
MARRIAGE—As soon as a couple decides to marry, and BEFORE making any other arrangements, call the Church Office to schedule an appointment with one of the deacons.

Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

March 30, 2014 Fourth Sunday of Lent 1 Samuel 16:1b, 6-7, 10-13a Psalm 23:1-3a, 3b-4, 5, 6 Ephesians 5:8-14 John 9:1, 6-9, 13-17, 34-38

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to John:

As Jesus passed by he saw a man blind from birth. He spat on the ground and made clay with the saliva, and smeared the clay on his eyes, and said to him, "Go wash in the Pool of Siloam" — which means Sent —.So he went and washed, and came back able to see.

His neighbors and those who had seen him earlier as a beggar said, "Isn't this the one who used to sit and beg?" Some said, "It is, " but others said, "No, he just looks like him." He said, "I am."

They brought the one who was once blind to the Pharisees. Now Jesus had made clay and opened his eyes on a sabbath. So then the Pharisees also asked him how he was able to see. He said to them, "He put clay on my eyes, and I washed, and now I can see." So some of the Pharisees said, "This man is not from God, because he does not keep the sabbath." But others said, "How can a sinful man do such signs?" And there was a division among them. So they said to the blind man again, "What do you have to say about him, since he opened your eyes?" He said, "He is a prophet."

They answered and said to him, "You were born totally in sin, and are you trying to teach us?" Then they threw him out.

When Jesus heard that they had thrown him out, he found him and said, "Do you believe in the Son of Man?" He answered and said, "Who is he, sir, that I may believe in him?" Jesus said to him, "You have seen him, and the one speaking with you is he."

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends.

In his Apostolic Exhortation 'Evangelii Gaudium' – The Joy of the Gospel – Pope Francis says that to be "a disciple means being constantly ready to bring the love of Jesus to others, and this can happen unexpectedly and in any place: on the street, in a city square, during work, on a journey....The first step is personal dialogue, when the other person speaks and shares his or her joys, hopes and concerns for loved ones, or so many other heartfelt needs. Only afterwards is it possible to bring up God's word, perhaps by

reading a Bible verse or relating a story..." (Paragraphs 127-128)

What Pope Francis says today is a summary of what Jesus did to the Samaritan woman in today's Gospel. Jesus is thirsty and the woman is coming to fetch water. He starts the conversation by asking her for water. In HIs conversation Jesus leads her step by step from her day today, to her personal life; from knowing Him as a Jew to accepting Him as the Messiah; from her own personal belief in Him to her bearing witness to her whole village to believe in Him.

Jesus started a simple conversation of asking for water for His thirst and ends by becoming life giving water to her and her village. If we have the zeal and the Spirit of Jesus in us, whatever we start as a simple, regular conversation with others will grow towards experiencing Jesus in our midst. If we have Jesus in us, and begin to do things as Jesus would do in us, then whatever we do or say will become deeds and words of Jesus.

The Stations of the Cross is prayed every Friday at 7:00 pm for a specific intention. This Friday March 28 we pray for those who are battling and suffering from any type of addiction.

Soup Supper and Stations of the Cross: On Friday, April 11th we will pray the Stations for those who hunger for food, love and meaning for life. In order to set the mood for this theme, at 6:00 pm we will start with only soup as our evening meal so as to be united with those who suffer hunger. Then at 7:00 pm we will turn our experience of hunger into praying the Stations for those who hunger. All are welcome. If you are able to attend, please fill the form in the bulletin and bring a meatless soup to share with others.

<u>Lenten Project – St. Michael's Cathedral Church</u>, Coimbatore, India – The Church of my Ordination.

This year I request the parish to help my home diocese in Coimbatore, India. Last September when I spent my vacation with my mom in India, I had the opportunity to visit the Cathedral parish where I was ordained a priest and served as an associate for two years. The township issued an order to pull down the cathedral church built by French missionaries 150 years ago as it was not safe in which to worship anymore. The masses and services were celebrated in a tent, which held 300 worshipers and the rest of the congregation stood outside the tent throughout the entire mass.

The parishioners along with their pastor and bishop have requested our help to build the new Church. You can view some pictures in the narthex of the present tent-church and people at work. The Catholics in India are just 1.5% of the population. The parishioners of this Cathedral church need close to 3 million dollars to build the Cathedral both for their parish and for the bigger

congregations during diocesan celebrations. Being few in number and financially not strong enough to meet the cost. they extend their hands to us for help.

I felt that as my home diocese is generous to share me, their priest, with us for our spiritual needs here, we can share with them a little of what we can afford as a sign of our generosity towards them. Please consider this Lenten Project. I recommend you my people to help them, who continue to be my people since 1982.

We need volunteers to organize events for our Parish Feast - The Feast of St. Thomas More is on the weekend of June 21-22. If you are willing to volunteer, please know that your commitment is for this event only If you are interested in helping us, please call the rectory. We need you and your service to help celebrate this family feast.

Catholics for Freedom of Religion:

The Supreme Court will hear two important cases on March 25 about the HHS Mandate and the plaintiffs for religious freedom. The government argues that religious owners of family owned businesses must divorce their faith from their business. The Beckett Fund religious liberty law group responds that the government cannot "force families to abandon their faith just to earn a living".

The government appeared to somewhat recant their position last week when the religious liberty advocates announced a lawsuit on behalf of a Muslim public school official forced to choose between his faith and his job. The government issued a statement through EEOC Philadelphia District Office director, Spencer Lewis Jr. who said, "No employee should be forced to violate his religious beliefs in order to earn a living". SMALL FAITH SHARING GROUPS

It is over 20 years ago since St Thomas More Parish introduced small Faith Communities to our parish. They were initially called "small churches" or "small Christian communities." Groups of up to 12 people who meet in one another's homes, read the next Sunday's scriptures, and talk about how these readings relate to them and their lives. Refreshments usually are included. In addition, one or two representatives from each group meet quarterly to serve as a connection to the larger church.

As "factory" parishioners (members from the beginning of the parish) – my husband Ross and I attended Mass on Sunday and had been involved in spiritual and parish activities. Yet, once Mass was over, we felt we had fulfilled our "obligation" and it was perfectly okay for us to remain sitting in the pews, go home and live our lives. One day I got a call from Marilyn Miller who was involved in the initial process of beginning faith sharing groups or Small Church Communities (SCC) She was so enthusiastic – describing how we could increase our spirituality and connection to the weekly Gospel. Even more so, it was a way of belonging to a group striving to follow our parish mission without getting lost in the "crowd." The idea sounded great to us and we happily joined.

I cannot say enough about how much belonging to this small community has changed my life. We are now a group of seven who meet a few times a month. Other groups meet more or less frequently. We spend our evenings sharing our own personal responses to and questions about our faith. Each of the members of our group has added immensely to my growth as a person, each in his or her own way. I see each of them as a brother or sister in Christ.

If you want an opportunity to grow in your faith, belong to a group of committed prayerful people, and increase your personal spiritual growth, call me and I'll be happy to share my experience with you as well as tell you how to join a "Small Faith Sharing Group."


