A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Matthew:

John the Baptist appeared, preaching in the desert of Judea and saying, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand!" It was of him that the prophet Isaiah had spoken when he said:

A voice of one crying out in the desert, Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths.

John wore clothing made of camel's hair and had a leather belt around his waist. His food was locusts and wild honey. At that time Jerusalem, all Judea, and the whole region around the Jordan were going out to him and were being baptized by him in the Jordan River as they acknowledged their sins.

When he saw many of the Pharisees and Sadducees coming to his baptism, he said to them, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath? Produce good fruit as evidence of your repentance. And do not presume to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our father.' For I tell you, God can raise up children to Abraham from these stones. Even now the ax lies at the root of the trees. Therefore every tree that does not bear good fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire. I am baptizing you with water, for repentance, but the one who is coming after me is mightier than I. I am not worthy to carry his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fan is in his hand. He will clear his threshing floor and gather his wheat into his barn, but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

- 3. What are the gifts of charity and service that you will be giving this Advent?

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Nasruddin was arrested and taken to court on the charge that he was stuffing horsemeat into the chicken cutlets he served at his restaurant.

This Sunday begins the season of Advent which is a time

of preparation to welcome Jesus at his birth among us on December 25. As in the story of Nasruddin above, this time of preparation (Advent) is disproportionately and commercially overloaded by Christmas displays at the stores, Christmas music on the radios, Christmas attractions in the surroundings. They rob the mood of preparing ourselves and thus realizing within our hearts the birth of Jesus.

Being overwhelmed by all these things before Christmas, our time of preparation (Advent) turns to be strenuous and tiresome. In order to give us a time of prayer and stillness of heart, we have planned various spiritual activities in our Church.

December 1st - at 3:30pm we have Lessons and Carols. An hour of singing and listening to the readings of God's mighty acts through history up to the birth of Christ. This is a prayerful way of getting into the mood of Advent.

December 4th and 11th—Wednesdays--7:00pm to 8:00pm - Advent Vespers and Benediction with short reflections. An hour before the Blessed Sacrament to quieten our hearts in the busy and crazy shopping season.

December 14^{th-} Saturday after the 5:00pm Mass-Christmas Tree Lighting with Santa. - A time to learn along with our children the true meaning of the real Christmas gift – becoming Santa to each other and giving the gift of God to each other.

December 17th--Tuesday after the 9:00am Mass and in the Evening at 7:00pm-- Advent Reflection with Sr. Pat Duffy O.P, Ph.D. - to draw us closer to the birth of Jesus in our hearts and homes.

This year on December 9th we celebrate the Solemn Feast of the Immaculate Conception because December 8th falls on a Sunday, when the celebration of our Lord's Resurrection takes precedence. The Feast of the Immaculate Conception is not a Holyday of obligation this year. On Monday December 9th there will be just one mass at 9:00am. The usual hour of adoration of the Blessed Sacrament that we have on Tuesday, will be held on Wednesday December 11th from 7:00pm to 8:00pm. We will pray for Life and its preservation in all stages from conception to death.



STEWARDSHIP AT ST THOMAS MORE

Surely you have heard of Justice and Peace – we hope the following article will give you an insight into the rewarding and necessary work of this very important ministry -

JUSTICE AND PEACE MINISTRY

People often ask, "what is Justice and Peace?" It is more than charity, it looks at the systemic root of the need for charity, e.g., why don't people have enough food to eat, or a safe place to live; or a job that will provide for their basic needs, and seeks to educate others on these issues.

Justice and Peace can best be illustrated by the story of the villagers who lived downstream from another village. One day, they found bodies floating down the river which then became a daily occurrence. Charity enabled the people to bury the bodies, but Justice and Peace led them to go upstream and fine the cause of the carnage, so that they might help to find a solution.

The work of Justice and Peace flows from Catholic Social Teaching, which originates from the Encyclicals of our Popes; the earliest issued in 1891 by Pope Leo XIII on "The Condition of Labor." Unfortunately, Catholic Social Teaching is also called the Church's "Best Kept Secret."

There are many paths that led me to this ministry: the values I learned in my family, my Catholic school education that taught me to question "why"; the dedication of our ministry members, as well as other such committees throughout the Diocese. So one day, even though I didn't have the time to "do" another thing, I asked to join our parish committee. It has been rewarding – and frustrating at the same time. When you see the world through the Justice and Peace lens, you realize that there is so much need, and change is slow. Advocating for those marginalized by our society is never popular and not always welcomed by those in authority. But, God's way of living in the world is through each of us. How can we say no to His command – "Love One Another."
