Gospel of John (14:23-29)

Jesus said to his disciples:

"Whoever loves me will keep my word,
and my Father will love him,
and we will come to him and make our dwelling with him.
Whoever does not love me does not keep my words;
yet the word you hear is not mine
but that of the Father who sent me.

"I have told you this while I am with you.

The Advocate, the Holy Spirit,
whom the Father will send in my name,
will teach you everything
and remind you of all that I told you.

Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you.
Not as the world gives do I give it to you.
Do not let your hearts be troubled or afraid.
You heard me tell you,
'I am going away and I will come back to you.'
If you loved me,
you would rejoice that I am going to the Father;
for the Father is greater than I.
And now I have told you this before it happens,

so that when it happens you may believe."



From the Pastor

"You must be brave to come down in a one hundred mile-per-hour gale like this in a parachute," the farmer said to the young soldier. "I did not come down in a parachute," said the soldier. "I went up in a tent."

What is evident to the farmer, does not mean that it is true.

Fifth Sunday of Easter: Today's Gospel describes a scene from Jesus' Last Supper. Judas leaves the supper to betray Jesus in Gethsemane. Judas' exit begins the time of trial for Jesus. Soon after the Last Supper, Jesus would be betrayed and judged by the Sanhedrin, condemned by Pilot, and crucified to die on the cross. But Jesus looks at this time as a moment of Glorification. Jesus lives his time of Passion and Death as His of Glorification by the Heavenly Father.

How can the **moment of suffering be a time of glorification?** What makes Jesus consider His suffering as glorification? Jesus sees all moments of His life as an expression of what God wants to do in Him. Whether it is suffering or joy Jesus, lives it as a moment of living God's purpose for which He came into the world.

When **everything goes well in our life, we feel how wonderful it is to live God's will** and purpose. But when we have to live through sorrowful and painful times it is very hard to accept or see God's will and purpose at those moments of life. As long as we experience life through what happens to us, this is how we will feel about life. But Jesus teaches us in today's Gospel how the moments don't bring life to us rather we bring life into all moments we live. Moments don't dictate or define life to us. Rather our way of living must give meaning and power to the moments. We should not be thrown by what happens to us. Rather, our way of living both the joyful or sorrowful moments should uplift the moments as the expressions of God's will and purpose.

When our **life is centered just around ourselves alone**, then we have no other explanation than ourselves for all that happens to us. Like Jesus, when God becomes our goal and purpose of our lives then we have a bigger view of life to see a glorification in suffering, to see a resurrection in crucifixion.

Congratulations to our Confirmandi: On Friday May 16th, Bishop Romero Fernandez administered the Sacrament of Confirmation to 85 young men and women of parish. We thank all those who helped them in their long preparation to receive the gifts of the Holy Spirit. Appreciation and thanks go to their sponsors and families who helped them to grow as strong Christian witnesses to be equipped with the strength of the Holy Spirit.



Reflections on the 2025 DRVC Eucharistic Pilgrimage & Congress

During the days of May 31 - June 7, we all have a great opportunity to experience a diocese-wide pilgrimage which leads us to the diocese-wide Congress on June 8 at St. Anthony's High School. Each day will consist of a Mass, a Eucharistic Procession, and then a Revival Night (Adoration, preaching, and catechesis). This is a miniature version of what took place across our country and in Indianapolis last year for the National Eucharistic Revival. I would urge everyone to check the daily schedule in the flyer in this bulletin as well as on the DRVC website, at https://www.drvc.org/congress/eucharistic-pilgrimage/ and start making plans now, even if it is just for a single day or evening. Some of the events are taking place fairly close to Hauppauge. There is something very uplifting about walking with fellow Catholics and witnessing to the Truth of Jesus' Real Presence in the Eucharist out in public. Apart from our own spiritual needs, we never know how our participation in something like this will enliven the hearts and minds of a fellow Catholic who needs a boost to return to a more active participation in the faith. And above it all, we get a personal reminder of Jesus' desire to remain with us, Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity, until the end of time (Matthew 28:20). I look forward to joining many of you!

Ascension Thursday

How to pray the Rosary

- 1: Make the Sign of the Cross
- 2: Holding the Crucifix, say The Apostles' Creed
- 3: On the first bead, say an Our Father
- 4: On the next three beads, say one Hail Mary for each
- 5: Say the Glory Be
- 6: For each of the five decades, announce the Mystery, then say an Our Father
- 7: For the next ten beads, say one Hail Mary for each, then finish with a Glory Be.
- 8: After finishing a decade, we say the prayer requested by the Blessed Virgin at Fatima:

Oh my Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of hell; lead all souls to Heaven, especially those who have most need of your mercy.

9: After the five decades, say the Hail, Holy Queen:

Hail, Holy Queen, Mother of Mercy, our life, our sweetness and our hope. To thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve. To thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this valley of tears. Turn then, most gracious advocate, thine eyes of mercy toward us, and after this our exile, show unto us the blessed fruit of they womb, Jesus. O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary.

10: Make the Sign of the Cross

*It takes about 15 minutes to pray the whole Rosary. Since we repeat the same prayers (i.e. Hail Mary 53 times), the Church helps us meditate on the Gospel by using Mysteries. Each day has 5 Mysteries, to reflect on one during each decade.

 - 15: Devotion for my Rosary is a great sign of predestination.


