A NOTE FROM FR. BRIAN

Not too long ago I had a conversation with a high school junior who was getting ready to begin the process of visiting college campuses with her parents. She had a list of five or six schools which she was considering attending after high school. She explained to me that some were local and others were as far away as Chicago. While she was sure about what she wanted to study, she hadn't decided whether she wants to stay at home or go away. She asked me what I thought and I told her there were plusses and minuses to both possibilities and lots of factors to consider before making the decision. I did tell her that, for me, one benefit of going away to college was that it gave me a real appreciation for all that I left behind, namely, my family. I explained to her that sometimes, it takes being

away from the good that God gives us before we appreciate all that we have. I guess the challenge is to appreciate it all before it's too late. In these past few weeks, since I've been at St. Thomas, I've noticed things about this parish, great things, which if I were a "regular" here, I might have easily grown accustomed to. Here's just one...the altar servers. I will never forget the number of servers who participated in Fr. Midura's Mass of Transferral. That was amazing. What a tribute! I've told a number of priest friends about that night and those numbers and they were blown away. Clearly, something special and uncommon is happening in this parish with young people, particularly at Mass. The number of kids serving, lectoring and leading song is not typical and something to be proud of. Thank you to all the young people for being so committed to serving at Mass. There's no place more important, in a parish, to be, than at Sunday Mass and so many of you are doing it. It's also impressive to see so many from high school still serving. So often, kids call it quits by the time they reach middle school. For most, it's no longer cool or fun to be involved in "church stuff." Once again, the young people of St. Thomas are proving to be the exception. The witness of high school kids is powerful and very appreciated. Thanks for setting such a great example.
