Luke 6:17,20-26

Jesus came down with the Twelve and stood on a stretch of level ground with a great crowd of his disciples and a large number of the people from all Judea and Jerusalem and the coastal region of Tyre and Sidon. And raising his eyes toward his disciples he said:

"Blessed are you who are poor, for the kingdom of God is yours. Blessed are you who are now hungry, for you will be satisfied. Blessed are you who are now weeping, for you will laugh. Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude and insult you, and denounce your name as evil on account of the Son of Man. Rejoice and leap for joy on that day! Behold, your reward will be great in heaven. For their ancestors treated the prophets in the same way. But woe to you who are rich, for you have received your consolation. Woe to you who are filled now, for you will be hungry. Woe to you who laugh now, for you will grieve and weep. Woe to you when all speak well of you, for their ancestors treated the false prophets in this way."

From the Desk of Fr Antony

An elephant broke loose from the herd and charged across a little wooden bridge that stretched across a ravine. The worn-out bridge shivered and groaned barely able to support the elephant's weight. Once the elephant had gone safely to the other side, a flea that had lodged itself in the elephant's ear exclaimed in mighty satisfaction, "Boy, did we shake that bridge." The readings this week invite us to feel like the fly who could shake the bridge with the elephant.

In the first reading Isaiah, though unworthy, is fearful but joyful to see and feel the presence of God in the Temple of Jerusalem. When God needed someone to do His mission for His people, Isaiah readily came forward to go as God's emissary. At first Isaiah felt his unworthiness in the presence of God but eventually was emboldened to go in God's name when God made him worthy by purifying him from all his sins and unworthiness. As Paul wrote in his letter to the Romans, "Whom God called, these God also justified" God called Isaiah and made him worthy to do His mission.

In the second reading, while writing to the church in Corinth, Paul says, "I am the least of the Apostles But by the grace of God, I am what I am." In spite of being the least of all the apostles, Paul proudly acknowledges that he toiled harder than all of them because of God's grace working effectively in him. What is impossible with humans, is possible with God. No matter how difficult or seemingly impossible a situation may be, with God's help, anything can be achieved. Also, we may feel that we are unfit to do what God expects us to do. But it is God who calls and He will see to that we are able to do the mission in the way God wants.

In today's Gospel Peter toiled through the night in vain but at the word of Jesus he caught a great number of fish. Life without the grace of God is merely toil and burden. When it is touched by God's grace, our every act becomes God's act. We may feel that we are tiny or insignificant but when we allow ourselves to be touched by the grace of God, we become God's expression and God's work. Like in the story at the head of this letter, we may feel like a fly but we sit and travel with God the Elephant. We can shake and totter the bridge with our feeble strength because the mission is God's, and our work is done with His strength. Let us respond "YES" to God's call. Let us do God's mission with God's strength.

This is the Jubilee year. The theme is "Pilgrims of Hope." Our journey as a church (both individually and congregationally) is made in hope that God will never disappoint us in our hope, because God is our hope. God calls us and God places His hope in us too, that God and we together will make God's kingdom a living reality among us. The God of Hope calls us to do His mission; let us respond to Him with a firm "YES" placing all our hope in Him.

I thank you my beloved Parish Family for all the gestures and notes of sharing condolences and comforts you showed me through Mass cards, personal notes, texts, voice messages, hugs, hand-shakes etc. I was overwhelmed with the care and love you shared with me since January 4th, the day my mom passed away to begin her living in the presence of God.



There was a federally mandated homeless count on LI in January which identified 4002 individuals in shelters or on the street. This is an 18% increase from 2023. According to reports from Newsday, 36% of households across NY and LI are "cost-burdened" and spend 1/3 of their income on housing. Living in a shelter can cut supplementary security income payments by 80%.



Liturgical Minister Training- Spring 2025

The Diocese of Rockville Center will offer training for those who wish to serve as Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion and Lectors. No walk-ins permitted, all participants must be registered in advance with a letter from their pastor.

Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion: Part A - This training is required for **all** those who are beginning as Ministers. This "BASIC" training is required for **all** Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion. Those who wish to minister in hospitals, nursing homes and to the homebound are required to attend Part B training in addition to BASIC training. One **must** attend Part A training prior to Part B training. A **Lector Workshop** is available for both new and experienced lectors.

End time is an estimate, session may end prior to what is stated here, please be prepared.


