RECONCILIATION—Celebrated in Church every Saturday from 4pm to 4:45pm, or by previous appointment with Parish Office.



# FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

A man said this about himself. "Those who do not understand me revere me. Those who revile me do not understand me either." If we think we are what our friends and enemies say we are, we obviously do not know ourselves.

In the Gospel today the blind man, Bartimaeus did not give heed to others who tried to silence his crying out loud to Jesus. But he kept calling out all the more, "Son of David, have pity on me." Because the blind man began to see in Jesus what others failed to see. Actually the Blind man did not care about what others expected him to do, to be silent.

The Blind man's faith in Jesus gave him the courage to be himself in spite of the controlling – gestures of others towards him. His faith strengthened him to be his original self, to approach Jesus and to be cured by him to see again. When Jesus cured him, he had not only regained his physical eye sight, but also his inner eye was opened to follow Jesus.

Thank God we have good eyesight, most often, we

condition ourselves to see the truth in the way our friends/society see, or just contrary to the way our enemies see. Thus our eyesight can easily become a biased or narrowed one. Like the blind man of the Gospel, our sight can be enlarged and inclusive only when we wake up to the inner eyesight with the gift of faith. Faith in Jesus and in oneself will clear our vision. It will liberate us from the vision we have cultivated from the influence of our friends and the bias of our enemies. Let us too cry out like the blind man, "Jesus Son of David, have pity on me."

October 31<sup>st</sup> Halloween - November 1<sup>st</sup> All

Saints. The origin of the word *Halloween* is Christian. *Halloween* falls on the evening before the <u>Christian</u> holy day of <u>All Hallows' Day</u> (also known as *All Saints', Hallowmas* or *Hallow tide*) on November 1 and <u>All Souls' Day</u> on November 2, thus giving the holiday on October 31<sup>st</sup> the full name of *All Hallows' Eve* which in popular use became *Halloween*. God calls us to be saints and has given us the power to become saints. Thus when we celebrate our inner power and identity of being saints on November first, we rightfully ridicule and make fun of evil on the eve (October 31<sup>st</sup>) of 'All Saints' feast. The Halloween costumes are geared towards making fun of the evil only

How about All Saint and Costume Mass on November 1<sup>st</sup>: In the background of what I explained above I invite all children, teens and adults with your Halloween costumes to attend the All Saints mass on Sunday, November 1<sup>st</sup> at 12:15 pm which will be followed by refreshments. Also some of us can come in Garment of a Saint (like St. Francis of Assisi, St. Elizabeth Ann Seaton, St. Kateri Tekakwitha, the first Native American Saint St. Junipero Serra etc.). Thus we can celebrate our potential to be saints by ridiculing all that is non-saintly and evil.
