A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Mark:

As Jesus was setting out on a journey, a man ran up, knelt down before him, and asked him, "Good teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus answered him, "Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. You know the commandments: You shall not kill; you shall not commit adultery; you shall not steal; you shall not bear false witness; you shall not defraud; honor your father and your mother." He replied and said to him, "Teacher, all of these I have observed from my youth." Jesus, looking at him, loved him and said to him, "You are lacking in one thing. Go, sell what you have, and give to the poor and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." At that statement his face fell, and he went away sad, for he had many possessions. Jesus looked around and said to his disciples, "How hard it is for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God!" The disciples were amazed at his words. So Jesus again said to them in reply, "Children, how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for one who is rich to enter the kingdom of God." They were exceedingly astonished and said among themselves, "Then who can be saved?" Jesus looked at them and said, "For human beings it is impossible, but not for God. All things are possible for God." Peter began to say to him, "We have given up everything and followed you." Jesus said, "Amen, I say to you, there is no one who has given up house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or lands for my sake and for the sake of the gospel who will not receive a hundred times more now in this present age: houses and brothers and sisters and mothers and children and lands, with persecutions, and eternal life in the age to come."

Focus Questions:

- 1. Share an experience when you felt like a child again. How does that relate to Jesus' admonition that disciples were to become like children?
- 2. Relate an experience of seeing a strong marriage that had an impact on your life.
- 3. Describe a time when a child helped you to see God.

Family and Children's Question:

Jesus will not let the disciples keep the children away from him. Talk abut how you try to stay close to Jesus.

A NOTE FROM FR. BRIAN

I'd like to share with you something that was shared with me recently. This appeared in the bulletin from SS. Phillip and James Church in St. James, last week. It was written by their pastor, Fr. Tony Stanganelli.

"A number of weeks ago, I had the opportunity of attending an 'open town meeting' at St. Thomas More Parish in Hauppauge. After the sad and unexpected death of the pastor of St. Thomas More, Monsignor Frank Midura, the people of the parish were convened in order to give them the opportunity to express what they would hope to see continue in their parish through the administration of a new pastor. As the dean of this area, I have the responsibility of recording the comments that are made at these meetings in order to make them available to the personnel assignment board and to the Bishop. I was first of all amazed at the tremendous turnout for the evening. The three hundred or so parishioners who attended represented various age groups and walks of life. I was even more impressed with the enthusiasm and joy which they voiced about belonging to their parish family. Not only did these people love their beloved pastor who had died, they loved their Church and wanted their parish to continue to grow and flourish in this new chapter of their history.

For a moment I imagined if someone from a different faith were to walk into that auditorium that night—or even a "lapsed" Catholic, who may not have darkened a church in years, were to experience that open "town meeting." I can imagine that they, were they given the opportunity, would want to sign up and join St. Thomas More in a heartbeat. These outsiders would have seen how faith is lived, it is celebrated, and it is made evident in the desire to serve others. These parishioners didn't see Church as an obligatory ritual that consumed (or even wasted) forty-five minutes of their precious time each weekend; these people saw Church as a fellowship whereby we help each other in the tough times and rejoice together in the good times."

I'd like to thank Fr. Tony for his words. He was able to say, in a few sentences, what I have had the privilege of witnessing

for these last ten weeks. I remember approaching St. Thomas, for the first time, the night of Fr. Frank's wake and seeing cars parked on the road down to the blinking lights near the ball field. I figured that there must have been a big game going on. Well, I was half right. There was no game, but what was going on was definitely big. It was, I think, just what Jesus intended when he gathered believers in His name 20 centuries ago. It was just what a Catholic parish is supposed to be about. Those parked cars represented a community of faith in action and to have been a part of that community, even for a few weeks, is something I'll remember forever. I'd like to thank all of you for your kindness and support during this time. This was my first crack at taking the reins of a parish and I couldn't have asked for a better place to begin. As you know Bishop Murphy has assigned Fr. Antony **Asir** to be the next pastor of St. Thomas More. Fr. Antony comes to us from St. Raphael Parish in East Meadow and is very excited to join this great community of faith. I ask that you pray for both of us as we begin new chapters in our lives. God bless you always.
