### Mark 6:30-34 (Ordinary 16)


The apostles gathered together with Jesus and reported all they had done and taught. He said to them, "Come away by yourselves to a deserted place and rest a while." People were coming and going in great numbers, and they had no opportunity even to eat. So they went off in the boat by themselves to a deserted place. People saw them leaving and many came to know about it. They hastened there on foot from all the towns and arrived at the place before them.

When he disembarked and saw the vast crowd. his heart was moved with pity for them, for they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things.

### Focus Questions for Ordinary 16 Mark 6:30-34

- 1: Describe a place that gives you respite from your daily life.
- 2: Who are the people that you look upon with compassion and want to help?
- 3: Describe a time when you were in need of someone to lead you.

Family & Children's Question: Talk about the importance of resting from all the busyness during the school year while you are on summer vacation.



### Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends,

Little Jim knelt before his bed and prayed, "Dear God, if you can find some way to put vitamins in candy and ice cream instead of in spinach and cod liver oil, I would surely appreciate it. Amen."

Sugar-coating makes it easy to swallow a bitter pill. Sugar-coating is only a device to pass the pill easily through the taste buds of the tongue. But the pill, though bitter, is the real stuff needed for the health of the whole body.

Today's Gospel reading invites us to take the *real* stuff. When Jesus sent his twelve disciples vesting his authority upon them, He instructed them to take almost nothing (no food, no bags, no money) but sandals and walking sticks for the journey. He sent them with the bare minimum, which is like the sugar-coating, to sustain their lives. His message and His power which He sent them with is the real stuff, the essence and substance of the mission for which Jesus has sent them. Jesus wanted them totally to depend on the real stuff the authority he has invested in them – a radical dependence on the power of the person, Jesus who sent them.

Our life as human beings is not merely a natural biological event, nor personally our own achievement/ attempt to live as long as we can. Today's second reading describes our true identity. We have been blessed and chosen by God to be God's children. God has lavished riches of the divine Grace upon us. We are essentially the outcome (creation) of God's personal favor and will. God has revealed to each of us in all wisdom and insight. God has made known to us the mystery of His will in accord with His favor. Each of us primarily and totally is God's plan and God's will. Our life is nothing but the execution (living) of God's will and mystery (plan). He empowers us with His wisdom and power to live our life in God's way.

Like the disciples, we are called to be conscious of God's choice and grace upon us. When this consciousness pervades all that we say or do, we become God's mission; our life becomes a journey sent by God. To live our own plan and desires we may need to make lots of effort. But when we begin to live God's essence, He supplies us with the essential wisdom and power. What we need is the bare minimum to make our life's journey with God's essence. We may need just the sandals and walking stick as the Gospel narrates. As Jesus says in the sermon on the mount, ..."do not worry and say, 'what are we to eat?' or 'what are we to drink?' or 'what are we to wear?'....seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness and all these things will be given you as well." (Gospel of Mathew 6:32-33) May our life be the mission of God. Let us pray and learn to be dependent on God's wisdom and power.





If anyone in the home is suffering from a contagious illness, we are unable to enter the home.


There must be a companion with the recipient to ensure the safety of your loved one and our EM.





### News from the National Eucharistic Revival!


After a number of years of planning and much anticipation, one of the great highlights of the three -year National Eucharistic Revival is about to take place: the Tenth National Eucharistic Congress. From July 17-21, literally tens of thousands of Catholics (lay persons, clergy and religious) will descend upon Indianapolis, Indiana. Our very own Deacon Matt will be there, and he looks forward to sharing his experiences with our parish upon his return. This will be the first such Congress in our country in 83 years!

As you may have read previously in this bulletin, or heard about elsewhere, there have been four regional pilgrimage routes on which the Blessed Sacrament has traveled since late May, including the St. Elizabeth Ann Seton route in the East, which passed through the Archdiocese of New York and the Diocese of Brooklyn. All four routes will converge on Indianapolis right at the start of the Congress. During the Congress, the participants will be able to encounter Jesus in a variety of ways, including Masses, Eucharistic Processions, and Adoration. There will be breakout sessions during

the day, and a gathering each night in Lucas Oil Stadium for all participants. Focused sessions for youth, families, ministry leaders, and priests will occur. All deacons present will gather for special topics during the lunch periods each day. Many nationally known clergy and lay persons will be featured speakers.

Deacon Matt will be serving as the Deacon of the Word at the Youth Mass Saturday morning, presided by Archbishop Charles Thompson of Indianapolis. Most importantly, this will be an opportunity for all participants to bring the spirit of the Living Christ back to their parishes so that the third and final year - a year of missionary sending - may begin.

Deacon Matt asks for your prayers for all those who will participate, including their safe travel, and that God may lift them and all of us into a new awareness of the presence of Jesus in the Eucharist and in our lives.



### Local Sri Lankan's Celebrate Mary

Last weekend we hosted the local Sri Lankan community as they celebrated the Feast of Our Lady of Madhu. Fathers Antony and Norbert celebrated the Mass, preaching in the Sri Lankan languages of Tamil (also Fr A's native tongue) and Sinhala (Fr Norbert spent 15yrs on mission in Sri Lanka).
