RECONCILIATION—Celebrated in Church every Saturday from 4pm to 4:45pm, or by previous appointment with Parish Office.


SACRAMENT OF THE SICK—Call the Church Office to request visitation of the sick.

Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

February 28, 2016 Third Sunday of Lent Exodus 3:1-8a, 13-15 Psalm 103: 1-2, 3-4, 6-7, 8, 11 1 Corinthians 10:1-6, 10-12 Luke 13: 1-9

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Luke:

Some people told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with the blood of their sacrifices. Jesus said to them in reply,

"Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were greater sinners than all other Galileans? By no means! But I tell you, if you do not repent, you will all perish as they did! Or those eighteen people who were killed when the tower at Siloam fell on them do you think they were more guilty than everyone else who lived in Jerusalem? By no means! But I tell you, if you do not repent, you will all perish as they did!"

And he told them this parable:

"There once was a person who had a fig tree planted in his orchard, and when he came in search of fruit on it but found none, he said to the gardener,

'For three years now I have come in search of fruit on this fig tree but have found none. So cut it down. Why should it exhaust the soil?'

He said to him in reply,

'Sir, leave it for this year also, and I shall cultivate the ground around it and fertilize it; it may bear fruit in the future. If not you can cut it down."

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Mother of the first teenager: "My daughter doesn't tell me anything. I'm a nervous wreck!" Mother of the second teenager: "My daughter tells me everything and I am a nervous wreck!" Human life is so mysterious that neither a word can explain it fully well, nor a silent observation grasp it totally.

In the readings of the Second week of Lent God invites us to see the truth, to experience and to believe it. In the first reading God shows the innumerable stars to the aged and childless Abram and invites him to believe that his descendants will be as countless as the stars. In the second reading Paul recommends that his church imitate him. They are instructed to see themselves not as citizens of the passing world but that of eternal heaven.

In the Gospel Jesus takes Peter, James and John with him and shows them his heavenly glory. This seeing would help them to believe in Jesus when they would later witness his shameful death on the Cross.

We are all created in the image of God. As bearers of God's image, we are chosen by God to be God's children in our Baptism. This is our true identity which can neither be explained adequately in words nor can be ignored and silenced. Lent invites us to see this true identity both in ourselves and others, to experience it and to believe it.

Our spiritual identity is the spiritual truth which can neither be analyzed nor be demonstrated with any instrument or theorem as science would do. We are called to see it in ourselves, experience it and believe it. We don't prove our truth but we become the truth. Our truth is not an object to be proved but to be experienced and believed by others. We allow others to see us and experience us as the image and children of God.

This week we pray the Stations of the Cross on Friday 26th at 7:00 pm for those who are impacted by unforeseen events like accidents, house fires, debt, misunderstandings in the family and other challenges in life. Please come and pray with us.

I will be offering 60-minute pranayama sessions – Breathing Meditation on Tuesdays. We had the first one on 16th February. Three more to come on February 23rd, March 1st and March 8th. The morning session will be in Kirwin Hall at 9:45 am immediately after the 9:00am mass. The evening one will be at 7:00 pm in the Church. The first 30 minutes of the session will be an explanation of the basics and the second half will be the spiritual exercise of the breathing meditation called Pranayama – integration of oneself through breathing (prana) OUR PRIEST CELEBRANTS (*Subject to last minute*

Catholics for Freedom of Religion



A brief has been filed for 42 Congressmen asking the Supreme Court to hear the following case:

> Storman's family-owned pharmacy sued Washington State for requiring them and all

pharmacies to provide abortion-inducing drugs, even if providing such drugs violated the conscience of the pharmacists. The law further prohibits objecting pharmacies from referring customers to other pharmacies within a 5-mile radius. The 9th Circuit Court upheld this law.

The 9th Circuit's decision denying conscience rights to pro-life pharmacies is not only unconstitutional, but unprecedented. Healthcare professionals who sincerely believe abortion is wrong have been protected by Federal and State governments since 1973 after Roe v. Wade legalized abortion. Since the Founding Era, conscientious objectors from the Quakers in the Revolution to WW II and today, the government provides exemptions from military service to those whose religious beliefs cannot permit taking another human life. "The rights of freedom of thought, conscience, religion and belief are fundamental. The ability to exercise conscientious objection is a keystone of democracy. All of us should have the right to hold a belief and not be compelled by the State to act contrary to that conviction. It is the difference between a free society and one subject to tyranny." LENTEN PROJECT 2016

CATHOLIC RELIEF SERVICES WORKING TO PREVENT A LOST GENERATION

The donations collected for this year's Lenten project will go to help Catholic Relief Services in their outreach to the children of Syrian refugees. CRS provides more than 53,546 Syrian Refugee children with education classes, school materials, counseling, recreational activities, and safe spaces to learn and play. Since the conflict began in Syria five years ago, 7.5 million children are in need of humanitarian aid, 2.5 million children are no longer in school. According to UNICEF, for Syrian children, "what is at stake isn't politics. It's their future. Having already lost their homes, schools and communities, their chance of building a future may also soon be lost." Catholic Relief Services is working, along with Caritas, on the ground in Syria, Lebanon, Jordan, Egypt and Greece helping children and their families with food, clothing, housing and education. Pope Francis' first pastoral visit outside of Rome was to the tiny island of Lampedusa, where many refugees landed after making the perilous sea voyage from North Africa. Two years later, he is still urging the Church and the world not to turn their backs on the suffering of those people fleeing conflict and death. Pope Francis has declared this year to be a Jubilee Year of Mercy. Remember Jesus' words in Matthew 25 "Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, vou did for Me." Donations can be placed in the Lenten Project House in the narthex or can be collected in the CRS Rice Bowls and brought back to Church at the end of Lent. We are also encouraging all parishioners to fill in a heart (found in an envelope on the narthex bulletin board) with words of hope and encouragement for the refugee children. These notes will be forwarded by CRS to the refugee camps and connect the people of St. Thomas More to those children. Directions, and samples, are also displayed on the bulletin board.
