Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

January 24, 2016
Third Sunday in Ordinary Time
Nehemiah 8:2-4A, 5-6, 8-10
Psalm 19: 8, 9, 10, 15
1 Corinthians 12:12-30
Luke 1: 1-4, 4:14-21

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Luke:

Since many have undertaken to compile a narrative of the events that have been fulfilled among us, just as those who were eyewitnesses from the beginning and ministers of the word have handed them down to us, I too have decided, after investigating everything accurately anew, to write it down in an orderly sequence for you, most excellent Theophilus, so that you may realize the certainty of the Teachings you have received.

Jesus returned to Galilee in the power of the Spirit, and news of him spread throughout the whole region. He taught in their synagogues and was praised by all.

He came to Nazareth, where he had grown up, and went according to his custom into the synagogue on the sabbath day. He stood up to read and was handed a scroll of the prophet Isaiah. He unrolled the scroll and found the passage where it was written:

*The Spirit of the Lord is upon me,
because he has anointed me
to bring glad tidings to the poor.
He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives
and recovery of sight to the blind,
to let the oppressed go free,
and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord.*

Rolling up the scroll, he handed it back to the attendant and sat down, and the eyes of all in the synagogue looked intently at him. He said to them,
"Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing."

Focus Questions:

1. Jesus announces the coming of the reign of God in this Gospel. Where do you see signs of the reign of God?
2. Relate an experience when you were blind to the needs of the poor.
3. How do you respond to the stories in the news of people who are oppressed or in need?

Family and children's question:

What changes are you willing to make in your life so that like Jesus you can bring good news to the poor?

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

It was a long and boring lecture. A man in the balcony was interrupting it by yelling, "Louder! Louder!" After the fifth interruption, a gentleman in the first row stood up, looked back and said, "What's matter, friend, can't you hear?"

"No, I can't hear," came the answer from the balcony.

"Well, then, be thankful and keep quiet!"

When life gets tough, sufferings will turn into blessings if we have the right way of looking at them.

Today's Gospel has the miracle of Christ turning

water into wine. Mary sees that the wedding party has run out of wine. Instead of complaining she has the right approach to solve the problem. First, she asks her Son, Jesus to take care of it. Second, she advises the servers to do whatever Jesus asks. Mary's way is the perfect way to solve life's problems. First ask Jesus to take care of the problematic situation; second, do what Jesus tells us to do.

When we meet challenges in life, let us act like Mary, the mother of Jesus. When we allow ourselves to do whatever Jesus tells us, we will certainly experience the miracle of Jesus turning our water (specific gifts) into wine (the necessary gifts) to meet the challenges of life. Let us have the heart of Mary to rise above our complaints. Let us surrender our life challenges to Jesus, to be handled by Him. We will see Jesus turning our challenges into blessings.

GOLDEN JUBILEE: The miracle of turning water into wine continues at St. Thomas More. In December of 2017 we will have a big celebration – the Golden Jubilee of our Parish – 50 years of being the Parish-family of St. Thomas More. As the second reading says, the specific gifts that each one of us has from God when put together has formed us as a Parish family. None of us is totally sufficient to do anything. But as a community gathered in the name of Jesus, the Lord has supplied us with enough gifts to grow steadily and strongly as a parish family for the last 48 years.

As the water was changed by Jesus, our 'Coffin-Factory-Church' was turned into a beautiful Church. Each one of us can reminisce many moments of water turning into wine in the past 48 years. As the Golden Jubilee is fast approaching I invite the parish community to follow the method of our Blessed Mother and turn to Jesus.

Let us commit our present faith-challenging moments to Jesus. Let us surrender whatever we think as a hindrance in our faith-life to Jesus, to be changed by Him into faith-witnessing moments. Let us hand over to Jesus all that we consider as insufficient resources in renovating the church spiritually and structurally to be met by God's abundance in Jesus.

Let us not be afraid of our hindrances or insufficiencies. Let us be ready to do whatever Jesus expects us to do. Let our Golden Jubilee be a time

when Jesus will turn the water-moments into wine-moments in the spiritual and structural undertakings of our Parish Church. . May our 50th year be a celebrative moment with Jesus and his Mother Mary, both internally and externally.

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity: We dedicate a week of prayer for Christian Unity every year in the month of January. This year it falls this week from January 18th to 25th. Jesus knew already at his Last Supper that his followers would soon be tempted to each go their own way. He prayed for our unity. ‘That they may be one’ was his fervent prayer to the Heavenly Father. Even now Jesus prays with us that every Christian community may be open to the inspiration of the Holy Spirit to realize that there are more things among us to unite us than to divide us. Let us pray for Christian Unity.

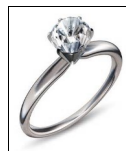

Supreme Court & Little Sisters of the Poor:

Please support the Little Sisters with your prayers as they await the Supreme Court decision in June as to whether they will be free to practice their religious beliefs or forced to pay crippling fines to the IRS.

On Jan. 4, 2016, the Becket Fund for Religious Liberty urged the Supreme Court to protect the Little Sisters from the \$70 million in government fines for refusing to violate their faith. This is the second time the Sisters have been forced to ask the Supreme Court for protection from the government's efforts to make them provide contraception, abortion drugs, and sterilization. "The Little Sisters should not have to fight their own government to get an exemption it has already given to thousands of other employers including big companies like Exxon and Pepsi Cola Bottling Co.," said Becket Fund Senior Counsel. "It is ridiculous for the federal government to claim, in this day and age, that it can't figure out how to distribute contraceptives without involving nuns and their health plans."
