RECONCILIATION—Celebrated in Church every Saturday from 4pm to 4:45pm, or by previous appointment with Parish Office.


SACRAMENT OF THE SICK—Call the Church Office to request visitation of the sick.

Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

March 13, 2016 Fifth Sunday of Lent Isaiah 43: 16-21 Psalm 126: 1-2. 2-3. 4-5. 6 Philippians 3:8-14 John 8:1-11

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to John:

Jesus went to the Mount of Olives. But early in the morning he arrived again in the temple area, and all the people started coming to him, and he sat down and taught them.

Then the scribes and the Pharisees brought a woman who had been caught in adultery and made her stand in the middle.

They said to him,

"Teacher, this woman was caught in the very act of committing adultery. Now in the law, Moses commanded us to stone such women. So what do you say?" They said this to test him, so that they could have some

charge to bring against him. Jesus bent down and began to write on the ground with his finger. But when they continued asking him, he straightened up and said to them,

"Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her."

Again he bent down and wrote on the ground.

And in response, they went away one by one, beginning with the elders.

So he was left alone with the woman before him.

Then Jesus straightened up and said to her,

"Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?" She replied, "No one, sir."

Then Jesus said, "Neither do I condemn you. Go, and from now on do not sin any more."

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Husband: Where is yesterday's newspaper?

Wife: I wrapped the garbage in it. Husband: Oh, I want to see it. Wife: There wasn't much to see....just some orange peels and coffee grounds.

This is the difference between the way God sees and the way we do. God sees for something new in us while we see nothing but garbage.

Today's Gospel reading is the famous story of 'The Prodigal Son'. Jesus narrates the story to explain to the Pharisees and the Scribes how his view of sinners is different from theirs. They, like the older son of the story, look at sinners as those gone astray, and not to be associated with the righteous like themselves. But for Jesus, sinners, like the younger son, are longing to come back to the embrace of the father's love and ready to celebrate the forgiving relationship.

Today's readings free us from the frozen view to the flowing view of life. It is our choice. We can either adamantly settle for our own whims and fancies about our life like the older son and thus stay out from life's celebration. Or we can free ourselves from our old way of life and, like the younger son, allow the flow of new life, and thus celebrate life enjoying the mercy and forgiveness of God the father.

As the first reading says, our life is a celebration of 'pass over' from that which enslaves us to that which frees and fills us with God's new life. The second reading describes us as a New Creation in Christ. God in Christ has not only empowered us with newness within us, but also made us as God's ambassadors for Christ in order to spread the newness around us. Let us not freeze, like the older son, in the old we have settled for. Let us free ourselves to the new we have within, like the younger son.

Our yearly Lenten project is another opportunity to serve God through serving others. This year we invite you to join Catholic Relief Service (CRS) in educating the refugee children in refugee camps in the war-torn zones of the Middle East and in our continent of America. Let us eagerly partake in this corporal act of mercy of almsgiving during this Year of Mercy. Please view some of the data and pictures in the Narthex, explaining the service of CRS to the refugees. Please consider this Lenten Project and show your monetary help by placing your donations in the house kept at the table. Also you are invited to write a note of love and care to the refugee children on the heart-signs and place them in the envelope attached to the sign board. These will be sent to the refugee children.

Justice Scalia death affects Supreme Court key cases: The death of Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia could be a major setback for religious freedom this year.

The Little Sisters of the poor and other religious nonprofits such as charities, schools and hospitals, are seeking an exemption from the government Affordable Care Act's mandate that employers include contraception, sterilization and abortion drugs in their health insurance plans. The court will hear their case on March 23. "If this appeal is lost, government becomes head of every religious denomination in the country by its assumed authority to determine what is, in fact, a sin," said Thomas More Law Center.

Now, with Justice Scalia's death, the most likely outcome is a 4-4 tie that would leave the so-called "contraception mandate" in place for these non-profits, subjecting them to crippling IRS fines. (christianheadlines.com, 2/16/16)

Let us pray for Little Sisters of the Poor, that they can avoid bankrupting fines.

LENTEN PROJECT 2016

CATHOLIC RELIEF SERVICES WORKING TO PREVENT A LOST GENERATION

The donations collected for this year's Lenten project will go to help Catholic Relief Services in their outreach to the children of Syrian refugees. CRS provides more than 53,546 Syrian Refugee children with education classes, school materials, counseling, recreational activities, and safe spaces to learn and play. Since the conflict began in Syria five years ago, 7.5 million children are in need of humanitarian aid, 2.5 million children are no longer in school. According to UNICEF, for Syrian children, "what is at stake isn't politics. It's their future. Having already lost their homes, schools and communities, their chance of building a future may also soon be lost." Catholic Relief Services is working, along with Caritas, on the ground in Syria, Lebanon, Jordan, Egypt and Greece helping children and their families with food, clothing, housing and education. Pope Francis' first pastoral visit outside of Rome was to the tiny island of Lampedusa, where many refugees landed after making the perilous sea voyage from North Africa. Two years later, he is still urging the Church and the world not to turn their backs on the suffering of those people fleeing conflict and death. Pope Francis has declared this year to be a Jubilee Year of Mercy. Remember Jesus' words in Matthew 25 "Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, vou did for Me." Donations can be placed in the Lenten Project House in the narthex or can be collected in the CRS Rice Bowls and brought back to Church at the end of Lent.
