FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends.

Little Jim knelt before his bed and prayed, "Dear God, if you can find some way to put the vitamins in candy and ice cream instead of in spinach and cod liver oil, I would sure appreciate it. Amen."

Bitter pill coated with sugar is easy to swallow. Sugarcoating is only a device but the pill, though bitter, is the real stuff needed for health.

Today's Gospel reading invites us to live our real stuff, not the sugar-coated stuff. When Jesus sent his twelve disciples investing his authority upon them he instructed them to take nothing but sandals and a walking stick for the journey – no food, no bag, no money. He sent them with the bare minimum. The message is that he wanted them to depend totally on the authority he invested in them – a radical dependence on the power of the person who sends them.

Our life is neither an accident nor an attempt to keep us alive as long as we can.

The second reading describes our identity. We have been blessed and chosen by God to be God's children. God has lavished riches of divine grace upon us, which means we lack nothing to live our life in God's way.

Like the disciples we are called to be conscious of God's choice and grace upon us. When this consciousness pervades all that we say or do, we become God's mission; our life becomes a journey sent by God for which we might need the bare minimum. We may need just the sandals and walking stick as the Gospel narrates. As Jesus says in the sermon on the mount, ..."do not worry and say, 'what are we to eat?' or 'what are we to drink?' or 'what are we to wear?'.....seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness and all these things will be given you besides." (Gospel of Mathew 6:32-33) May our life be the mission of God. Let us be totally dependent on God's power.
