Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

March 8, 2015 Third Sunday of Lent Exodus 17: 3-7 Psalm 95: 1-2, 6-7, 8-9 Romans 5: 1-2, 5-8 John 4: 5-42

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to John:

Jesus came to a town of Samaria called Sychar, near the plot of land that Jacob had given to his son Joseph. Jacob's well was there. Jesus, tired from his journey, sat down there at the well. It was about noon. A woman of Samaria came to draw water. Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink." His disciples had gone into the town to buy food. The Samaritan woman said to him, "How can you, a Jew, ask me, a Samaritan woman, for a drink?"

—For Jews use nothing in common with Samaritans.—Jesus answered and said to her, "If you knew the gift of God and who is saying to you, 'Give me a drink, 'you would have asked him and he would have given you living water." The woman said to him, "Sir, you do not even have a bucket and the cistern is deep; where then can you get this living water? Are you greater than our father Jacob, who gave us this cistern and drank from it himself with his children and his flocks?" Jesus answered and said to her, "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again; but whoever drinks the water I shall give will never thirst; the water I shall give will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life." The woman said to him, "Sir, give me this water, so that I may not be thirsty or have to keep coming here to draw water. "I can see that you are a prophet. Our ancestors worshiped on this mountain; but you people say that the place to worship is in Jerusalem."

Jesus said to her, "Believe me, woman, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem. You people worship what you do not understand; we worship what we understand, because salvation is from the Jews. But the hour is coming, and is now here, when true worshipers will worship the Father in Spirit and truth; and indeed the Father seeks such people to worship him. God is Spirit, and those who worship him must worship in Spirit and truth."

The woman said to him, "I know that the Messiah is coming, the one called the Christ; when he comes, he will tell us everything."

Jesus said to her, "I am he, the one who is speaking with you."

Many of the Samaritans of that town began to believe in him. When the Samaritans came to him, they invited him to stay with them; and he stayed there two days. Many more began to believe in him because of his word, and they said to the woman, "We no longer believe because of your word; for we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this is truly the savior of the world."

- 1. Where or when are you most in touch with the presence of God?
- 2. What has helped you to know Jesus better?.
- 3. Describe a time when you thirsted. Who helped you satisfy your thirst?.

How do you show kindness to someone who is shunned by others?

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Customer: I've come back to buy that television I was looking at yesterday.

Salesman: That's good. May I ask what was the one compelling reason that made you want this set?

Customer: My wife.

The readings of the Second Week of Lent ask us the same question, "What does compel us to do anything we do?" In the first reading Abraham was ready to sacrifice his only son Isaac. How could he dare that? Reading the whole story of Abraham we find that his faith in God was his compelling strength to go that far. His faith was that God who miraculously in his 100th year made him the father of Isaac would never disappoint him

even when he was put by God to the hardest test of sacrificing Isaac, his son. His faith in God gave Isaac back to him alive. **Today's Gospel story couples Jesus' glorious moment of transfiguration** to his ignominious moment of dying on the cross. How could the glorious Jesus accept to live through the shameful and painful moments on the cross? What was his compelling strength? His conscious realization that the Father who sent him would never abandon him but would raise him from death as victor over invincible death.

The second reading invites all of us to have the same unshakable faith in God. Faith is the basic and compelling force of life. Without faith no one will be able to live for the next moment. It is the faith that we have in each of us, in our family and friends, that makes life manageable. Ultimately it is the faith in God that fills us with the hopeful living force to live through any sufferings. If God is for us who can be against us? With faith we can walk through death and rise with Jesus. Faith in Jesus means we can win even death.

Persecuted Christians of Middle East: I felt it important to share with the parish excerpts from Bishop Murphy's letter to our brother priests. "The atrocities being inflicted on the populations of several countries in the Middle East and North Africa continue to mount. The growth of terrorism seems on the rise and Islamic terrorist groups, principally ISIS and Al Qaeda, continue to justify their brutal and barbaric actions by appeal to the Quran and to Islamic law. With no prejudice toward the peaceful Muslim communities on Long Island and around the world, we all, Christian, Muslim and all men and women of good will, must be one in condemning these atrocities and standing as one in defense of religious minorities throughout the world and especially in the countries of Middle East and North Africa.

As a local Church we continue to help the refugees of all faiths in Iraq, Syria and Jordan. Catholic Near East Welfare Association, where I am one of the five Bishop Board Members, continues to serve refugees in welcome centers, schools and hospitals. Our Diocese cooperates with the Holy See in sending money directly to Papal Representatives in those countries, sending whatever funds I can find to support the care they receive through their churches as well as through CRS. Thanks to the Holy See, we were able a few years ago to work with the Nuncio in Syria who gained the release of the body of a local woman journalist, Marie Colvin, who was killed by snipers while on assignment.

I want to thank all of you who have supported these and other efforts to aid the suffering. However we need also to let the President and the elected officials of our government in Washington know that greater effort and more committed action must be exercised by our leaders in concert with the international community to bring an end to this violence and hatred and to restore hope and tranquility to peoples and nations in the Middle East. True peace is ultimately a gift from God for which we will pray every day. But God expects us, our nation's leaders, along with all peace-loving peoples and nations, to be instruments of peace by rectifying injustice, strengthening bonds of friendship and guaranteeing that all peoples can live in peace and harmony. May Mary Help of Christians watch over and protect all her children in the Middle East and North Africa."

During Lent we pray the Stations of the Cross every Friday at

7:00 pm in the church for a particular intention. This Friday March 6th at 7:00 pm we will pray for those who are impacted by unforeseen events such as the snow and freezing weather, accidents, house fires and other unexpected challenges.

Pope Francis expressed, "profound sadness" and proclaimed the murdered men martyrs, saying they had been killed for their faith. They died "only because they confessed Christ," and their "testimony cries out to be heard." (nypost.com, 2/16/15)

Cardinal Dolan wrote, "They were beheaded for nothing less than their religious convictions. It moves me to prayers. It moves me to tears...as a Christian, but also as an American, who recognizes Freedom of Religion as our first and most cherished liberty.

"No denying it: There is an orchestrated phobia of Christianity throughout the world today, a coordinated effort on behalf of fanatics to see that the religion which stands for friendship, peace, the dignity of the human person and the sacredness of life, is stamped out.
"These are not sporadic attacks. This is part of ... an ideology that sees Christianity, Judaism, and any religion of peace, as the enemy." (www.nypost.com/2015/2/17/op-ed)

Synod of Bishop Lineamenta document

We have been requested to share the following communication from Mr. Sean Dolan, Director of Communications of the Diocese of Rockville Centre

The Extraordinary Synod of Bishops was held in October 2014 with the theme: "The Pastoral Challenges of the Family in the Context of Evangelization." This Extraordinary Synod will be followed by the Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops, October 4-25, 2015 with the theme: "The Vocation and Mission of the Family in the Church and in the Contemporary World." The final document of the Extraordinary Synod, the Relatio Synodi, is the preparatory document or "Lineamenta" of the XIV Ordinary General Assembly. As is customary in the synod process, His Eminence, Cardinal Lorenzo Baldisseri, the General Secretary of the Synod of Bishops invites consultation on this topic to help with its preparation.

Contained within this Preparatory Document which was issued by the Holy See to begin this process is a series of questions. This document can be found at http://www.vatican.va/roman_curia/synod/documents/rc_synod_doc_20141209_lineamenta-xiv-assembly_en.html. It is also available by clicking on the "Synod of Bishops" icon on the index page of our diocesan website — drvc.org. Bishop Murphy is welcoming responses to these questions from the faithful of the Diocese of Rockville Centre, and you are invited to read the entire document before responding.

If you, our parishioners wish to respond to any or all of the questions, please be mindful of the following guidelines:

- 1. Only E-mail responses sent to synodofbishops@drvc.org will be accepted.
- 2. Only E-mail responses that include the respondent's name and parish will be accepted.
- 3. Responses will be accepted in the languages the Lineamenta is available in from the Vatican that is: English, Spanish, French, Italian, German and Portuguese.
- 4. Thank you in advance for not sending faxes, mailed, printed or handwritten documents. They will not be accepted.

- 5. The questions to address upon reflection are those found in the Preparatory Document and may be found on the Vatican website: http://www.vatican.va/roman curia/synod/documents/ rc synod doc 20141209 lineamenta-xiv-assembly en.html
- 6. When responding, specific reference must be given to the question number. So, for instance, if one is responding to question 3 in the Preparatory Document, that fact should be clearly indicated in the response.
- 7. All responses must be received by March 13, 2015.
