Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

September 14, 2014
The Exaltation of the Holy Cross
Numbers 21:4b-9
Psalm 78:1bc-2, 34-35, 36-37, 38
Philippians 2:6-11
John 3:13-17

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to John:

Jesus said to Nicodemus:

“No one has gone up to heaven except the one who has come down from heaven, the Son of Man. And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, so that everyone who believes in him may have eternal life.”

For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him.

Focus Questions:

1. This Sunday focuses on lifting up of the Cross. Relate a time when you lifted someone's burden from them.
2. John 3:16 is a favorite verse for many people. What is your reaction when you hear that God loved the world so much that he sent his own son to save us?

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Today's Gospel deals with one of the practical problems of early Christian community. What to do when a member of the community does something wrong? How to deal with him? To throw him out of the community to punish the wrong? Or to forgive and accept him again in the community?

As we find in today's Gospel the community dealt with the problem in two ways. The first way is to reconcile with the wrong-doer on the basis of community's faith practice - that is to win back the wrong-doer by reconciling either individually or

through the community. But if the wrong-doer refuses to change himself then that person has to start once again from square one. That person begins again as an outsider (like pagan or tax collector) to convert to the expectation of the faith community.

The second way is the way of believing in the presence of Jesus. That is to find Jesus in the midst of conflicts - believing in the promise of Jesus that He is definitely present in the midst of two or three coming together in His Name. We may have conflicts of opinion or views but still we can come together for a higher experience of Jesus among us. Let us believe that we have higher presence of Jesus that can unite us than to indulge in our own selfish opinions or views which will divide us.

In Iraq Christians are persecuted and driven out from their homes. The bells of the churches which spread the sounds of faith for the last two millenniums has stopped ringing. Churches are destroyed or turned into mosques. They are killed and abused just for the reason of being Christians. They are living the divine expectations in their human capacities. They carry the cross of faith. Let us pray for them that they may have the strength and consolation of the faith in Jesus to live their faith in their most difficult time. May Jesus make their yoke of faith light and its burden easy.

As students stock their backpacks, they need to prepare an important back-to-school tool: knowledge of their religious liberty rights.

1. Students have the right to First Amendment protections in public schools. The First Amendment protects students' freedom of speech and freedom to express their religious beliefs. Just because they walk through the school doors does not mean students lose these rights. (libertyinstitute.org)

"Bless you". A Dyer County, Tenn., H.S. Senior received in-school suspension after breaking a class rule that prohibits saying "Bless you" after a classmate sneezed. "She (teacher) said that we're not going to have godly speaking in her class and that's when I said we have a constitutional right," said the student. (wdtprs.com, 8/20/14)

"Bless you." A Georgia college assistant professor has banned students saying "Bless you" when a classmate sneezes during his lecture. Students face 1% deductions to their final grade for each occurrence if the phrase slips out. (nydailynews.com, 8/27/14)

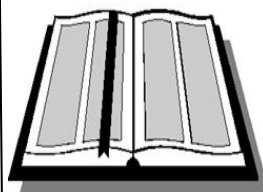
