Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

April 2, 2017 Fifth Sunday of Lent Ezekiel 37: 12-14 Psalm 130: 1-2, 3-4, 5-6, 7-8 Romans 8:8-11 John 11:1-45

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to John:

Now a man was ill, Lazarus from Bethany, the village of Mary and her sister Martha. Mary was the one who had anointed the Lord with perfumed oil and dried his feet with her hair; it was her brother Lazarus who was ill. So the sisters sent word to him saying, "Master, the one you love is ill." When Jesus heard this he said, "This illness is not to end in death, but is for the glory of God, that the Son of God may be glorified through it." Now Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus. So when he heard that he was ill, he remained for two days in the place where he was. Then after this he said to his disciples, "Let us go back to Judea." The disciples said to him, "Rabbi, the Jews were just trying to stone you, and you want to go back there?" Jesus answered, "Are there not twelve hours in a day? If one walks during the day, he does not stumble, because he sees the light of this world. But if one walks at night, he stumbles, because the light is not in him." He said this, and then told them, "Our friend Lazarus is asleep, but I am going to awaken him." So the disciples said to him, "Master, if he is asleep, he will be saved." But Jesus was talking about his death, while they thought that he meant ordinary sleep. So then Jesus said to them clearly, "Lazarus has died. And I am glad for you that I was not there, that you may believe. Let us go to him." So Thomas, called Didymus, said to his fellow disciples, "Let us also go to die with him."

When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb for four days. Now Bethany was near Jerusalem, only about two miles away. And many of the Jews had come to Martha and Mary to comfort them about their brother. When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went to meet him; but Mary sat at home. Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. But even now I know that whatever you ask of God, God will give you." Jesus said to her, "Your brother will rise." Martha said to him, "I know he will rise, in the resurrection on the last day." Jesus told her, "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" She said to him, "Yes, Lord. I have come to believe that you are the Christ,

the Son of God, the one who is coming into the world."

When she had said this, she went and called her sister Mary secretly, saying, "The teacher is here and is asking for you." As soon as she heard this, she rose quickly and went to him. For Jesus had not yet come into the village, but was still where Martha had met him. So when the Jews who were with her in the house comforting her saw Mary get up quickly and go out, they followed her, presuming that she was going to the tomb to weep there. When Mary came to where Jesus was and saw him, she fell at his feet and said to him, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died." When Jesus saw her weeping and the Jews who had come with her weeping, he became perturbed and deeply troubled, and said, "Where have you laid him?" They said to him, "Sir, come and see." And Jesus wept. So the Jews said. "See how he loved him." But some of them said, "Could not the one who opened the eyes of the blind man have done something so that this man would not have died?"

So Jesus, perturbed again, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone lay across it. Jesus said, "Take away the stone." Martha, the dead man's sister, said to him, "Lord, by now there will be a stench; he has been dead for four days." Jesus said to her, "Did I not tell you that if you believe you will see the glory of God?" So they took away the stone. And Jesus raised his eyes and said, "Father, I thank you for hearing me. I know that you always hear me; but because of the crowd here I have said this, that they may believe that you sent me." And when he had said this, He cried out in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" The dead man came out, tied hand and foot with burial bands, and his face was wrapped in a cloth. So Jesus said to them, "Untie him and let him go."

Now many of the Jews who had come to Mary and seen what he had done began to believe in him.

Focus questions:

- 1. Describe the most alive person you know. How do you feel about this person?
- 2. Describe a time when you went out of your way because of friendship.
- 3. Relate a time when a family member died. How did your family handle the loss?.

Children and Family question:

Lazarus, Mary and Martha were Jesus' good friends. Talk about your friends and what you can do to be a better friend?

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

It is easy to wake up a person who is actually sleeping. But it is impossible to wake up a person who pretends to be sleeping. Likewise one must be willing to come out of the darkness in order to be in the light. On the other hand, if one chooses to be in the darkness, nothing can bring that person to light. We can bring the thirsty horse to water but cannot make it drink.

In today's Gospel story Jesus meets with the same difficulty. The man born blind wished to see, so Jesus could open his eyes. But Jesus could not open the inner eyes of others to see the truth that he is the Messiah, because they refused to see the truth in Jesus. Our eyes may see. But unless we become conscious of what is seen, all our seeing would remain meaningless and empty. We see only what we are conscious of. We don't see and believe. Rather we see only what we believe. Belief precedes the seeing. The heart that believes gives meaning to what the eyes see. The sense organs (eye, ears, mouth etc.) are merely the vehicles to the heart that integrates all our perceptions and gives meaning to them from our belief.

As the second reading instructs, let us arise from our sleep and let Christ (whom we believe) give us the light to see, and strengthen our feet to walk away from the fruitless works of darkness, so that we may live as children of light to produce every kind of goodness, righteousness and truth.

Lenten Mission: March 27, 28 and 29. This Sunday Fr. Joe Fitzgerald will invite us to realize our strength coming from believing in God. The first three days of this week are going to be the Lenten Mission days to enlighten us as to what and whom to believe, to strengthen us with Godly power to overcome whatever we struggle with. Please make use of the spiritual time of the Lenten Mission. It will offer you light and strength to become a new YOU.

We are starting a New Spiritual Program called ALPHA to deepen our faith and to be strengthened by it. It starts on April 17 with the session called 'Come and See.' It is on a First come, First served basis. Only 100 seats available... please get your best seat to take off on April 17th

This Friday, March 31st is Stations of the Cross at 7:00 pm. We will pray for Peace for those families, communities and countries of the world that struggle with violence of any kind-- wars, acts of hate ...

Facts About Religious Rights in the Workplace:

Lack of awareness of religious liberty in the workplace has led to violations of the lawful rights of citizens who merely want to peacefully live out their religious beliefs as they earn a living. Attorneys at law firm, First Liberty, have compiled the following facts:

- 1. The Supreme Court recognized, in 2014, that all Americans, including **business owners**, have freedom of **conscience rights** to live and work according to their beliefs without the fear of government compelling them to violate their beliefs.
- 2. Employers cannot discriminate on the basis of religion and have an affirmative duty to accommodate an employee's religious practices in the workplace, unless this practice imposes undue hardship on the employer.
- 3. Employers may run their businesses in accordance with their religious beliefs. An employer does not discriminate on the basis of religion by affirming the faith of its owners in business objectives. However, the employer may not give the perception that employees' should acquiesce to these religious beliefs.
- 4. Employers and employees may engage in religious speech in the workplace. Both may not engage in uninvited proselytizing. As with spoken religious speech, employers can share their religious beliefs with their employees in print form such as pamphlets, books, and newsletters.
- 5. Employers and employees may have prayer meetings and bible studies in the workplace as long it is clear attendance is voluntary and not required.
- 6. Employers may have employee training based on bible principles. However, employees cannot be required to undergo religious training, services, activities, or engage in behavior that would violate their own sincerely-held religious beliefs.
