# Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

### A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Mark:

As Jesus was leaving Jericho with his disciples and a sizable crowd, Bartimaeus, a blind man, the son of Timaeus, sat by the roadside begging.

On hearing that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to cry out and say, "Jesus, son of David, have pity on me." And many rebuked him, telling him to be silent.

But he kept calling out all the more,

"Son of David, have pity on me."

Jesus stopped and said, "Call him."

So they called the blind man, saying to him,

"Take courage; get up, Jesus is calling you."

He threw aside his cloak, sprang up, and came to Jesus. Jesus said to him in reply, "What do you want me to do for you?"

The blind man replied to him, "Master, I want to see." Jesus told him, "Go your way; your faith has saved you." Immediately he received his sight and followed him on the way.

# FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Bishop Fulton J. Sheen was greeted by a burst of applause when he made his appearance as a speaker at a meeting in Minneapolis. He responded by saying, "Applause before a speaker begins is an act of faith. Applause during speech is an act of hope. Applause after he has concluded is an act of charity."

In the Gospel today James and John wanted to be rewarded (applauded) with the glory of sitting at the right and left side of Jesus' throne. When the other disciples heard this they became indignant at the two. Jesus takes this indignant situation among them as an occasion to make them realize that 'to be in authority over people' must be founded in one's will and readiness 'to serve them'. Leadership is not in claiming one's power over the people but in surrendering the self in serving. Only by becoming a slave of all one has to become head of all. In Christ's words, authority means service. The slave of the people is their leader.

In the first and second readings we are invited to realize the same truth. God healed the guilt and alleviated the suffering of many by sending his Son as a servant suffering for them. God's servant, Jesus is the one who sympathizes with our weaknesses by being tested in

every way like us. Knowing all our suffering and pain Jesus served God's mercy to us. So let us confidently approach the throne of grace to receive mercy and to find grace for timely help.

We need volunteers to serve at Parish Outreach. Our parish outreach is run by the volunteers. It is open four days a week, from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm. If you can avail yourself you will have the greater satisfaction of giving out food to the poor and the homeless. Any amount of time on any day of the week that you can give is thankfully welcome. Please consider serving the poor.

October 31<sup>st</sup> Halloween - November 1<sup>st</sup> All

Saints. The origin of the word *Halloween* is Christian. *Halloween* falls on the evening before the Christian holy day of All Hallows' Day (also known as *All Saints'*, *Hallowmas* or *Hallow tide*) on November 1 and All Souls' Day on November 2, thus giving the holiday on October 31<sup>st</sup> the full name of *All Hallows' Eve* which in popular use became *Halloween*.

God calls us to be saints and has given us the power to become saints. Thus when we celebrate our inner power and identity of being saints on November first, we rightfully ridicule and make fun of evil on the eve (October 31<sup>st</sup>) of 'All Saints' feast. The Halloween costumes are geared towards making fun of the evil only to highlight the Goodness and the Saintliness we are created with.

How about All Saint and Costume Mass on November 1<sup>st</sup>: In the background of what I explained above I invite all children, teens and adults with your Halloween costumes to attend the All Saints mass on Sunday, November 1<sup>st</sup> at 12:15 pm which will be followed by refreshment. Also some of us can come in Garment of a Saint (like St. Francis of Assisi, St. Elizabeth Ann Seaton, St. Kateri Tekakwitha, the first Native American Saint St. Junipero Serra etc.). Thus we can celebrate our potential to be saints by ridiculing all that is non-saintly and evil.

We are just \$ 18,185 away from reaching our goal of Catholic Ministry Appeal. When the goal is met we will get \$ 13,000 back to our parish in rebate. I kindly request those who have not participated in it, to consider making contributions. Just a little more effort and we will get back our rebate. Thanks to those contributed.
