Mark 4:26-34 (Ordinary 11)

Jesus said to the crowds: "This is how it is with the kingdom of God; it is as if a man were to scatter seed on the land and would sleep and rise night and day and through it all the seed would sprout and grow, he knows not how. Of its own accord the land yields fruit, first the blade, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear. And when the grain is ripe, he wields the sickle at once, for the harvest has come."

He said, "To what shall we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable can we use for it? It is like a mustard seed that, when it is sown in the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on the earth. But once it is sown, it springs up and becomes the largest of plants and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the sky can dwell in its shade." With many such parables he spoke the word to them as they were able to understand it. Without parables he did not speak to them, but to his own disciples he explained everything in private.

Focus Questions for 6/16/24 Mark 4:26-34

- 1: What is your reaction to the parable of the mustard seed?
- 2: Recall an ordinary event that became extraordinary because you recognized God's action in the event.
- 3: Relate a time when you witnesses the growth of something that started out very small.

Family & Children's Question:
Talk about how seeds start out small and hidden in the earth and grow to plants or shrubs that support people & wildlife. Plant some seeds out in the garden and watch them grow together!



Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends.

When you don't like someone, I see it as a problem and say that you are prejudiced and judgmental about others. But when I don't like someone, I sympathetically say to myself that I happen to be a good judge of human nature. The same act of disliking is interpreted and understood by me in opposite ways, negatively of others and positively of myself.

Today's Gospel narrates how some interpreted the divine work of Jesus (driving out the demons) as satanic work. How does one's look become positive or negative? As St. Paul explains in today's second reading, "we believe and therefore we speak." Our views, understandings and expressions are shaped by what we believe. If we believe in good things all that we see and do becomes positive. Our belief in evil attunes us to see evil and leaves us to be evil in our words and deeds.

The first reading explains how the first parents ended up driven away from God by believing in what the serpent (Satan) tricked them to believe. Let us pray that God's Holy Spirit guides us in divine wisdom to choose and believe the Godly things in order to see, say and do the good and Godly in and around us.

This Sunday we celebrate our Parish Feast, The Feast of St. Thomas More, as a Parish Family under his patronage. Our Patron used to say, "love rules without rules". Our Parish motto is "Sharing the Spirit of Love." We are who we are, not in what we have but in what we are to each other. Again, in the words of Saint Thomas More, "Kindness and good nature unite people more effectually and with greater strength than any agreements whatsoever, since thereby the engagements of people's hearts become stronger than the bond and obligation of words."

On this day of our Patron's feast, is the feast of our Parish Family. Let us celebrate ourselves, our care and concern for each other; our kindness and mercy, our forgiveness and sacrificing love, our good nature and pleasing attitude to each other. Let us wish and pray for each other. After the 8:00 am and 9:30 am Masses on Sunday let us celebrate ourselves by joining the pancake breakfast in Walden Hall, coordinated by our great volunteers of Knights and Columbiettes.

Our Parish Family is blessed with so many volunteers serving different ministries inside the Church and social works outside the church. At the feast weekend Masses, we would like to gratefully appreciate all our Volunteers with special blessings and a token of appreciation. 

News from the National Eucharistic Revival!

On Sunday, May 26, Deacon Matt was in Manhattan to take place in the Eucharistic Pilgrimage that is now going on simultaneously in four regions of our country. All four routes will ultimately join in mid-July at the 10th National Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis, IN.

The eastern route is named for St. Elizabeth Ann Seton. It started in St. Mary's Church in New Haven, CT, on May 17. On May 26th, Deacon Matt joined the pilgrimage as it left St. Patrick's Cathedral at 11:15 am. The faithful processed through the streets of Manhattan, heading downtown.



Deacon Matt said, "It was a powerful experience to be walking with so many brothers and sisters in the Catholic faith. It was actually a bit surreal to be passing through all these famous streets



like Lexington Ave. and Broadway, yet with the Blessed Sacrament leading the way. There were probably over a thousand people who were walking the route, and the NYPD helped to keep the route safe, even stopping traffic for us."

The procession stopped first at St. Peter's Church on Barclay St. for Adoration and a reflection (this is where St. Elizabeth was received into the Catholic Church in 1805) and then again at the Church of Our Lady of the Rosary on State Street, where a shrine to St. Elizabeth is

located, for another Adoration and reflection. The procession went over the Brooklyn Bridge, where Benediction was given at mid-span at 4:15 pm.

Stay tuned for periodic updates on the Revival, which enters its third and final year. Deacon Matt encourages us all to continue to reflect on the great gift of the Eucharist that Jesus gives us, his Real Presence, and one of several aspects unique to our Catholic faith.

If anyone in the home is suffering from a contagious illness, we are unable to enter the home.


There must be a companion with the recipient to ensure the safety of your loved one and our EM.







Christmas Time and Easter Time highlight the central mysteries of the Paschal Mystery, namely, the incarnation, death on the cross, resurrection, and ascension of Jesus Christ, and the descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. The Sundays and weeks of Ordinary Time, on the other hand, take us through the life of Christ. This is the time of conversion. This is living the life of Christ.

Ordinary Time is a time for growth and maturation, a time in which the mystery of Christ is called to penetrate ever more deeply into history until all things are finally caught up in Christ. The goal, toward which all of history is directed, is represented by the final Sunday in Ordinary Time, the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe.

FEAST OF ST. THOMAS MORE

Thomas More was born in London in 1478 and studied to become a lawyer. Recognized for his great intelligence, impartiality, and wisdom, he rose through the ranks of Parliament and earned King Henry VIII's favor. until he became Lord Chancellor in 1529. He resigned the chancellorship three years later, however, when he was unable to support Henry's divorce of Catherine of Aragon and marriage to Anne Boleyn. In 1535, he was convicted of treason and beheaded, and four hundred years later, he was canonized.

St Thomas More's feast day is June 22nd and he is the patron saint of adopted children, lawyers, civil servants, politicians and difficult marriages.
