RECONCILIATION—Celebrated in Church every Saturday from 4pm to 4:45pm, or by previous appointment with Parish Office.


SACRAMENT OF THE SICK—Call the Church Office to request visitation of the sick.

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Mark:

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Husband: Why do you weep and snuffle over a TV program and the imaginary woes of people you have never met?

Wife: For the same reason you scream and yell when a man you don't know makes a touchdown.

We are affected only by that of which we are conscious.

In the first reading, God was calling Samuel but he was consciously unaware of God's voice. He needed to be helped by Eli to recognize and hear God's voice.

In the Gospel, the first disciples wanted to know more of Jesus. Jesus invites them to 'come and see' him for themselves. Unless we open ourselves to God, God will always remain an abstract reality or unproven truth of endless discussion. Today's readings invite us to be conscious of and allow ourselves to grow in God-reality. God is to be experienced as a person, to be loved, to be seen, to be touched, to be lived with..... that is the reason Jesus invites his disciples to 'come and see'; to be with him and to experience him.

In Catholic tradition, our worship is not merely hearing the word of God but also celebrating his presence in the sacrament of the Eucharist which is to eat his body and drink his blood. Our worship is not only to hear his message but to take part in his flesh and blood. Worship is not merely hearing God's thoughts and ideas in the Bible readings but becoming one with him by eating his body and blood in the Eucharist.

The terroristic attacks in Paris have brought the world together in Paris vowing not to give up human freedom in the face of fear and insecurity. Paris also experiences world-wide support to fight against terrorism and fanaticism. In Paris the human community proclaims with a loud voice to stand for peace and prosperity of life. In the light of the tragedy in Paris, today's second reading tells us not to reduce God into rigid and fanatic religious practices, but to experience God in respecting humans as Temples of the Holy Spirit.

We are created after God's image and bear it within us. Each of us reflects and reveals God's presence in ourselves. Loving the other and helping the other to live well is the best worship one can render to God. Anything against any human person is certainly against God. As John the Apostle says, "If anyone says 'I love God', but hates his brother, he is a liar; for whoever does not love a brother whom he has seen cannot love God whom he has not seen." (1John4:20)

New Year Resolutions: are they going good so far? As we plan and resolve to make the best of the New Year in various ways, I would like to suggest how you can make our parish fiscally stable.

Thomas Jefferson, Founding Father and Third President of the U.S., valued this Statute so much that he ordered the epitaph on his tombstone to say, "Here is buried Thomas Jefferson, Author of the Declaration of Independence, of the Statute of Virginia for Religious Freedom, and Father of the University of Virginia.
