



Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends.

Little Jane was going to bed when her grandmother told her: 'Don't forget, dear, to include Grandma in your prayers tonight, that God should bless her and let her live to be very, very old." "Oh very, very old?" replied Jane, "I'd rather pray that God would make you young."

2025 years sounds very old. Yet we call 2025 the New Year. By 2025, we mean that the earth has gone around the sun 2,025 times since the birth of Jesus. Though the earth has made billions of rotations around the sun, we refer to January first as the NEW YEAR of 2025, counting the rounds since the birth of Jesus. Yes, we know for a fact that 2025 is also a repeat of earth's round as it did in the past. But we treat the start of earth's new rotation as an opportunity to begin something NEW in each of us. We wish each other a Happy NEW year, trying to venture something new which we have not yet tried in our life.

Today is the Feast of the Epiphany. It is the feast of the Newborn God-Man, Jesus manifesting His Divine self to the wise men who came searching to visit Him in the manger. The inner search and the wisdom of the three wise men made it possible for them to recognize the divinity of Jesus in the poor human child of Mary and Joseph, in a manger, through the guidance of the star. The ordinary people, the manger, and the appearance of a star reveal the birth of the supernatural God in a human child like us.

Timewise the year 2025 has nothing new and extraordinary. It is the repletion of the same number of days, weeks, and months. But the wise and searching hearts like those of the Wise Men of today's feast, will find something new and extraordinary in the repetitive ordinaries. Our life situations would end up repeating the ordinaries unless we, like the wise men search for the God-Man who is ready to be born in the lives of those who search for Him. Jesus, the Emmanuel (God with us) is willing to come to our ordinaries, to fill our routine lives with new meaning and exciting values. May this 2025 be a Happy New Year. Let us search for the newness and extraordinariness in God.

In 2025, let us make the bland meal spicy and tasty: Let us refuse to be boring and dull. Let us choose to be joyful and humorous. Pope Francis recommends a prayer that is supposed to be the prayer of St. Thomas More, Patron of our Parish. This prayer asks God for a healthy dose of good humor in our daily life.

Grant me, O Lord, good digestion, and also something to digest. Grant me a healthy body, and the necessary good humor to maintain it. Grant me a simple soul that knows to treasure all that is good and that doesn't frighten easily at the sight of evil, but rather finds the means to put things back in their place. Give me a soul that knows not boredom, grumblings, sighs and laments, nor excess of stress, because of that obstructing thing called "I." Grant me, O Lord, a sense of good humor. Allow me the grace to be able to take a joke to discover in life a bit of joy, and to be able to share it with others - St. Thomas More, Chancellor of King Henry VIII.

It is a tradition in the Catholic Church to bless our homes on the Epiphany, marking the lintel above our doors as a sign that yours is a Christian home.

Using chalk, mark the current year and the initials of the Magi above the doorway, with a cross between each of the letters, then pray....

20+C+M+B+25

May all who come to our home this year rejoice to find Christ living among us; and may we seek and serve, in everyone we meet, that same Jesus who is Lord of all people, forever and ever. Amen



Did you know?

The names of the three Magi are Caspar, Melchoir, and Balthasar.

In addition, C+M+B is also an abbreviation for "Christus Mansionem Benedicat" which is Latin for "May Christ bless this dwelling".
