

Mark 9:30-37 (Ordinary 25)

Jesus and his disciples left from there and began a journey through Galilee, but he did not wish anyone to know about it. He was teaching his disciples and telling them, "The Son of Man is to be handed over to men and they will kill him, and three days after his death the Son of Man will rise." But they did not understand the saying, and they were afraid to question him.

They came to Capernaum and, once inside the house, he began to ask them, "What were you arguing about on the way?" But they remained silent. They had been discussing among themselves on the way who was the greatest. Then he sat down, called the Twelve, and said to them, "If anyone wishes to be first, he shall be the last of all and the servant of all." Taking a child, he placed it in their midst, and putting his arms around it, he said to them, "Whoever receives one child such as this in my name, receives me; and whoever receives me, receives not me but the One who sent me."

Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends,

Late one night in an insane asylum one inmate shouted, "I am Napoleon."

Another asked, "How do you know?" The first inmate said, "God told me."

Just then, a voice from the next room shouted, "I did not."

In the world of varied opinions, sometimes we may feel that we live in a mad house. It is hard to discern the voice of truth amidst the noises we hear. They may sound good, attractive, and at times may sound very logical, pulling us from the road of truth we travel.

In today's first reading Isaiah instructs us, with his personal example, how God helped him to stay the course of truth against all odds. The first thing was to keep open himself without any rebellious spirit, turning back or abandoning his course. In his path of living God's truth Isaiah was ready to face any kind of suffering or hurdles. He could face any disgrace because his unshakable faith in God was his help. He was convinced that none could dispute or confront him because God was his help, and none could prove him wrong.

In today's Gospel, Jesus asks his disciples what people say about him. His disciples voice the various opinions that people have about him, but Jesus does not settle for any opinion. His life was not modelled to live up to the expectation or favorable opinions of people, but to live the purpose that God has set for him. He could have done all his miracles and teachings in order to please people and maintain his popularity among them. But life does not consist of one's popularity or high poll numbers among the people. If popularity becomes the goal of life, the life will be shaped by the poll numbers... as it happens in today's political world.

He then asked them to express what they would say about Him. Peter expressed "You are the Christ." Yes, that is the way Jesus wanted them to be understood, accepted, and believed. But Jesus revealed to them something deeper than what all the others outside and His own disciples claimed Him to be. He began to teach them from this point in His life that they had not known of Him yet. He is not only a glorified Christ, but also a servant who will suffer and die for the people.

Jesus proclaims that His life is not merely what others accepted Him to be, but primarily what He is convinced of Himself. His own conviction is that He would reveal His true identity through His suffering, dying, and rising again. Even though Peter tried to distract him, Jesus never gave up his conviction, but invited to follow him.

'To follow him' is to understand and live our life from the spiritual conviction as Jesus did. Jesus invites us to live from the strength of the inner conviction that God reveals in each of us. Let us not be carried away by the opinions and description of life that the outside world offers to us. Let us reach our inner self in spiritual moments of prayer and allow God to reveal to us the meaning of our life. Let us pray for the strength to follow Jesus. Let us not be pulled away from God's revelation of who we are and what we should do.

We had a great Golf Outing on Monday September 9th. The weather was perfect and close to 100 golfers had a very good time playing and being together as the St. Thomas More Parish Community. Our Golf Committee headed by Ed Rogan deserves all our appreciation for having worked together since the month of February. I thank them all for their hard work, team spirit, and commitment. God bless them and their families.







GOLF OUTING 2024





The Vatican & Space

Did you know that the Church has a long-standing interest in astronomy and space? The Gregorian Calendar (which we currently use) was promulgated by Pope Gregory XIII in 1582, developed through astronomical data. Pope Gregory commissioned the "Gregorian Tower", a very early observatory in Vatican City.

Through the 18th and 19th centuries, the Vatican Observatory (Specola Vaticana) was moved to a few different sites around Rome and became involved in the international astronomy community. The Vatican was heavily involved in the creation of the "Carte du Ciel", an international project to map the skies during the late 19th/early 20th centuries.

By the 1930's, the light pollution in Rome became too much to overcome, so Pope Pius XI moved the Observatory to Castel Gandolfo outside of Rome. However, by the 1960's the same problems arrived. This lead to the establishment of the Vatican Observatory Research Group (VORG), with offices in Tuscon, Arizona.

In 1993, the VORG completed the construction of the Vatican Advanced
Technology Telescope in Mount Graham, Arizona. The Observatory is still
headquartered at Castel Gandolfo, but its primary imaging site remains the VATT in
Arizona.

Fun Fact: Since 1906, every director of the Vatican Observatory has been a Jesuit.

Currently, the Observatory is run by Brother Guy Consolmango, SJ. He is a strong proponent of religion and science working in tandem, and is the recipient of the Carl

Sagan Medal and the St. Albert Award.
