

October announces the change. Soon we will turn the clock back from summer to winter time. The hour we lost in summer will be gained in winter...thus one more hour to sleep. That is a good change. JUSTICE & PEACE

Over the next few weeks we will focus on the principles of (CST). Today we focus on other principles of CST.

Role of Government and Subsidiary "This principle holds that the functions of government should be preformed at the lowest level possible, as long as they can be performed adequately. When the needs in question cannot be adequately met at the lower level, then it is not only necessary, but imperative that higher levels of government intervene".

Economic Justice "Catholic teaching opposes collective and statistic economic approaches. But it also rejects the notion that a free market automatically produces justice. Distributive justice, for example, cannot be achieved by relying entirely on free market forces. Competition and free markets are useful elements of economic systems. However, markets must keep within limits, because there are many needs and goods that cannot be satisfied by the market system. It is the task of the state and all society to intervene and ensure that these needs are met".

Stewardship of God's Creation "The goods of the earth are gifts from God, and they are intended by God for the benefit of everyone. There is a "social mortgage" that guides our use of the world's goods, and we have a responsibility to care for these goods as stewards and trustees, not as mere consumers and users. How we treat the environment is a measure of our stewardship, a sign of our respect for the creator."

What does this all mean in terms of justice and peace? We have quoted from the U.S. Bishops because we want to be sure that people understand that what we say is authentic CST and is not the personal opinion of the writer. It all flows from the teachings of Jesus and the Church as to how we live and act in response to the messages.

The commercial area was just outside the shrine. Lourdes is so much bigger than Fatima. In the evening we went to a Candlelight and Rosary Procession. There were thousands of people. It was something to see. The one thing that impressed us is when we walked into the place where the Blessed Mother Mary was standing on the rock. She told Bernadette to dig and

the water appeared. Bernadette washed her face. The water is still there today and you can get the water there. The next day we got up very early and went to the baths. It was truly a wonderful experience. It is very private. We said a Hail Mary together. Two people help you into the pool. It felt wonderful. Those who went were overwhelmed. It was a grateful, humble experience. We saw so many really sick people, some in wheelchairs, others in bed. It was truly something to be there. This is the one place we wished we could have stayed another day. There is so much to be seen. We spent two days in Barcelona sightseeing and a stop Cathedral that has been under construction for many years. There is one chapel completed for Mass. It will take another twenty years to complete. The final tour was Montserrat, high up in the mountains. It was something to see. There was a lot of walking, up and down stairs, but very religious and nice to see. We had our last Mass there in a small chapel.
