A reading from the Holy Gospel according to John:

Jesus went to the Mount of Olives. But early in the morning he arrived again in the temple area, and all the people started coming to him, and he sat down and taught them. Then the scribes and the Pharisees brought a woman who had been caught in adultery and made her stand in the middle. FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends

In a 'Peanuts' cartoon, Charlie Brown tells Lucy about his birdhouse project: "Well I'm a lousy Carpenter. I can't nail straight. I can't saw straight, and I always split the wood. I'm nervous, I lack confidence. I have poor taste and absolutely no sense of design". And then in the last frame he concludes, "So, all things considered, it is coming along okay."

The message of today's Gospel is somewhat similar to what Charlie Brown says. It is the story of the Prodigal Son who has nothing in his favor to be his father's son again after having gone away from his father and squandered all his patrimony. But in the greater mercy of God it is all okay. He can come back to the loving embrace of his father not because he

deserves it but because the merciful father is waiting for him and ready to accept him when he returns.

Lent makes us realize God's mercy even though we don't deserve it. God's mercy does not grant license to continue to live in sin. It is an invitation to come to our senses as the Prodigal Son did so that we may understand that life in sin has diminished our identity, and returning to God, the Father will give us back our original rich identity as God's children.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession) is the most suitable way to return to the mercy of God. On Saturdays 3/16 and 3/23 confessions will be heard from 3:30 pm onwards. On 3/25 the Monday of Holy Week, confessions are from 3:00 pm to 9:00 pm. Let us return to God and enjoy the mercy of God and loom up from our diminished selves to the original self which God intends in each of us.

Agnus Dei – Lamb of God: After we exchange the sign of peace in the mass, we sing the prayer 'Lamb of God'. During Lent we sing the 'Lamb of God' in Latin '- Agnus Dei' (found in the hymn book # 861). The purpose of this change is not to turn us back to the Latin time of the Church. It is to highlight the liturgical action while we sing that hymn. The priest lifts the consecrated bread and breaks it to signify that this is Jesus who broke and gave himself on the cross for the salvation of all by forgiving sins. Lent is the time when we precisely remember and celebrate the Passion, Crucifixion, Death and Resurrection of Jesus. Changing from the English 'Lamb of God' to the Latin 'Agnus Dei' is our deliberate effort to highlight Jesus' offering on the Cross now celebrated in the breaking of the bread. Please join in the singing of Agnus Dei as you are encouraged to join in singing all the other hymns.

Our Lenten Project is to help the welfare of the Appalachians. Please place your donation in the little house on display in the lobby during the season of Lent.

Easter Baskets and Easter Flowers: Please take a look at the flyers for the Easter Baskets and the Easter Flowers. Outreach needs canned vegetables for the Easter basket. Your generosity is greatly appreciated. Proceeds from the flower sale by the Knights go to charity.

Catholic Relief Services Collection: This week, March 10, 2013, our parish will take up The Catholic Relief Services Collection. This Collection supports six Catholic agencies benefiting millions of vulnerable, displaced, and impoverished families and individuals around the world. The funds from this Collection make a real difference in lives across the globe
Stations of the Cross: On Lenten Fridays at 7:00 pm we pray 'Stations of the Cross' on various themes. We invite you to this prayer. This week on March 15th we will pray for those who struggle for peace. Let us pray for those in families, communities and countries struggling with acts of hatred and violence or wars. May their suffering bring peace soon by the grace of the Death and Resurrection of Jesus.

Special Lenten Reflections, Vespers and Benedictions: Last week on Tuesday March 5th we had Special Lenten Reflections with Vespers and Benediction. It was spiritually an empowering hour to realize how God empowers us to be holy and fully alive.
This week on Wednesday March 13th we will explore how prayer explains, illuminates and empowers life. Dr. Kathleen Andersen, an experienced Spiritual Counselor and Retreat Animator will lead us in this Lenten Reflection. All are welcome. Please make an effort to attend as it will enrich your Spiritual

Life.

Church Roof Shingles: When the workmen went on the roof to fix the unit that heats the church, they found that two large portion of shingles were blown away by hurricane Sandy and the recent snow storm. Thanks to your generous heart; your continued support for the maintenance of the Church enabled us to fix the problem speedily.

Catholic Ministries Appeal 2013: The Catholic Ministries Appeal is a charitable commitment to support both our own parish and the Diocese. In both aspects we help people. Your generosity to the Sunday collection allows St. Thomas More to meet its responsibilities in fulfilling the Mission of Evangelization and the Spiritual Care of the parish family.
