



Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

October 23, 2015 Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time Sirach 35:12-14, 16-18 Psalm 34: 2-3. 17-18, 19, 23 2 Timothy 4:6-8, 16-18 Luke 18:9-14

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Luke:

Jesus addressed this parable to those who were convinced of their own righteousness and despised everyone else.

"Two people went up to the temple area to pray; one was a Pharisee and the other was a tax collector. The Pharisee took up his position and spoke this prayer to himself,

'O God, I thank you that I am not like the rest of humanity --greedy, dishonest, adulterous -- or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week, and I pay tithes on my whole income.'

But the tax collector stood off at a distance and would not even raise his eyes to heaven but beat his breast and prayed,

'O God, be merciful to me a sinner.'

I tell you, the latter went home justified, not the former; for whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and the one who humbles himself will be exalted."

Focus Questions:

- 1. Describe a time when you felt like the Pharisee. How did you overcome your pride?
- 2. Relate a time when you acted humbly.
- 3. Describe a time when you did the right thing for the wrong reasons.

Family question:

Talk about your favorite place to pray.

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

A preacher once asked an actor why he had such a large audience while he, the preacher, had only a small audience at church.

"I act as if I believe in what I say," said the actor, "whereas you preach as if you did not believe what you preach." Prayer is neither a show before God nor an utterance of meaningless words to God.

Today's first reading figuratively describes that prayer is a steady uplifting of one's heart to God. One has to pray without being tired or frustrated. Moses with his uplifted hands stands as a symbol of steady prayer. When Moses grew tired to keep his hands raised, his helpers Aaron and Hur supported his hands. This symbolizes how others can help in one's tireless steady prayer to God.

In today's Gospel Jesus reiterates the same aspect of praying with undivided and tireless prayer. He affirms that God will certainly 'secure the rights of his chosen ones who call out to him day and night.'

Why should prayer be steady and tireless? Steadiness and tirelessness mean undivided and total dependence on God and God alone. Unless one has childlike confidence in God's help one cannot pray steadily and tirelessly. That is why the gospel ends with the words, "When the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?" Let us pray steadily and tirelessly with faith.

Last weekend I introduced at all the masses about the Spiritual renewal and the physical renovation during the Golden Jubilee year. We have sent letters to all our parishioners explaining the needs of our parish and how we all can be part of these renovations. Please prayerfully think over all that is addressed to your attention. Reply as God would inspire you to do. As we pray in the Psalm, "Unless the Lord builds the house, those who build it labor in vain. Unless the Lord guards the city, the guards keep watch in vain." (Psalm 127:1). May your prayerful reflection guide you to be a part of our Golden Jubilee renewal and restoration.

Costume Mass: The eve of All Saints day (November 1) is Halloween (evening of October 31). We invite and encourage all children to come to the 9:15 am mass on Sunday, October 30 dressed in their costumes, either as a saint or any character of Halloween. We will celebrate ourselves as God's image and at the same time ask God to forgive the fake and masked images we put on in our everyday life.

Congratulations to all the children who will enroll as candidates for First communion at the 10:45 am and 12:15 pm mass this Sunday.

"The struggles that we face as a nation and as a global community cannot be addressed solely by choosing the 'best candidate' for political office. ...we must fast and pray."

USCCB (U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops)
Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship:
The USCCB offers important guidelines for Catho-

lics in developing informed consciences in order that we, as Pope Francis has

exhorted us, offer the best of ourselves so that our leaders can govern. The guidelines do not rely on the opinions of mass media in order to discern the truth.

The Church teaches that there are, INDEED, absolute truths that stand in opposition to many of the relativisms so

prevalent in today's mass culture, which question the very notion of finding the truth.

We are called to recognize that there is intrinsic evil and there is intrinsic good. There is intrinsic evil in abortion, euthanasia, human cloning, and misuse of human embryos. There is intrinsic good in marriage as the union of one man and one woman, in

protecting human life from conception to natural death, in caring for the poor, the vulnerable and marginalized, and all that such care entails.

In the process of forming conscience for the exercise of **faithful citizenship**, the guidelines remind us that we are making moral choices, and that we are bound to consider intrinsic evils, intrinsic goods and the prospects for correcting morally defective laws by seeking to restore justice.

In the summary of the United States bishops' reflection entitled, Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, we are reminded of the following:

"Difficult political decisions require the exercise of a well-formed conscience aided by prudence. This exercise of

conscience begins with always opposing policies that violate human life or weaken its protection.

"Those who formulate law therefore have an obligation in conscience to work toward correcting morally defective laws, lest they be guilty of cooperating in evil and in sinning against the common good"

(Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, United States Conference of Catholic Bishops; Catholic Answers/Catholic.com)

In this time so critical to religious freedom and conscience rights, let us humble ourselves as we seek His face and pray: Almighty God, we pray for your mercy. Inform our consciences and enlighten our judgement, that we may choose those who will mercifully uphold life and work to restore justice to protect the least among us. Amen


