

Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends.

Mr. Bartello was the main speaker of the event. His friend introduced him to the audience. "There isn't anything that I would not do for Mr. Bartello, and there isn't anything he would not do for me. That is why we have gone through life not doing anything for each other."

In today's Gospel John the Baptist invites different group of people to get into doing what they should do. He admonishes them that they should not only hear his message of repentance but also must put the message into deed. Those who have must share with those who have not. Tax collectors must not collect more than what is due. Soldiers must practice justice not extortion. In short everyone is expected at least to fulfill the requirements of law if not be able to be merciful to the other. Conversion is not merely a different way of thinking, just to be conscious of a higher standard of living.

Conversion is a move from what one is right now to what one could best be. Conversion happens when one realizes that she/he has potential to live better than the present life that they live. Conversion is not 'a simple stop doing something and start doing something else'. It is a transformation to bring out the best that we can be. Conversion is a creative process of not repeating ourselves but allowing ourselves to become new and fresh every day. Repetition is a mechanical act. We as humans are not machines. We are organic — an organism that grows, bears fruit and propagates. Mechanical repetition makes life a burden. Being a creative organism overwhelms with joy from within and flows generously outside.

The third week of Advent is called 'GAUDETE' (REJOICE) Sunday. To highlight the sentiment of joy, we will light the rose candle. The message of this Sunday is that there is JOY in waiting for the Lord. At the call of John the Baptist we turn our focus from our old style of life to a new one by the grace of Jesus who is going to be born among us. Mother Teresa says, "Joy is not merely a matter of temperament. Joy is prayer. Joy is strength. Joy is love." May the joy of waiting for the Lord be our strength and love for Jesus the Emmanuel.

We wait with prayer, the birth of Jesus to happen in our hearts and homes. Waiting with prayer means to be ever conscious of the truth that God can be in us. Our waiting will not disappoint because he came as Emmanuel ('God with us'); thus, he is definitely with those who wait for him. This affirmation strengthens us in our waiting for Jesus. His coming to us shows how much God loves to be with us. Thus, this Sunday of JOY makes us prayerfully conscious of his coming; His coming strengthens us and manifests how much God loves us. Let us rejoice and joyfully welcome Jesus.








In today's Gospel, John the Baptist says "Whoever has two cloaks should share with the person who has none. And whoever has food should do likewise..."



Dear Parishioners,

Many of you are aware that the Diocese of Rockville Centre entered a Chapter 11 Bankruptcy process in October 2020. On December 4th, 2024 the court confirmed the Plan that resolves and ends the Bankruptcy Case for the Diocese of Rockville Centre, all our parishes, and related ministries.

The number of lawsuits that were brought against the Diocese, our parishes, schools and other ministries made it impossible to equitably compensate victim-survivors of child abuse with meritorious claims through court trials. Trials would have resulted in the first survivors in line with claims receiving compensation and the rest receiving little or nothing.

The total settlement amount was just over \$323 million, which included insurance contributions, Diocesan assets and sale proceeds from Diocesan property, and contributions from parishes and other related entities.

The Diocese, parishes and other related entities contributed a total of \$234.8 million. Insurance companies contributed a total of just over \$85 million. Counsel for the Creditor's Committee contributed \$3 million. All participated in order to offer equitable compensation to survivors and move this difficult ordeal towards its conclusion.

Our Parish contributed \$316,413 to the settlement of all cases. These funds come from the Parish reserves.

Bankruptcy offered the possibility of equitable compensation and some measure of healing for survivors, while allowing the Church to continue the saving mission of Jesus Christ by, first and foremost, securing the future of our parishes.

This is about protecting our Parish now and for the future. We know that the horrific scandal of child abuse was not caused by us, but we inherited the devastating effects. In 2019, as a result of the law passed by the New York State Legislature, our parishes became subject to lawsuits based upon claims of abuse from decades ago, long before any of the current priests or staff members arrived here and, in fact, before most of our current parishioners lived within the parish. The law has affected not only the Church, but many public and private institutions across the state.

By participating in the bankruptcy process, along with the whole Church throughout Long Island, we have helped to resolve all claims and to secure the future of our Parish. As a result, historical lawsuits can no longer be brought against St. Thomas More.

For over twenty years, the Diocese, our parishes, schools, and ministries, have enacted strict Child Protection Protocols to ensure that the Church is among the safest of places for everyone. Our record throughout these past twenty years has proven that these measures work.

We pray for all survivors of child abuse, that by the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ and the compassion of others, they may find healing and comfort. We pray for our parishes and all ministries that serve God and the common good of all people on Long Island, that Mary, Mother of the Church will intercede for us. Out of this dark chapter in the Church's history, we look to a time of resurrection, to a Church purified and eager to bring the saving message of Jesus Christ to all people.
