Mark 12:38-44 (Ordinary 32)

In the course of his teaching Jesus said to the crowds, "Beware of the scribes, who like to go around in long robes and accept greetings in the marketplaces, seats of honor in synagogues, and places of honor at banquets. They devour the houses of widows and, as a pretext recite lengthy prayers. They will receive a very severe condemnation."

He sat down opposite the treasury and observed how the crowd put money into the treasury. Many rich people put in large sums. A poor widow also came and put in two small coins worth a few cents. Calling his disciples to himself, he said to them, "Amen, I say to you, this poor widow put in more than all the other contributors to the treasury. For they have all contributed from their surplus wealth, but she, from her poverty, has contributed all she had, her whole livelihood."

Focus Questions for Ordinary 32 Mark 12:38-44

- 1: Relate a time when you witnessed generosity like the poor widow from someone who could least afford it.
- 2: Describe the most generous person you know. 3: Recall a time when you let go and put your trust in God like the poor widow.

Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends.

"The best and most beautiful things in this world cannot be seen or even heard but must be felt with the heart." These words of Helen Keller who became blind and deaf during her childhood, explain the reality that heart can experience. It may be that we depend too much on the other external senses (like seeing, hearing, smelling, etc.) that we become not as sensitive to the reality that Heart, the inner sense, can feel.

Today's readings name that heart-reality as love of God and love of others. The first reading explains how God can be loved with "all your heart, and with all your soul and with all your strength." Moses explained to the people that their God is the God of their history, the same God whom their fathers believed. Their faith in God is handed to them by their ancestors. The same ONE who was in a relationship with their ancestors is the same ONE who relates with them now. Moses emphasized the importance of a faithful relationship with God, and the need for obedience that comes from love, not just duty. God is not an abstract reality but a person of loving relationship whom we can love and who can be loved in loving others.

In the Gospel we find the words of the first readings said twice. The words "Love your God and others with all your heart, all your understanding etc." are said first by Jesus and repeated by the scribe. Jesus did not merely repeat the words from the book of Deuteronomy, but he added to them the other phase of God's love. "The second is this: *You shall love your neighbor as yourself.* There is no other commandment greater than these."

When the scribe responded to Jesus' reply, he too did not repeat what Jesus replied to him. He expressed his own understanding of Jesus's words by his own, "to love (God) and your neighbor as yourself is worth more than all burnt offerings and sacrifices." Jesus appreciated the scribe for his understanding. First, God is the PERSON who can be and has to be loved in/through our human faculties, with all our heart, with all our soul, and with all our strength. Secondly, this interpersonal love between us and God has to be released (lived) in our love towards others. Our life is primarily a spiritual expression in two loves: 1) the love of God who loves us 2) our love towards others. The true essence of our life is love that comes vertically down from God filling our hearts, so that we live that love horizontally, loving others around us.

November is the month we pray for those who lived with us and left us to be with God. Death is the reality of the biological body. As the Word of God explains, our body bears the Image of God (Genesis 1:28) and is the Temple of the Holy Spirit (Corinthians 3:16-17). The body has its own limitations and can hold life only for a limited time. When the body cannot hold life anymore, the life goes back to God where it came from. Jesus's words explain how He claims us back. "Everyone who sees the Son and believes in him may have eternal life, and I shall raise him [on] the last day." (John 6:40) "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die." (John 11:25-26)

Our beloved completed their earthly bodily life. Now they are called by God to live eternally in God's presence. Please pray that they have eternal rest and enjoy God face to face living eternally.




OCIA Rite of Welcome

Liturgical Minister Training-Fall 2024

The Diocese of Rockville Center will offer training for those who wish to serve as Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion and Lectors. No walk-ins permitted, all participants must be registered in advance with a letter from their pastor.

Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion: Part A - This training is required for **all** those who are beginning as Ministers. This "BASIC" training is required for **all** Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion. Those who wish to minister in hospitals, nursing homes and to the homebound are required to attend Part B training in addition to BASIC training. One **must** attend Part A training prior to Part B training.

A **Lector Workshop** is available for both new and experienced lectors. You may not take EMHC Part A and the Lector Workshop on the same day.




