RECONCILIATION—Celebrated in Church every Saturday from 4pm to 4:45pm, or by previous appointment with Parish Office.


SACRAMENT OF THE SICK—Call the Church Office to request visitation of the sick.

Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

March 6, 2016 Fourth Sunday of Lent Joshua 5:9a, 10-12 Psalm 34:2-3, 4-5, 6-7 2 Corinthians 5:17-21 Luke 15: 1-3, 11-32

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Luke:

Tax collectors and sinners were all drawing near to listen to Jesus, but the Pharisees and scribes began to complain, saying, "This man welcomes sinners and eats with them."

So to them Jesus addressed this parable: "A man had two sons, and the younger son said to his father, 'Father give me the share of your estate that should come to me.' So the father

divided the property between them. After a few days, the younger son collected all his belongings and set off to a distant country where he squandered his inheritance on a life of dissipation.

When he had freely spent everything, a severe famine struck that country, and he found himself in dire need. So he hired

himself out to one of the local citizens who sent him to his farm to tend the swine. And he longed to eat his fill of the pods on which the swine fed, but nobody gave him any. Coming to his senses he thought, 'How many of my father's hired workers

have more than enough food to eat, but here am I, dying from hunger. I shall get up and go to my father and I shall say to him,

"Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I no longer deserve to be called your son; treat me as you would treat one of your hired workers." So he got up and went back to his father. While he was still a long way off, his father caught sight of him, and was filled with compassion. He ran to his son, embraced him and kissed him. His son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you; I no longer

deserve to be called your son.' But his father ordered his servants, 'Quickly bring the finest robe and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. Take the fattened calf and slaughter it. Then let us celebrate with a feast, because this son of mine was dead, and has come to life again; he was lost, and has been found.' Then the celebration began. Now the older son had been out in the field and, on his way back, as he neared the house, he heard the sound of music and dancing.

He called one of the servants and asked what this might mean.

The servant said to him, 'Your brother has returned and your father has slaughtered the fattened calf because he has him back safe and sound.' He became angry, and when he refused to enter the house, his father came out and pleaded with him.

He said to his father in reply, 'Look, all these years I served you and not once did I disobey your orders; yet you never gave me even a young goat to feast on with my friends. But when your son returns who swallowed up your property with prostitutes,

for him you slaughter the fattened calf.' He said to him, 'My son, you are here with me always; everything I have is yours. But now we must celebrate and rejoice, because your brother was dead and has come to life again; he was lost and has been found."

Focus Questions:

- 1. Recall a time when someone forgave you from the heart. What was your reaction?
- 2. Describe a time when you experienced God's generosity.
- 3. How do you handle resentment in your life? What advice would you give to the older brother in the parable of the Prodigal Son?

Family and children's question:

Talk about a time when you forgave someone without any reservations. Who in your life do you still need to forgive?

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Overheard at the beach: "Mummy, may I go for a swim?"

"Certainly not, my dear, it is far too deep."

"But daddy is swimming."

"Yes, dear, but he's insured."

Nothing is guaranteed in life. In the name of insurance we try to get some kind of monetary support at the time of loss. Insurance can help us replace material loss. But for life as such, what kind of guarantee or insurance can we have?

The readings of the third week of Lent invite us to see within us an indestructible God-given substance as a guarantee or insurance against all the losses we will incur in our earthly life.

In the first reading, Moses is invited to see himself in the burning bush. The fire could not burn it. In that fresh and un-burnt burning bush, God commissions Moses to deliver his people enslaved by Pharaoh, from whom he fled to save his life. Moses is asked by God to go into the same fire of Pharaoh whose wrath burnt him in the first place. But this time God is going to be with him so Moses will be kept fresh like the green-burning bush. The wrath of Pharaoh would be like a fire around him but it will not consume him. God would be his guarantee and insurance.

The Gospel encourages us to see our life as a time to turn our unfruitful situations into fruit-bearing ones. All that we might see or experience around us may seem discouraging and disturbing, painful and unpromising. But God the Gardner is ready to work with us, as he works with the unfruitful fig tree. If we can co-operate with God we will be able to bear fruit. Our barrenness will be turned into fruitfulness. We may look like being burnt with fire from outside but because God is working with us, we will be surprised like Moses, to see the bush, though on fire, not consumed. God is our fire-insurance.

This week we pray the Stations of the Cross on March 4th at 7:00 pm for those who are suffering from any type of addiction. Please come and pray with us.

I will be offering 60 minute pranayama sessions—Breathing Meditation on Tuesdays. Last Tuesday around 100 people attended and found it spiritually useful and beneficial. This Tuesday March 1st and the final morning session on March 8th will be in Kirwin Hall at 9:45 am immediately after the 9:00am mass. The evening one will be at 7:00pm in Kirwin Hall. The first 30 minutes of the session will be an explanation of the basics and the second half will be the spiritual exercise of the breathing meditation called Pranayama – integration of oneself through breathing (prana). Even if you missed the two classes of February you can still attend. Each session

is complete in itself. Welcome.

Our yearly Lenten project is another opportunity to serve God through serving others. This year we invite you to join Catholic Relief Service (CRS) in educating the refugee children in refugee camps in the war-torn zones of the Middle East and in our continent of America. Let us eagerly partake in this corporal act of mercy of almsgiving during this Year of Mercy. Please view some of the data and pictures in the Narthex, explaining the services provided by CRS to the refugees. Please consider this Lenten Project and show your monetary help by placing your donations in the house kept at the table. Iraqi Christians Denied Asylum:

The U.S. denied asylum to dozens of
Christians who escaped ISIS militants - even
though they had family sponsors here. "This is
extremely disturbing and wrong," said

Christian Freedom International. "I've never see anything like this ... (Christians) should be a priority over other asylum seekers." The U.S. admitted Muslims from Iraq over Christians at a ratio of 5-1, despite the fact that Christians are a heavily targeted "infidel" minority.

"... whereas religious and other ethnic minorities have been killed, slaughtered, beaten, abducted and tortured; whereas they have been enslaved (in particular, women and girls subjected to forms of sexual violence) ..."

Finally, the European Parliament stresses the responsibility of the international community to take collective action in order to "provide protection and aid ... to all those targeted by the so called 'ISIS/ Daesh' ..."

CATHOLIC RELIEF SERVICES WORKING TO PREVENT A LOST GENERATION

The donations collected for this year's Lenten project will go to help Catholic Relief Services in their outreach to the children of Syrian refugees. CRS provides more than 53,546 Syrian Refugee children with education classes, school materials, counseling, recreational activities, and safe spaces to learn and play. Since the conflict began in Syria five years ago, 7.5 million children are in need of humanitarian aid, 2.5 million children are no longer in school. According to UNICEF, for Syrian children, "what is at stake isn't politics. It's their future. Having already lost their homes, schools and communities, their chance of building a future may also soon be lost."

Catholic Relief Services is working, along with Caritas, on the ground in Syria, Lebanon, Jordan, Egypt and Greece helping children and their families with food, clothing, housing and education. Pope Francis' first pastoral visit outside of Rome was to the tiny island of Lampedusa, where

many refugees landed after making the perilous sea voyage from North Africa. Two years later,

he is still urging the Church and the world not to turn their backs on the suffering of those people fleeing conflict and death.

Pope Francis has declared this year to be a Jubilee Year of Mercy. Remember Jesus' words in

Matthew 25 "Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for Me."

Donations can be placed in the Lenten Project House in the narthex or can be collected in the

CRS Rice Bowls and brought back to Church at the end of Lent.

We are also encouraging all parishioners to fill in a heart (found in an envelope on the narthex

bulletin board) with words of hope and encouragement for the refugee children. These notes

will be forwarded by CRS to the refugee camps and connect the people of St. Thomas More to those children. Directions, and samples, are also displayed on the bulletin board.

RCIA

We are in the RCIA Process with four people journeying to the Easter Sacraments. They rely upon your example and prayers as they strive to become disciples of Christ. We ask the community of St. Thomas More to pray for Michael Smith, Michael Milone, Alison Radonis, and Michael Zeitner that during Lent the spirit will guide them in their search to grow closer to Christ.
