

Luke 6:27-38

Jesus said to his disciples: "To you who hear I say, love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mis-

treat you. To the person who strikes you on one cheek, offer the other one as well, and from the person who takes your cloak, do not withhold even your tunic. Give to everyone who asks of you, and from the one who takes what is yours do not demand it back. Do to others as you would have them do to you. For if you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? Even sinners love those who love them. And if you do good to those who do

good to you, what credit is that to you? Even sinners do the same. If you lend money to those from whom you expect repayment, what credit is that to you? Even sinners lend to sinners, and get back the same amount. But rather, love your enemies and do good to them, and lend expecting nothing back; then your reward will be great and you will be children of the Most High, for he himself is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked.

Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful.

"Stop judging and you will not be judged. Stop condemning and you will not be condemned. Forgive and you will be forgiven. Give, and gifts will be given to you; a good measure, packed together,

shaken down, and overflowing, will be poured into your lap.

> Focus Questions for Ordinary 7 Luke 6:27-38

1: Describe a time when it was hard to turn the other cheek.

2: Jesus asks a lot of his followers. What do you find the hardest to do?

3: Recall a time in your life when your received overflowing blessings.

Family & Children's Question: Think about the times when you judged others negatively. Talk about how you can be kinder in your judgments of others.

From the Desk of Fr Antony

After watching western movies for a while, the viewer commented, "A lot of the conflict that happened in the Wild West could have been avoided, had the architects in those days just made their own towns big enough for everyone." Personal towns will end the conflict but will also lock them in their loneliness, with no one to relate to them in their own towns.

Today's Gospel is the beatitudes and woes according to Luke - four blessings and four woes of life. The first blessing is that the poor belong to the kingdom of God, and the first woe is that the rich will not receive any consolation. This sounds a bit odd. We all know that being rich, one can have in life whatever one wishes while being poor, one is deprived of all he/she would wish to have.

According to Jesus, Blessings or Woes are not what one possesses in life. Blessings or woes are what one is becoming. With possessions the rich can accumulate things around themselves. The possessions can help build something outside and not within themselves. The poor have nothing to possess. They may not be able to build anything around or for themselves, but they are free to grow and build from within themselves. The poor are blessed to live by their inner selves. The rich live with their possessions, rather than the possessions making them live. They don't choose to live but the possessions dictate to them their lifestyle according to what and how much they possess.

By being rich they would translate all their happiness or sadness through the possessions they have. But by being poor they don't have anything outside of themselves to dictate. The poor turn their focus on their inside. There is nothing to distract them from living their inner power. They have all the freedom to live the potential of their personhood. Nothing outside of them, like wealth, popularity, substance abuse, etc., is needed for the poor to be happy. Being independent of anything outside of themselves, the poor will blossom with moments of blessings, the moments of living the God-given inner potential every day. The moment of woe would be those moments when one neglects to live one's own God-given potential and believe the things outside of them would give better life.

In short, blessing means not to lose one's God-given inner riches at the cost of anything outside of oneself. Woe means to build one's life by everything outside of oneself except one's own God-given inner riches. Blessings or riches are in our hands depending on what makes us live our life at any given moment of life. If the inner riches of love, mercy, kindness etc., make us live we will be blessed ones. On the other hand, if anything we possess makes us live, we will live our own lives in the sense we are not able to live our inner riches.

God says to us "I have set before you, life and death, the blessing and the curse. Choose life, then, that you and your descendants may live." (Deuteronomy 30:19). It is our choice to live our lives as blessings or woes. Unless we live the blessings, we will not be able to experience the blessings in us and around us. Let us live the blessings and be the blessings to those who live around us.





Liturgical Minister Training- Spring 2025

The Diocese of Rockville Center will offer training for those who wish to serve as Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion and Lectors. No walk-ins permitted, all participants must be registered in advance with a letter from their pastor.

Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion: Part A - This training is required for **all** those who are beginning as Ministers. This "BASIC" training is required for **all** Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion. Those who wish to minister in hospitals, nursing homes and to the homebound are required to attend Part B training in addition to BASIC training. One **must** attend Part A training prior to Part B training. A **Lector Workshop** is available for both new and experienced lectors.






