Luke 4:1-13 (Lent 1)

Filled with the Holy Spirit, Jesus returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit into the desert for forty days, to be tempted by the devil. He ate nothing during those days, and when they were over he was hungry. The devil said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become bread." Jesus answered him, "It is written, One does not live on bread alone." Then he took him up and showed him all the kingdoms of the world in a single instant. The devil said to him, "I shall give to you all this power and glory; for it has been handed over to me, and I may give it to whomever I wish. All this will be yours, if you worship me." Jesus said to him in reply, "It is written: You shall worship the Lord, your God, and him alone shall you serve." Then he led him to Jerusalem, made him stand on the parapet of the temple, and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down from here, for it is written: He will command his angels concerning you, to guard you, and: With their hands they will support you, lest you dash your foot against a stone." Jesus said to him in reply, "It also says, You shall not put the Lord, your God, to the test." When the devil had finished every temptation, he departed from him for a time.

1: Give an example of when you found it hard to pray. What helped you to start praying again.

2: How can you simplify your life this Lent?

3: Recall a time of trial when you were tempted by words of empty promises.

From the Desk of Fr Antony

"Eyes are windows of the soul. The mouth is the door to the brain." The eyes grasp the situation better than the mind that tries to understand. "In darkness all things are alike." It is the light that helps distinguish the good from the bad. "A bird is known by its note and a human person by their talk." "From the fullness of the heart the mouth speaks." The message of the heart is deeper than the words that the mouth utters.

These proverbs explain that the truth that the heart or the soul has, is deeper than what the words can express. Our words and deeds are the media of our inner substance. All that each of us do or say outwardly is just the fruit of who we are inwardly. As the first reading says, "one's speech discloses the bent of one's mind", our words will disclose who we are and what side we support.

The second reading explains the same truth in an eternal perspective. Our corruptibility clothes itself with incorruptibility and mortality clothes itself with immortality. We have the power to live our eternity in our temporality. We are finite and limited but we carry within us the power to live with mercy and give our love and forgiveness beyond measure. Within our limitedness and weakness, God has implanted the power to pray beyond our imagination. Jesus has reminded us, "If you have faith the size of a mustard seed, you would say to [this] mulberry tree, 'Be uprooted and planted in the sea,' and it would obey you."

In today's Gospel reading, Jesus invites us to live our inner goodness. "A good person out of the store of goodness in his heart produces good... "For every tree is known by its own fruit... A good tree does not bear rotten fruit." But sometimes due to our fear or selfishness we may not choose to live from within. We may be blind to our own weakness and exaggerate those of the other. We may hide our own faults and highlight those of others. Jesus explains this fact of life in a parabolic way. 'Brother, let me remove that splinter in your eye,' when you do not even notice the wooden beam in your own eye? You hypocrite! Remove the wooden beam from your eye first; then you will see clearly to remove the splinter in your brother's eye." Jesus wants us to come out of our hypocrisy and live our truth of bearing good fruits.

Wednesday March 5th begins the Holy Season of Lent with Ash Wednesday.

The season is called holy because it is filled with opportunities of God calling us, to make us Holy through the Grace God gifts us, by journeying with His Son's passion death and Resurrection. We at St. Thomas More invite you to become a holy tree bearing good fruit through the Spiritual Exercises during Lent. Please refer to the bulletin for the various special spiritual exercises during Lent. Please make use of "Hallow"; a spiritual app to live our inner spiritual power to bear good fruit.


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



Fasting & Abstinence

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence.

See the guidelines below!

- Fasting is obligatory for ages 18-59 inclusive.
- Fasting constitutes no more than one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are less than a full meal.
- Abstinence is obligatory for all Catholics aged 14 or older.
- Abstinence is to avoid eating meat (chicken, pork, beef, etc). Fish is allowed.
- Please remember to drink lots of water!



If possible, the fast on Good Friday can be continued until the Easter Vigil as the "paschal fast" to honor the suffering and death of our Lord Jesus and to prepare more fully for his Resurrection.






