BAPTISM—As soon as your child is born, please call the Church Office to make Baptism arrangements. Preparation session and welcoming Mass attendance are required.



FROM FR. MIDURA

OUR LITURGY FOR SUNDAY—In today's Gospel we hear a sad condemnation — that the light came into the world, but that people preferred the darkness. Lent is a time to acknowledge our own personal struggles with darkness and ask for God's the light. We begin our worship asking each other for prayer.

THE SEASON OF LENT—We have daily Mass at 9am. We have Stations of the Cross every Lenten Friday at 7pm in the Church. We offer the Sacrament of Penance every Saturday at 4pm and also on Saturday, March 24, at 10:30am and starting at 3:30pm.

The traditional penitential practices for the faithful people of God are expressed through prayer, fasting and almsgiving. A "nail" is available for pickup in the lobby to be carried

with you throughout the season of Lent as a reminder of the Passion and Death of the Lord and a reminder of our Lenten penitential practices. Bring it back during Holy Week and place it in the cross that will be in the lobby of the Church. Let us pray for one another during the season of Lent.

LENTEN GUIDELINES—

Meatless Days—Those who are 14 years of age and over are to abstain from eating meat on all Fridays of Lent, as well as on Good Friday.

Fasting—On Good Friday, those between the ages of 18 and 59 limit themselves to one full meal and eat nothing between meals. Those other meals are light meals.

WHAT'S HAPPENING AROUND OUR FACILITY – We are happy to welcome Chloe as a volunteer at St. Thomas More. Chloe is a canine who loves to exercise while coaxing the geese to move upward and onward. Since she has become a regular, we hope the geese cease being regulars at St. Thomas More.

- 5) Crucifixion and Death of Jesus.

Luminous Mysteries (Thursdays)

- 1) Baptism of Jesus in the Jordan River.
- 2) First Miracle of Jesus—The Wedding at Cana.
- 3) Jesus sends forth the Disciples.
- 4) Transfiguration of Jesus.
- 5) Institution of the Eucharist and the Last Supper.
