him may not die but may have eternal life"?

2) Describe a time when you were without light. How did it make appreciate light in your world?

3) What areas of your life need the light of Christ?

Family and Children's Question:

Describe someone who lights up a room when they come in. What qualities do they have that you try to imitate?

FROM FR. MIDURA

OUR LITURGY FOR SUNDAY-In today's Gospel we hear a story that might be confusing, even shocking. It is the story of the anger of Jesus at those who were buying and selling in front of the Temple. Some scripture scholars think that Jesus was so angry because the moneychangers were cheating the poor and that their love of money defied the first commandment, "You shall not have other gods besides me." Remembering those false gods that we put before the one true God, let us ask for mercy and forgiveness.

SACRAMENT OF THE ANOINTING OF THE SICK will be conferred next Sunday, March 18, during the 10:45am Mass. All those in need of the healing of Jesus are invited to celebrate the Sacrament.

THE SEASON OF LENT—We have daily Mass at 9am. We have Stations of the Cross every Lenten Friday at 7pm in the Church. We offer the Sacrament of Penance every Saturday at 4pm and also on Saturday, March 24, at 10:30am and starting at 3:30pm.

The traditional penitential practices for the faithful people of God are expressed through prayer, fasting and almsgiving. A "nail" is available for pickup in the lobby to be carried with you throughout the season of Lent as a reminder of the Passion and Death of the Lord and a reminder of our Lenten penitential practices. Bring it back during Holy Week and place it in the cross that will be in the lobby of the Church.

Let us pray for one another during the season of Lent. LENTEN GUIDELINES

Meatless Days—Those who are 14 years of age and over are to abstain from eating meat on all Fridays of Lent, as well as on Good Friday.

Fasting—On Good Friday, those between the ages of 18 and 59 limit themselves to one full meal and eat nothing between meals. Those other meals are light meals.
