

Again Jesus left the district of Tyre and went by way of Sidon to the Sea of Galilee, into the district of the Decapolis. And people brought to him a deaf man who had a speech impediment and begged him to lay his hand on him. He took him off by himself away from the crowd. He put his finger into the man's ears and, spitting, touched his tongue; then he looked up to heaven and groaned, and said to him, Ephphatha!"- that is, "Be opened!" - And immediately the man's ears were opened, his speech impediment was removed, and he spoke plainly. He ordered them not to tell anyone. But the more he ordered them not to, the more they proclaimed it. They were exceedingly astonished and they said, "He has done all things well. He makes the deaf hear and the mute speak."

Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends,

Between an optimist and pessimist, the difference is droll.

The optimist sees the doughnut, the pessimist the hole.

What do we see in other people, a doughnut or its hole? When we say that no one is perfect, we admit that everyone has some kind of hole in their character. At the same time when we acknowledge goodness in someone, we admit the doughnut in their character. It is our choice to see doughnuts or holes in people. Our choice will either promote or demote life in each of us or among one another.

In the Gospel today, Jesus helps his disciples to see the doughnuts, not the holes in the ancestral traditions observed in his time. But the Pharisees used the same traditions as instruments to accuse others of being bad and sin for failing to observe the traditions. What is tradition? Traditions are the proved practices of the former generation. The present generation is encouraged to believe that by observing them, a better and more secure life is guaranteed. But there is a risk involved in this belief, which is that a mere mechanical observation of traditions will easily rob the meaning of life. Soon traditions would become a meaningless burden.

Jesus wants the tradition to be followed only to enhance life. He wants our lips to say prayers but only to express our hearts. "In praying, do not babble like the pagans, who think that they will be heard because of their many words. But when you pray, go to your inner room, close the door, and pray to your Father in secret. And your Father who sees in secret will repay you." (Matthew 6:6-7)

Jesus wants our hands to do things only to express the good intentions of our heart. "When you give alms, do not blow a trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets to win the praise of others. But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right is doing, so that your almsgiving may be secret. And your Father who sees in secret will repay you." (Matthew 6: 2-4)

The limbs of the body are only instruments of the heart. The heart gives value to the deeds of the body. The body expresses what the heart decides. Anything we do without our heart's involvement would make us nothing more than a machine. Likewise, if the traditions are just for the sake of traditions, it would make our spiritual life nothing more a burdensome habit. Jesus wants us to check and see why we do everything we do. Jesus wants us to do or say everything from the heart.

You are invited to the St. Thomas More Beach Mass and Picnic. Please remember to mark your calendar; September 8th at Otto Schubert Beach, Nissequogue, starting with Mass at Noon. A picnic follows the Mass. Please bring lunch and spend some social time after the Mass at the beach. The Knights of Columbus will keep the grill hot and ready to help those who want to barbecue their food.

In the name of the parish I wish to thank everyone who helped to deal with our flooding situation a couple of weekends ago, especially in my absence. The office staff was contacted in the middle of the night after our building alarms went off and saw to the immediate need. Several others lent professional expertise in assessing the damage, and still others pitched in to sort through those items that could be saved versus those that were damaged. And thanks to all for your patience in this. We are back to having regular Masses in the church, but the meeting spaces are still off-limits as insurance estimates are completed and restoration work begins. We will adjust and eventually will be back to full use of the space. Please pray for those families in our communities who suffered loss of property.
