Mark 10:17-30 (Ordinary 28)

As Jesus was setting out on a journey, a man ran up, knelt down before him, and asked him, "Good teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus answered him, "Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. You know the commandments: You shall not kill; you shall not commit adultery; you shall not steal; you shall not bear false witness; you shall not defraud; honor your father and your mother." He replied and said to him, "Teacher, all of these I have observed from my youth." Jesus, looking at him, loved him and said to him, "You are lacking in one thing. Go, sell what you have, and give to the poor and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." At that statement his face fell, and he went away sad, for he had many possessions. Jesus looked around and said to his disciples, "How hard it is for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God!" The disciples were amazed at his words. So Jesus again said to them in reply, "Children, how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for one who is rich to enter the kingdom of God." They were exceedingly astonished and said among themselves, "Then who can be saved?" Jesus looked at them and said, "For human beings it is impossible, but not for God. All things are possible for God." Peter began to say to him, "We have given up everything and followed you." Jesus said, "Amen,

I say to you, there is no one who has given up house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or lands for my sake and for the sake of the gospel who will not receive a hundred times more now in this present age: houses and brothers and sisters and mothers and children and lands, with persecutions, and eternal life in the age to come."

Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends.

Marriage Counselor: Do you enjoy talking to each other?

Counselee: We enjoy talking to each other, but the problem is listening to each other. In today's Gospel a Pharisee reminded Jesus how the law of Moses stipulates the husband's legal right to divorce his wife. Jesus explained to him that the marriage as a legal contract can easily be divorced by law. But is marriage just a law-based institution? Does marriage have anything more than the legal rite of the spouses over each other?

Jesus explained that marriage is a union blessed by God. It is not just a legal contract but a union of two becoming one flesh intended and blessed by God. It is not just two persons living together as long as they like or trying to adjust/tolerate each other, claiming and maintaining their individual rights. Marriage is the most intimate union of a woman and a man trying to live together, which is having within it the potential to grow as two persons becoming one flesh. In marriage the man loses in woman, his otherness to his woman; likewise, the woman loses in man her otherness to her man. Their marital union is so blessed by God that there is no otherness to each other, but only the rich oneness in which each of them grow their newness of being in each other in their individual self.

St. Paul calls this new oneness that happens between the partners in marriage a mystery like that of Christ in Church and the Church in Christ. (Letter to Ephesians 5:28-32). Marriage is a sacred mystery in the sense that is has a bigger hidden truth which is realized every day in living the oneness between the husband and wife. Let us pray that God helps all the married couples to realize God's blessings of oneness in living their marriage every day.

Yes, the Gospel of Jesus upholds the dignity and the integrity of the marriage, which is a God-intended inseparable unity between the husband and wife. But we also know the challenges the sacrament of marriage faces these days. The materialism and secularism have diminished the inner spiritual power. The close unit of an enlarged family has now shrunk to a two generation family of parents and children, which is eventually shrinking further to leaving the elderly parents to live by themselves in the evening of their lives. Thus, the help, guidance and the encouragement from the older generation is not readily available for the younger ones. The marriage union is becoming more challenged to greater risk than any time in the past. Let us pray that God makes our human hearts soft and generous, that love in our families may create the strongest bond that would empower the married couples to live through all challenges.

October is the month of Our Lady of the Rosary: "The family that prays together stays together" is an adage. The Rosary is a family prayer that all the generations of a family can pray together. October is the month dedicated to Our Lady of the Rosary. If your work or other concerns of daily life do not give enough you time to pray the full Rosary, please try to come together as a family to pray a decade of the Rosary. In our bulletin please find the instructions on how to pray the Rosary.

How to pray the Rosary

- 1: Make the Sign of the Cross
- 2: Holding the Crucifix, say The Apostles' Creed
- 3: On the first bead, say an Our Father
- 4: On the next three beads, say one Hail Mary for each
- 5: Say the Glory Be
- 6: For each of the five decades, announce the Mystery, then say an Our Father
- 7: For the next ten beads, say one Hail Mary for each, then finish with a Glory Be.
- 8: After finishing a decade, we say the prayer requested by the Blessed Virgin at Fatima:

Oh my Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of hell; lead all souls to Heaven, especially those who have most need of your mercy.

9: After the five decades, say the Hail, Holy Queen:

Hail, Holy Queen, Mother of Mercy, our life, our sweetness and our hope. To thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve. To thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this valley of tears. Turn then, most gracious advocate, thine eyes of mercy toward us, and after this our exile, show unto us the blessed fruit of they womb, Jesus. O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary.

10: Make the Sign of the Cross

*It takes about 15 minutes to pray the whole Rosary. Since we repeat the same prayers (i.e. Hail Mary 53 times), the Church helps us meditate on the Gospel by using Mysteries. Each day has 5 Mysteries, to reflect on one during each decade.

Mysteries of the Rosary

Joyful Mysteries (Mon, Sat)

- 1. The Annunciation to Mary
- 2. The Visitation of Mary
- 3. The Birth of our Lord Jesus
- 4. The Presentation of the Child Jesus in the Temple
- 5. The Finding of Our Lord in the Temple

Sorrowful Mysteries (Tues, Fri)

- 1. The Agony of Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane
- The Scourging of Jesus at the Pillar
- 3. The Crowning of Jesus with Thorns
- 4. The Carrying of the Cross
- 5. The Crucifixion and Death of Jesus

Glorious Mysteries (Wed, Sun)

- 1. The Resurrection of Jesus
- 2. The Ascension of Jesus
- 3. The Descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost
- 4. The Assumption of Mary
- 5. The Coronation of Our Lady in Heaven

Luminous Mysteries (Thurs)

- 1. Jesus' Baptism in the Jordan
- 2. The Wedding at Cana
- 3. The Proclamation of the Kingdom
- 4. The Transfiguration
- 5. The Institution of the Eucharist
