The Resurrection of the Lord: Easter Day April 20th 2025

<u>Readings</u>

Acts 10:34a,37-43 Psalm 118:1-2,16-17,22-23 Colossians 3:1-4 John 20:1-9

Focus Questions

- 1: Describe a time when you searched for a missing loved one.
- 2: How do you celebrate the holiness of Easter as the most important holy day of the Church calendar?
- 3: How do you explain to someone who doesn't have faith that Jesus rose from the dead? Families: Talk about the symbols we use on Easter flowers, new clothes, Easter eggs and how they relate to what happened to Jesus on Easter.

Gospel of Luke (19:28-40)

On the first day of the week, Mary of Magdala came to the tomb early in the morning, while it was still dark, and saw the stone removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and to the other disciple whom Jesus loved, and told them,

"They have taken the Lord from the tomb, and we don't know where they put him." So Peter and the other disciple went out and came to the tomb. They both ran, but the other disciple ran faster than Peter and arrived at the tomb first; he bent down and saw the burial cloths there, but did not go in. When Simon Peter arrived after him, he went into the tomb and saw the burial cloths there, and the cloth that had covered his head, not with the burial cloths but rolled up in a separate place. Then the other disciple also went in, the one who had arrived at the tomb first, and he saw and believed. For they did not yet understand the Scripture that he had to rise from the dead.





From the Pastor

Patient: How can I live to be a hundred, doctor?

Doctor: Give up cookies, cake, and ice cream. Stop eating red meat, potatoes, and bread. And no soft drinks.

Patient: And if I do that, I will live to be a hundred? Doctor: Maybe not, but it will certainly seem like it.

'Giving up something for Lent' was one of the spiritual exercises we started on Ash Wednesday (March 5th). Today (April 13th) is Palm Sunday, the 40th day of Lent. We tried our best to 'give up' something for the past 40 days, only to begin the HOLY WEEK today, to take the journey with Jesus in His Passion, Death, and Resurrection.

Our 'giving up' is a preparation to experience Jesus, who 'gives up' himself sacramentally as food (Eucharist) on Holy Thursday during his Last Supper, and then 'gives his life' for us on the Cross, on Good Friday. On Holy Saturday, he would be in the tomb to express that He gave up everything in order to embrace all the human conditions from birth to death. Now nothing hinders Him from uniting with us. His Resurrection on Easter Sunday is the confirmation that He 'gives up' God-Being and is united totally to us human-Beings, that by 'giving up' all that is binding us to human weakness, we can 'gain' the Power of New Life along with Jesus.

Holy Week is the time of 'giving up' along with Jesus in His Death, to pass on to 'gaining' divine power of New Life along with Jesus in his Resurrection. The goal of Our Lenten 40 days with all its spiritual exercises is to bring us to this high-spiritual-experience of passing with Jesus from death to glorious Resurrection. Please check the Holy Week schedule attached in the bulletin. Try to participate in all the events. In these Liturgical events we will remember Jesus' last week on the earth. By remembering them we will celebrate God's love and life for us. By celebrating we believe and experience within us God's offer of New Resurrected Life in Jesus. I personally invite all of you to eagerly participate in all the Holy Week events. Come with your 'giving up' in order to 'gain' the New Life of Resurrection.

Monday the 14th is **Reconciliation Monday.** Confessions will be heard from 3pm to 9pm in our Church and in all the Catholic Churches of the Diocese of Rockville Centre. Individual Confession cleanses and illumines the hearts to enter into the mystery of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday, and Easter Sunday. All are welcome.

Next Sunday is Easter Sunday. We celebrate the Resurrection of Our Lord Jesus Christ from death. Like Christmas, Easter will be the occasion when the whole family of St. Thomas More will attend Mass. Every Mass will be very crowded. We will invite them with a smile. We will pray for them every day of this Holy Week that everyone who comes for the Easter Celebration will be touched by the New Life of the Resurrection. That immeasurable love and mercy of the Crucified and Risen Lord may inspire a new way of living in them. May our warmth and friendliness welcome them to worship God with us in our Church more frequently.








c: Shout of Fear



Fasting **S** & Abstinence

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence.

See the guidelines below!

- Fasting is obligatory for ages 18-59 inclusive.
- Fasting constitutes no more than one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are less than a full meal.
- Abstinence is obligatory for all Catholics aged 14 or older.
- Abstinence is to avoid eating meat (chicken, pork, beef, etc). Fish is allowed.
- Please remember to drink lots of water!



If possible, the fast on Good Friday can be continued until the Easter Vigil as the "paschal fast" to honor the suffering and death of our Lord Jesus and to prepare more fully for his Resurrection.


