Fifth Sunday In Ordinary Time
Job 7:1-4, 6-7

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Mark:

On leaving the synagogue Jesus entered the house of Simon and Andrew with James and John. Simon’s mother-in-law lay sick with a fever. They immediately told him about her. He approached, grasped her hand, and helped her up. Then the fever left her and she waited on them.

When it was evening, after sunset, they brought to him all who were ill or possessed by demons. The whole town was gathered at the door. He cured many who were sick with various diseases, and he drove out many demons, not permitting them to speak because they knew him. Rising very early before dawn, he left and went off to a deserted place, where he prayed. Simon and those who were with him pursued him and on finding him said, “Everyone is looking for you.”

He told them, “Let us go on to the nearby villages that I may preach there also. For this purpose have I come.” So he went into their synagogues, preaching and driving out demons throughout the whole of Galilee.

3. Relate a time when you felt the power of Jesus in your life.

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

The husband boasted, "In my house, I make all the major decisions and my wife makes all minor ones. For example, I decide such things as East-West trade, crime in the streets, welfare cheating, and tax increases. My

wife decides the minor things such as which house to buy, what kind of car we drive, how much money to spend, how to raise the children, etc." Each one of us has some kind of authority, some more and some less. But all of us have inner spiritual authority in which we are unique and never inferior to anyone.

In today's Gospel people feel that Jesus' teaching unlike that of the Scribes is with authority. Jesus is neither a scribe specialized in Law, nor a Pharisee known for their meticulous observance of Law, nor a Sadducee politically and economically influential. He is an unknown carpenter from Nazareth. But people in the synagogue astonished at his teaching and experienced an authority in his words.

The teachings of the scribes, the Pharisees or Sadducees carried some authority because of the position and influence they had in society. But the teachings of Jesus come from his original self. His words do not carry any weight from the power or influence invested from outside. His authority is from within himself, from who he is.



Every one of us is created after God's image. We become God's children in our baptism. As God's children and bearing God's image in us, we all have inalienable and inbuilt God-given authority in us. Unless we decide to give up that authority, no one else can rob it from us. In the world of pluralistic opinions and multiple ways of living, let us not be misled or reduce ourselves by anything outside of us. Let us be aware of who we are. May our prayers and spiritual worships make us realize what kind of God-given authority we possess. May our lives be the expression of God-given authority.

This Sunday is Mardi Gras Sunday: We know Tuesday before Ash Wednesday is Mardi Gras (Grey/Fat Tuesday). But as a parish family we will celebrate Mardi Gras on February 15th, Sunday before Ash Wednesday. Come, have your last big Sunday breakfasts after all masses. Our Parish High School Youth Ministry is happy to host this event with Pancakes, Waffles, French toast, Eggs, Sausage, Hash Browns and Unlimited Complimentary Coffee; \$5.00 for a single person; children under 6 are free. All proceeds will be used to sponsor our teens going on retreats.

Catholic Ministry Appeal 2015: Our Parish's assessment this year is \$69,300. Last year we made 78.18% of our Goal. When we reach our goal we will get a rebate close to \$13,000. Thus our generosity will help others and our parish.

When the demand on Outreach goes beyond food and daily necessities, Outreach calls us. We contact the client and arrange to meet with them in their home. We help by paying bills, networking, finding jobs & temporary housing, providing clothes and necessary furniture.

What we have been doing: In the last few weeks, our conference has approved three more clothing vouchers for different families, paid a heating oil bill for a family in need, made a payment for someone's car insurance and approved furniture for another family. We have also received several calls for help from persons living in their cars as they cannot find a room or apartment to rent in our area.

What you can do: Support the conference. *All* of all your donations are used to help those in our community ... your donations stay right here! Although we have a close relationship with Outreach and we work hand in hand, our funds are separate from Outreach and require your support.

Words Matter!

Religious freedom watchdog groups are concerned that elected officials are changing terminology. They often refer to America's "freedom of worship" rather than the comprehensive term, "freedom of religion". "Freedom of Religion", our first and most fundamental God-given right, guarantees all Americans the freedom to practice our religion in the public square, and to live out our conscientiously held beliefs.

"Freedom of Worship", however, means the right to pray within the confines of a place or designated building of worship or to privately believe. It also excludes the right to practice our faith in families and communities as well as our education, charitable and healing missions.

Mission Statement

So that First Amendment Religious Freedom may be practiced and preserved for generations yet unborn it is essential that Americans understand this freedom and the circumstances from which it came. "Catholics For Freedom of Religion" provides resources to assist laity to educate and advocate on a non-partisan basis for First Amendment Freedom of Religion...how rare it is, how dearly it was purchased for us and how quickly it can be lost.
